The Alpine Community Church was organized sixty-six years ago on February 24th, 1894, by a small group of local people meeting in the parsonage, a house still standing on the corner of Tavern Road her parents. and Arnold Way. It is reported by Percy Foss that the church began about ten years before with Sunday School at the School House.

Junior College **Policies Set**

The Grossmont Union High School District Board after a lengthy discussion of statistics on enrollments of students in San Diego Junior College adopted a clarification of its policy statement on the relationship between the proposed junior college and the subject of school district reorganization. The need for the policy statement was explained by Superintendent Lewis F. Smith who said. "Some people believe the high school district stands to gain an advantage for a certain form of school district organization in the future if the junior college is organized before a study of overall school district organization is accomplished." The Board through adoption of this policy has clearly indicated that the junior college issue shall not be introduced as a factor in future consideration of school district organization. The subject of school district organization should be decided on its merits and should not be related to the junior college district issue. The text of the Board statement is as follows:

"The Grossmont Board and administration reaffirm the position. "That the junior college issue should be decided first and separately from the problem of school

district organization. "That school district organization may be best accomplished through mutual understanding and agreement among the affected districts.

El Capitan High School is making plans for a foreign student to attend the school next year. Right now the biggest problem for the committee is finding a home for met one storm in Florida and anthe student. Many could qualify to have the student in their home. but the committee would like to make a few suggestions. They would prefer the student to go to a home where there is a Junior or Senior High School student. Preferably one that is going to El Capitan. One parent has to be home at all times; in other words the home could not be where the mother works.

If the family comes directly from a foreign country they are not eligible, but if you are one generation removed they you are qualified. The family must provide room and board for the student. The foreign student will get \$12.00 a month from American Field Service. The student comes with a full wardrobe so you will not have to provide clothing.

If anyone would like to have a foreign student from South America, who speaks English, in your home, you may contact Mr. Kramer HI 5-2003; Clarence Gillson, HI 5-3769; or Mrs. Al Adams, HI-5-2758. They will get in touch with El Capitan and you will receive an application. The family who is the most qualified to have the student in their home will be picked at a later date.

As the Editor of the Echo I want to clarify our stand on several is-



jamin Arnold. Ministers were supplied by the California Congregation Conference and services were held in the school until the Town Hall was built in 1899. The church was then moved there.

Following Rev. Rogers, who stayed five years, Rev. John Pearson preached from 1899 until 1902. For six years after that the church was left without a regular minister. In 1906 two pastors were engaged to preach on alternate Sundays. Rev. M. Wilson and a Rev. Clark, his first name and initials have been lost.

In 1915, a Rev. Arthur Peebles inherited the church and kept up the work for five years. In 1928 they formally named the church, THE ALPINE COMMUNITY CHURCH. Reverend Wm. Fuller began preaching in 1929, and the land was purchased on Victoria Drive for the church site. They built a chapel with the name of

Two more ministers came, Dr. William I. Jones and Rev. Fred Line, then Dr. Roger Larson, the present minister, came in 1948. Since Dr. Larson has been the minister the new church was built, it was completed on September 20, 1953.

Alpine Community Church is very proud of their new church and rightly so, and they have made their church very active and useful. Aside from the regular church service the Community Church has a part in the Church Guild, which was started in 1931, and has Mrs. Edward Nixon as the present president. Naturally, the Community Church has a Sunday School with Mrs. Phyllis Shepard as the superintendent.

The year the new church was built, 1953, was also a year for other new things in the church. The Christmas play was put on the first time, coffee hour and the family dinners were also started in that year.

In 1946 Pilgrim Fellowship was started and in 1949 the Vacation Bible School was held for the first time. Others groups that the church sponsors are the Girl Scouts, Brownies, and the Cub
