Language Lab. to Open

The language lab at El Capitan will be-
gin operation within the new few weeks.
It was built at a cost of \$15,000 and is
analogous to the language laboratory
facilities at Grossmont High School.

All the foreign language classes, Rus-
sian, Spanish, French, and German, will
utilize the lab. It is designed to accom-
modate approximately 35 students which
will be the maximum.

The main purpose of the lab is to en-
courage more oral practice which a stud-
ent cannot acquire within the classroom.
His voice will be recorded on tapes that
may be played back so that he may rec-
ognize his own mistakes and will be able
to correct his errors and improve his
work.

GARDENER'S CHECKLIST

1. Wiserosarians will be out these days watching new growth in the rose garden. Aphids are the main thing to look for. Shoot them down before they get a foothold.
2. Feeding Camellias is a post-bloom item on your gardener's checklist. Liquid Fish and an acid-type commercial fertilizer and iron chaelates are all used.
3. Weed flower beds to conserve moisture and preserve appearance.
4. Feed lawns under trees an extra helping of food to help them overcome competition from the tree roots.
5. A container planting for the desk makes an unusual and welcome gift. They'll be at their best when weather's best if you plant them now.

JUVENILES?

I'm tired of hearing about juveniles as though our young people were some kind of a sub-human species. Young people today are just people, a little confused some times, irritating to their elders at times but just people. Like people everywhere they want to be their own masters and like youth throughout the ages they resent being treated like children and they struggle to break away from the patronage and dominance of their parents. Sometimes the process is rough. Often youth is careless and inconsiderate, but today's youth is no worse than youth has always been. In fact they are probably better.

Every person who has passed 30 can remember things he did that would have called for public rebuke or punishment if he had been caught. I can well remember when the approach of Halloween heralded the opening of a month long seige of vandalism varying from relatively harmless window soaping and door bell ringing to destruction of houses and even crops. I remember one year when the kids near my home hauled away a whole truck load of watermelons from a disliked farmer's patch. Another time they soaped the rails of an interurban line; then set wooden benches across the tracks.

The real responsibility for the problems among juveniles is to be found in our wholly unnatural demands upon them. When a girl is about fifteen she is usually physically mature and most boys are acceptable to the Army or Navy at seventeen.

In most societies young people from thirteen onward are progressively carrying more and more adult responsibility and the years from puberty to physical maturity are years when the youth is challenged to prove his man or womanhood. Nature has prepared youth to throw off parental authority at this time and stand alone and in some way every youth will try to do so.

Our society, for all its pious protests defies the laws of nature and of nature's God. We keep our youth in a sort of prolonged childhood. We refuse to permit them to have a real part in the world of work and sweat. We delay marriage when nature has prepared youth for marriage.

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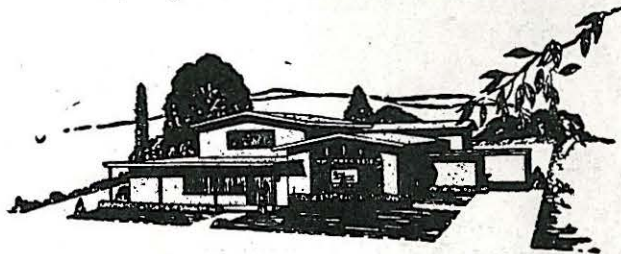
