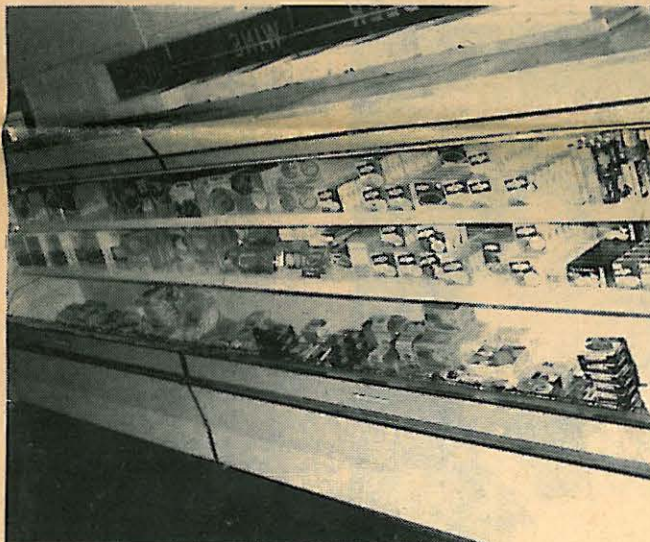

## GUIDED CAMPUS TOURS ARE OFFERED

SAN DIEGO — San Diego State will offer the first in a series of public, guided campus tours beginning, Thursday March 11.

The two-hour tour will include visits to a science laboratory, the broadcasting facility, art studios and social science museums.

Visitors will meet at the flagpole situated on the main entrance mall at 2:00 p.m.

Future public tours of the \$150 million campus will be conducted each month on the second and fourth Thursday.

Special group tours will be arranged separately from the public tours.

## Fiberglass Menagerie Creating 'Ole Pete'

Alpine's only industry has been selected to create "Ole Pete," a mule to which Muleshoe, Texas will pay tribute.

Working from a model created by their sculptor, Kevin Wolff, the Rorie Company will cast the fiberglass animal which will then be taken to a place of honor in his home town, Muleshoe, Tex.

Flying in from that great state Saturday, were officials of the town. They came to

put their approval on the model. Three of Alpine's businessmen represented Alpine, along with Mildred Rorie, when the dignitaries arrived. A tour of the Fiberglass Menagerie was given to the visitors.

Muleshoe citizens decided that an animal which helped build America deserved a statue. Funds began to come in three years ago but not in great quantities. One of the first gifts was 21 cents pried out of a mule driver in the Soviet Union by a Muleshoe, Texas pastor.

The model for the statue is 18 years old and 1,000 pounds heavy. He is a multi-duty mule and is especially useful in pulling plow-type implements.

The formal unveiling is scheduled to take place in July. The statue will stand near the Sante Fe depot and perhaps when his day rolls around, all the "Ole Petes" of yesterday and today, will have their moment of glory.

## Amigos Take Field Trip

About a week and a half ago, the Alpine Amigos 4-H club who are enrolled in forestry went on a field trip.

John Benediktson met the group at the Descanso ranger station. He gave each of them a map of the Cleveland National Forest and they toured the fire station. John Bryant showed them the equipment used in our area.

Mt. Laguna was the next stop on the trip and there the group planted 150 white pine trees.

The seeds from which these trees were started, were collected in the Lagunas and stored for one year. They were then shipped to Northern California where they were planted in seed beds and allowed to grow for a year.

Then the trees were shipped back to Viejas Honor Camp where they were repotted for future growth.

The young people learned that this is how our forestry services help to provide the beautiful trees in our forests. The trees only grow one foot a year and most of the trees in the Lagunas are at least 200 years old.

After the lunch time, the group went with the forester to gather specimens for their individual collections.

The next trip for this active group will be to the conservation area.

## ENGLISH HEAD TO SPEAK

GROSSMONT COLLEGE — The federal government is finally aware that the junior college English instructor has been left out in the cold as far as government held with his training is concerned.

Robert W. Danielson, chairman of the Grossmont College English Dept. says this is one of the points he will make in an address at the nation's No. 1 conference on the teaching of English skills. The annual Conference on College Composition and Communication will be held April 8-10 in St. Louis, Missouri.

Danielson, who attended a groundbreaking seminar of English teachers, educational consultants and government officials in Tempe, Arizona last month, will report on the results.

Co-sponsored by the U.S. Office of Education and the National Council of Teachers

of English, the conference dealt with several aspects of junior college English teaching.

