The memorial honors a pioneer family of this area. William Edward Ellis, a retired rancher now living in Whittier, was born March 18, 1878. His birthplace was about midway between the present Ranger Station and Perkins' Store in Descanso. His wife, Clara, was born in San Diego February 23, 1889.

Mr. Ellis spent fifteen years with the State Highway maintenance division, and it was during this time that he was responsible for the excellent stone work at site of the wayside rest. He states that the stone walls were built about 1930.

The Ellis' have three children; Gordon Ellis lives in San Diego and is with the State Highway Department; Mrs. Glen Cheeseman of Whittler; and Mrs. Gertrude Dougal of Newhall. They also have four grandchildren.

Mr. Ellis' father was a sailor from Norway who came to California in the days of the gold tush. He operated a Stage Coach Station at Coyote Wells in the 1860s and came to the Descanso area about 1867. His mother was born in San Juan Capistrano, and her parents later owned a ranch in the Descanso area. Although they were ranchers most of their lifetime, they owned and operated the then-famous "Ellis Ranch Resort" from about 1900 to 1920.

PRAYER

For those who believe in prayer it is a great source of personal comfort and strength. There are many however who cannot really pray because they do not really believe their prayers have any meaning. Your Legislator At Work

It's been obvious for a long time that autos are still clogging our California highways despite all our progress in building new freeways. It's been equally obvious that California courts have been just as badly clogged by suits caused by mishaps occurring in the operation of those same autos. Every car owner and rider has a big stake in efforts to break this logiam in the courts in such a way as to give equal justice to all parties concerned.

A recent suggestion is that a new com-

mission, similar to the industrial accident commission, be set up to decide the issues and make awards in disputed auto accident cases, thus keeping most of them out of the Courts. The industrial accident commission is the semi-judicial body which decides disputed cases under the workmen's compensation law, and its decisions can be appealed only to district courts of appeal or higher courts. Under the law, full medical care and specified monetary awards are granted in all indistrial accident or death cases. Most cases are handled automatically on the bas of previous commission decisions. The proposed auto accidnet commission would function along similar lines. It is hoped that improving the machinery by which accident cases are decided will do something to alleviate the harsh results of the existing system.

Groups interested in auto accident litigation have been invited by the committee to name representatives on an advisory group to assist in its work. Insurance carriers, automobile clubs, safety groups, the state bar association and the judicial council, to name only a few, are all cooperating.

Gardener's Checklist

by Calif. Assn. of Nurserymen

- 1. June is an ideal month to put in dichondra, because this dense ground-cover thrives in heat. For quickest coverage, buy dichondra in flats and divide into small clumps.
- 2. Fuchsias planted now in hanging baskets will provide decorative relief this summer for porches and patios. Two or three plants to a basket offer best show of color.
- 3. Remove side branches from tomato plants to conserve plant strength for the fruit on main stem.
- 4. Cut of the old flowering spikes of delphinium, and they'll bloom again in the fall.
- fi. Cushion chrysanthemums planted now (from flats) will make a low-growing, early-blooming, gay summer to fall border. Keep the new plants well-watered and shaded from hottest sun until established
