- Beat** 1 pint (2 cups) whipping cream very stiff. (Add 1 envelope gelatin and 1 tbsp. cold water dissolved over hot water to whipping cream).
- Fold in** whipped cream-gelatin mixture and pour into the cake lined pan. Sprinkle with nuts. Chill until set or freeze if desired. Cut in squares. Serves 16-20.

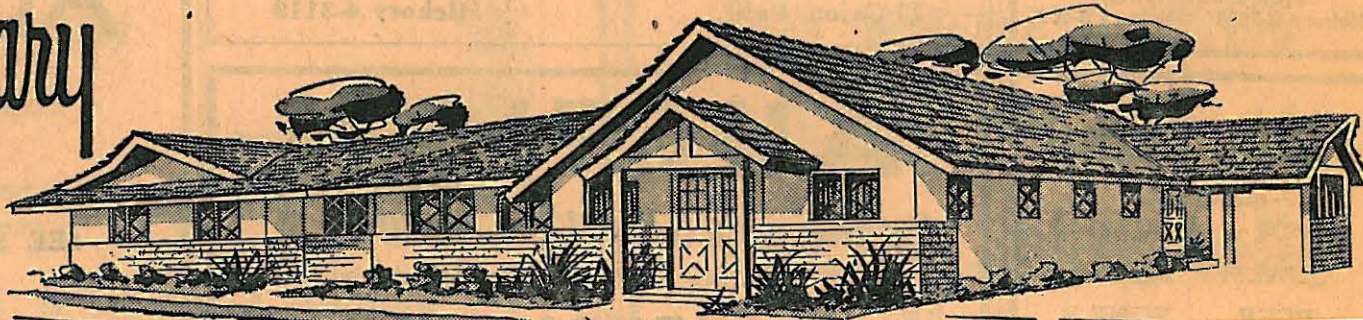

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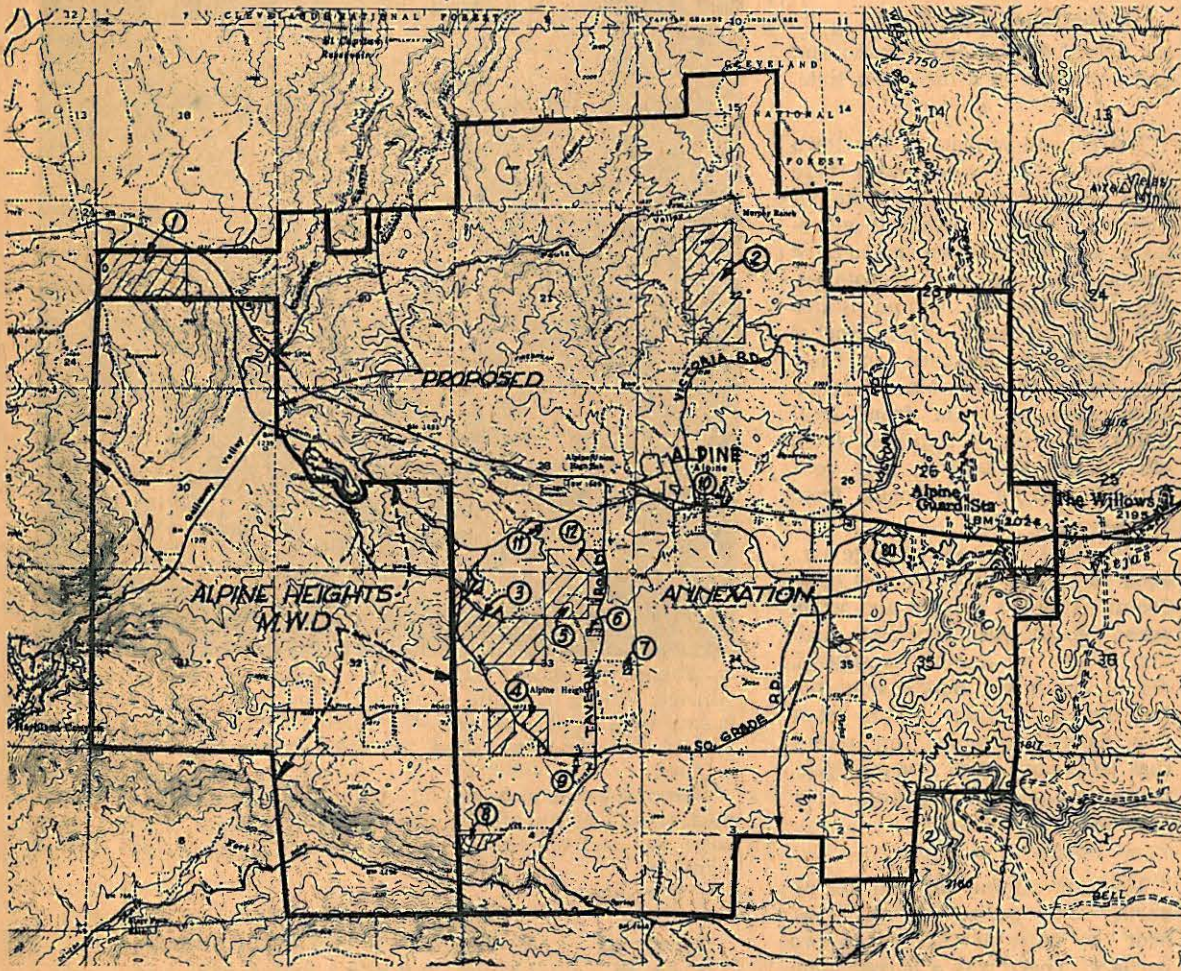