Danielson said the conference not only opened the eyes of federal officials, but also made clear to representatives of four-year colleges and universities that the junior college is a unique institution and that the training of its teachers is their responsibility.

A week or so, perhaps, would do. Having company is for me a traumatic experience and one which takes much frantic preparation.

Robert takes this sort of thing in stride and is quite capable of inviting total strangers to drop in and view his latest project, which reduces me to a state of shock. We are most fortunate in having mothers who are highly uncritical, or perhaps they have simply given up and are just hoping for the best.

There came a time early in our remodeling adventures when both of them expressed, somewhat wistfully, a desire to see what we were doing. I procrastinated as long as I possibly could, and finally decided to invite them for dinner. Both accepted with alacrity.

Days of making ready ensued. We picked up tools, we washed windows, carefully, because they were only tacked in. Wood panelling was carefully placed so that it would look permanent (we prayed that no one would touch it — then the whole wall would fall down).

Our breakfast bar was also temporary. It looked as though it were there to stay, but it wasn't. We have a somewhat unusual floor plan, living and dining room and kitchen all one on the top floor. The bedroom is the whole lower floor and I decided, when time grew short, to store all left-over buck-

ets of paint, loose lumber, and other miscellaneous items downstairs, where no one could see them. When I finished, the downstairs area could not have looked worse, but I did not worry. The over-all effect upstairs was charming. The table was attractive, the fireplace gave the impression of being durable and steadfast and it did not smoke. I felt happy, relaxed, and sure our endeavors would be impressive.

It was fairly dark when our guests arrived and they did not notice the various piles of building materials scattered around the house — the bricks and lumber and shingles we had not had time to hide. We thoroughly enjoyed our dinner, and afterward we sat in front of the fire, chatting and drinking coffee. The hour grew later and I began to feel complacent. I had made an impression and it did not matter how hard I had worked. My mother said she thought we were doing a wonderful job and we were pleased. And then it happened.

My mother-in-law said brightly: "Children, your house is so attractive; everything on this floor is just lovely — can't we see what you are doing downstairs?"

There was no way out. As I led them down the unfinished stairway, through the piles of rubble, the unbelievable confusion and disorder I babbled incoherently — "We still have so much to do — we haven't gotten around to finishing up down here — I just haven't had time to straighten up. . . ." They both said sweetly that they understood. But I have been wondering bitterly ever since why somebody up there hates me!

