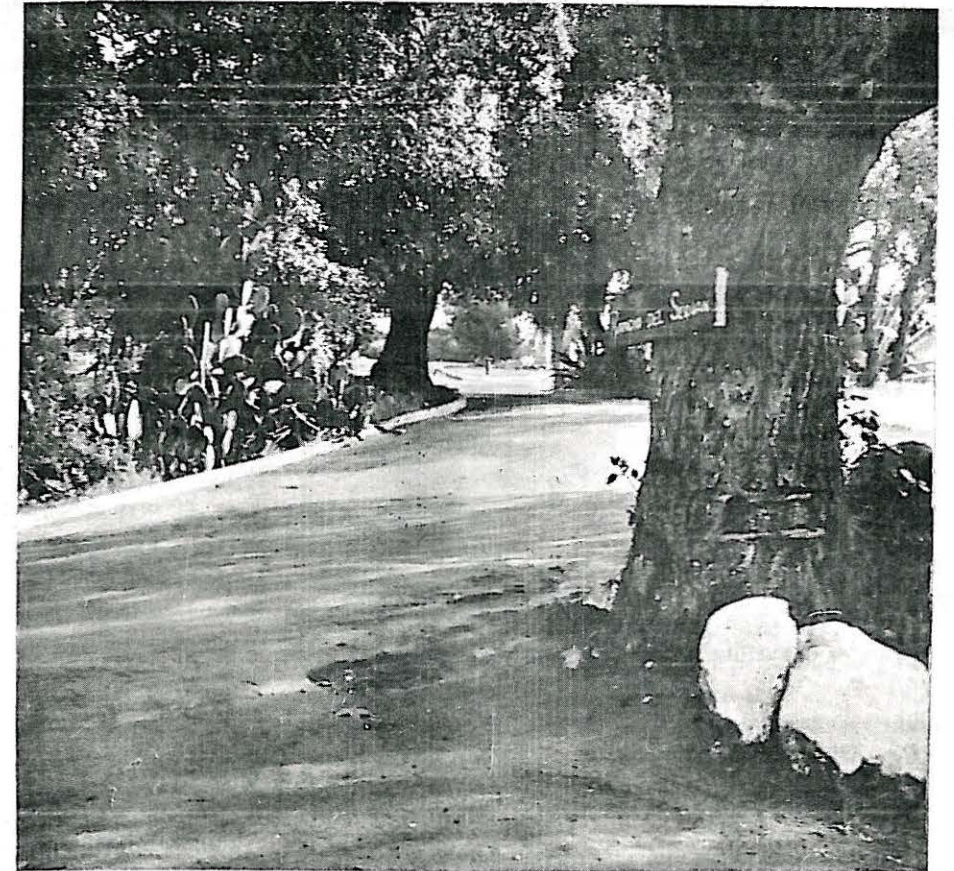

CHAMBER SET TO GO

Alpine's new Chamber of Commerce is almost ready to become an active force in our community. The board of directors have now worked out a simple set of bylaws and all legal papers have been completed and filed. Although the directors know that the businessmen and citizens of Alpine are anxious for action, they have decided that it will be best to delay any public meeting until after the holiday season.

Citizens of Alpine,

This letter concerns all persons in the Alpine area who are interested in the promotion and welfare of the community of Alpine and its trade area. If you are in business, if you own property, or if you reside in Alpine, you are urged to join the Chamber of Commerce

The temporary officers, the board of directors, and approximately 35 charter members believe that this organization is the best way to solve many problems requiring community cooperation. With the prospect of water in the near future and with other problems of a growing community it is necessary that Alpine be represented by a well-organized group that can work out solutions to problems as they arise. None of us can deal effectively with these community matters when we function as individuals but an active Chamber of Commerce can serve as a town council if given the needed support. Although it is true that a Chamber of Commerce is especially interested in business promotion, it should be remembered that the Chamber motto is: "IF IT IS NOT GOOD FOR THE COMMUNITY AS A WHOLE IT IS NOT GOOD FOR BUSINESS."

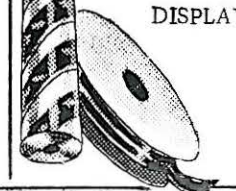

CRAFT CORNER
 by MRS. W. W. MILLER
WAX CRAYON PICTURE: Transfer
 a pattern or picture to the cloth
 using carbon paper if you wish.
 Using wax crayons, make the de-
 sign on the fabric. Place the cray-
 oned material on the ironing board
 with a sheet of wax paper over it
 and press with a hot iron. The heat
 melts the wax and allows the color
 to penetrate the cloth, so that the
 design can be washed safely.

FUNNELS: Cut the end out of a
 liquid detergent can, wash and dry
 thoroughly. Paint and decorate. This
 is a useful thing for Dad in the
 garage or Mom in the kitchen.

CLOTHES SPRINKLER: Paint an
 empty beverage can and decorate
 as you like. Insert a sprinkler head
 and you have a lovely gift.

FROSTED GLASS: Add magnesium
 sulfate (Epson Salts) to a sauce
 pan half-full of boiling water until
 no more will dissolve. Add to this
 solution a few drops of liquid
 glue. Next apply the hot liquid to
 the glass you wish to frost, using a
 small brush. The liquid will begin
 to evaporate almost immediately,
 forming crystals which give the
 glass a frosted appearance.

CANDY OR NUTCAN: Enamel a
 coffee can and cover and let dry
 thoroughly. A handle may be put
 on the lid by putting two small
 holes in the center of the lid and

JUNIOR COLLEGE

SURVEY TO DETERMINE JR. COLLEGE COURSES

Funds from the California Bureau of Business Education and California Technical and Industrial Department will finance a local survey in the spring to determine personnel needs of business and industry which can be met by training in the new junior college now being organized. The survey is part of the effort being made to plan efficiently for the college so that it will better serve the community.

Gardener's Checklist

by the Calif. Assn. of Nurserymen

1. Another planting of ranunculus will keep the succession of bloom going longer next spring. Keep planting them through winter.
2. Deciduous fruit trees can be pruned now. Check with your nurseryman to find out which ones to prune and how much to prune them.
3. The perennial vegetables--artichoke, asparagus, and rhubarb--can be planted this month and next. All three have some ornamental value.
4. Cut dahlias stalks back when the tops dry. Lift and store the clumps of tubers in a dry place. You can divide them in spring.
5. Spring bulbs can still be planted if you can find them. Some nurseries are sold out.

GIFTED STUDENTS PROGRAM

Study of the program for gifted students in the Grossmont Union High School District is continuing under the newly-organized Grossmont District Gifted and Honors Council. 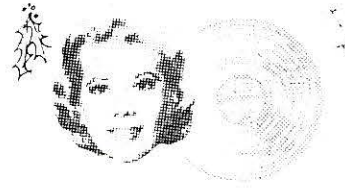