'It's Light Up Time' At Mt. Miguel High School

At a dedication ceremony on October 19, the dreams of the Mt. Miguel Boosters Club will have come true. A switch will be thrown and Mt. Miguel's football field will be lit. This occasion has been long looked forward to, but it didn't happen by chance. This project took long hard hours of work and \$8,000 to complete.

In order for a school's Associated Student Body to function, it must have the gate receipts and concession money from home football; this is the big reason for the lights, because day games would never draw satisfactory crowds. This project would have been far too expensive had it not been for the labor donated by members of the Boosters Club and Mr. Becker, who is a foreman at California Electric Company, and some of his employees. All the money that was raised came through raffles, dances, and talent shows.

More than \$2,000 was donated by merchants in Lemon Grove and Spring Valley. "We've raised in excess of \$10,000 to improve the

athletic facilities," states Mrs. Marti Titmas, Boosters Club president. "With the money raised, the club has planted turf on the football field, bought a \$700 sled nicknamed 'Welbaum's Chariot,' fenced the baseball outfield, and also installed a speaker in the gymnasium." In the near future, the club plans to hear cheers from their newly-built grandstands. All this was accomplished by the Boosters Club, parents whose children have already graduated or are attending Mt. Miguel at the present.

Many of those who have spent their entire weekends on this project have no children, just an intense desire to better our community.

On October 9 a breakfast was given in the Home Economics Patio honoring the Miguel Letter-

man's Club, which is spearheading the sale of the raffle tickets being handled by the Boosters Club. 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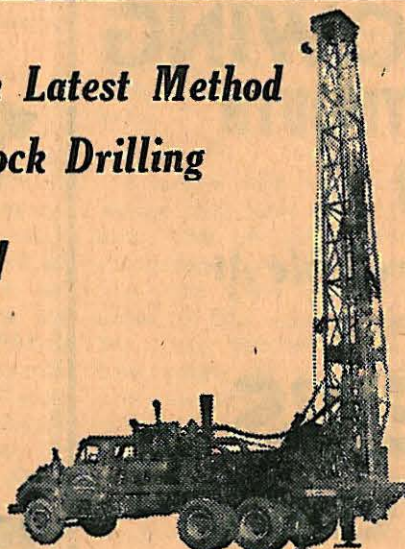
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
