### Gardener's Checklist

by the Calif. Association of Nurserymen 1. Look hard for any new signs of aphis and other pests in rose beds. Spray for them only during windless intervals, however.

- 2. Try training tomatoes on a sunny fence or garage wall. You'll be surprised at the crop you get from a few plants.
- Constant pinching of new growth on fuchsias forces bushy side growth and added new wood to carry blooms.
- 4. Give camellias and other acid-loving plants a followup feeding with an acid plant food this =
- plant food this month. Three post-bloom feedings at monthly intervals is par for these shrubs.
- 3. Feed roses again when the first big flush of bloom is gone.
- 4. Brighten dull spots in the garden with gallon-can size Marguerites in full bloom. They like sun and need little care when established.
- 5. Set out bedding annuals for summer to fall color.


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