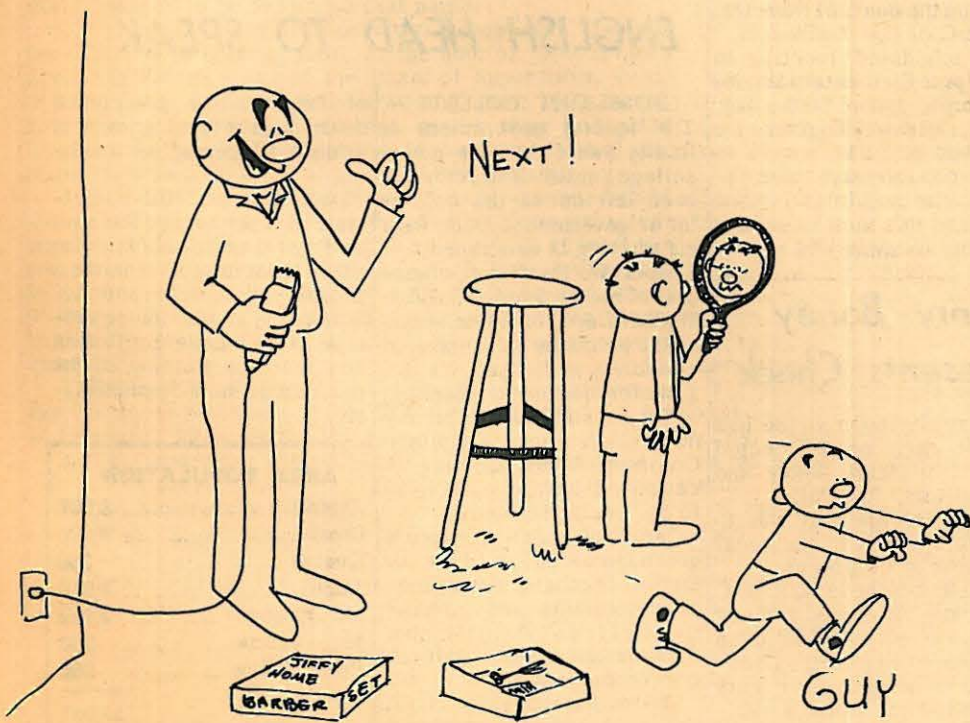

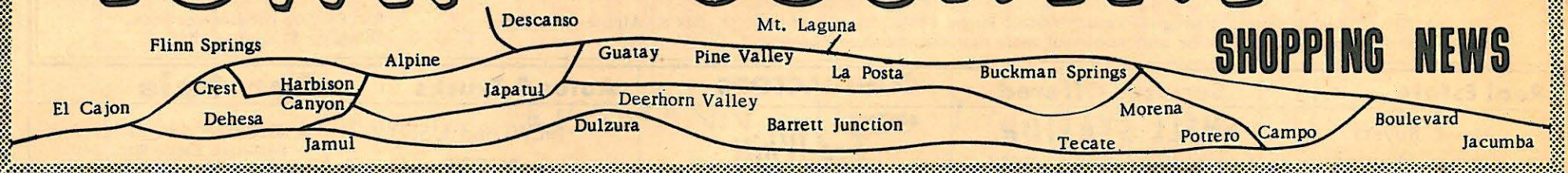
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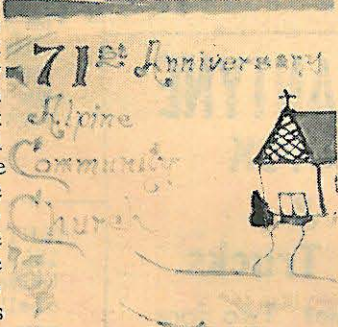

# If You Live Here ...

Start . . . a hedge this month. The sooner you put it in the more growth you'll get through the year. Check the Alpine Pine Acres Tree Nursery for the good-looking varieties of pittosporum available now. Oleander makes a wonderful flowering hedge for a hot spot and members of the laurel family grow into handsome, glossy screens or dividers.

Check . . . for early spring flowering shrubs and trees and make your selection while the plants are in bloom. In some areas you may still find late blooming deciduous plants bare-root but most of them will be in containers now.

As your flowering shrubs and trees . . . come into bloom you can shape them to your desire and use the flowered branches as indoor decoration.

Citrus trees can . . . be planted now. Ask about the ones that do well in this area. Give them a warm, sheltered spot. Good drainage is a must.

You'll find . . . choice chrysanthemum plants in the nursery this month. Try the low growing compact ones that don't require staking for the best landscaping effect.

WHEREAS, the boundaries of the proposed annexation were submitted to the County Boundary Commission and this Board has considered the report of said Commission (Document No. 354210); and

WHEREAS, the Local Agency Formation Commission has approved the annexation of the hereinafter described territory to the district (Document No. 355219); and

WHEREAS, investigation of the proposed annexation by the Department of Special District Services discloses that said property is within the same watershed as said sanitation district and that it would be desirable and feasible to sewer said property by extension of said District's lines (Document No. 356669); NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED:

1. That it is the intention of the Board of Supervisors of the County of San Diego to annex to the ALPINE Sanitation District under the provisions of the County Sanitation District Act all of that territory in the County of San Diego, none of which is now included in any other county sanitation district or other district or districts formed for similar purposes, bounded and described as follows:

All that unincorporated territory in the County of San Diego, State of California, being a portion of the Southeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 27, Township 15 South, Range 2 East, S. B. M., according to U. S. Government Survey, approved September 11, 1879, lying within the following described boundary:

1. Beginning at the Southeast corner of the Northeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of said Section 27;
2. thence along the Southerly line of said Northeast Quarter of the Southwest Quarter, South 89°36'15" West, 706.17 feet to the true point of beginning;
3. thence South 89°36'15" West 20.00 feet along said Southerly line;
4. thence due South, 136.83 feet;
5. thence due East, 20.00 feet;
6. thence due South, 87.64 feet to an intersection with a line that is parallel with and 1124.50 feet Northerly of, measured at right angles from the South line of said Section 27, said line hereinafter referred to as line "A";
7. thence due East 145.00 feet;
8. thence due North to an intersection with the Southerly line of that area annexed to the Alpine Sanitation District by the San Diego County Board of Supervisors on February 26, 1963, Item No. 120;
