## JR. COLLEGE ELECTION

Initial enrollment of 409 seniors and 1250 adults at a local community junior college if one is authorized through an election scheduled for next November was indicated in a report submitted to the Grossmont Union High School District Board of Trustees.

In presenting the results of questionnaires answered by members of graduating classes in five high schools and by 2/3 of those enrolled in adult education classes in the Grossmont District, Superintendent Lewis Smith said, "While these results are not conclusive, there is every indication of sufficient enrollment to provide a strong instructional program right from the start of operations. Earlier estimates had indicated a beginning enrollment of 500 full time students.

The program of the school in its first two years would probably emphasize lower division college courses for students intending to transfer to a regular four year college or university as well as terminal vocational courses in the business education field for both seniors and adults.

## MILITARY APPOINTMENTS

Congressman Bob Wilson (R, San Diego)  
today announced that all young men inter-  
ested in attending the United States mili-  
tary Academy at West Point, the Naval  
Academy at Annapolis, or the Air Force  
Academy at Colorado Springs, should write  
him immediately.

To be eligible for an appointment to  
the class entering in the summer of 1961,  
the young man must have graduated from  
high school prior to the date of entry and  
be under 22 years of age.

Nominations to the Academies will be  
announced in January, 1961. Those nom-  
inated who pass the required physical and  
mental examinations will begin their  
first year that summer.

The first Civil Service competitive  
examinations will be given in early July  
in San Diego. This is a special written  
examination prepared by and administered  
under the auspices of the United States  
Civil Service Commission. The examina-  
tion is to provide an objective testing  
method which will aid in the selection of  
nominees.

The Civil Service examination consists  
of three parts: (1) vocabulary and reading,  
(2) ability to recognize three dimensional  
figures from flat drawings, and (3) algebra.

### PAMPER

LAWNS LOVE TO BE PAMPERED

The perfect carpet of green is no accident. It doesn't just happen that one man's lawn is ragged and worn while his neighbor's looks so inviting. That neighbor, whoever he is, has been hard at it, giving his lawn the attention it loves.

The secret of lawn care is to keep at it. A little effort frequently applied goes farther than the big effort at infrequent intervals. Watering with modern sprinklers and soakers is easy. A lawn that lacks sufficient water is doomed in California's long, dry summer. Light monthly feedings will keep the grass growing and frequent mowing will keep it from matting.

If your lawn shows the ravages of time, a trick that usually works is to rough it up with a renovator (a good stiff rake will do). Then, cut it close, rake again, and cut for second time. Correct irregularities in the contour by filling in with topsoil and reseeding the entire area. Over this, spread some steer manure and then water with a fine spray. Keep constantly moist, even after the seed has sprouted. New gras is susceptible to drying out, and will succumb to drought quickly.

## Gardener's Checklist

1. As June advances, keep a lookout for the first sign of mildew in tuberous begonias. If it shows up, your nurseryman can recommend a spray that is especially effective for begonias.
2. Now through summer is the time to watch lawns for evidence of lawn moth.
3. Pinch back some of the tips of fuchsias to encourage bushy growth. Feed them with liquid fish at least once monthly for best results.
4. Stake and tie delphinium plants. Nothing detracts from these heavenly blue beauties as much as broken stalks and drooping flower spikes.

5. Herbs are available at your C. A. N. nursery. To enhance the flavor of any food --- especially for our California barbecues --- there's nothing to compare with garden-fresh herbs.

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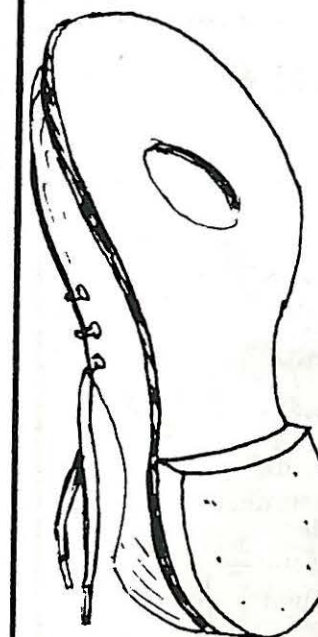
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
