The usual two Sunday morning worship services will continue throughout the summer, 9:45 and 11 A.M., with several guest speakers serving in Dr. Larson's absence.



#### Congress of the United States House of Representatives

GREETINGS FROM YOUR CONGRESSMAN In looking back on the session, we can be tremendously grateful for the treatment accorded San Diego by the 86th Congress.

One of the most far-reaching items that won final approval this year was the funding of the dredging program for Forrestal class aircraft carriers. This is a 4 1/2 million dollar item to dredge the harbor deep enough for the largest ships afloat. This will mean increased commercial potential as well as the more obvious military advantage of being able to home port the newest supercarriers. An added benefit will be extra land fill on the waterfront opposite Lindberge Field.

The submarine pier out beyond Ballast Point was approved and funded, after a legislative hassle that looked pretty serious for a while. This pier will serve to tie down the submarine squadrons now moored in the main channel of the harbor.

Seawater plant off again on again: After a rather disappointing move by the Interfor Department to look elsewhere for a site for the saline water conversion plant that had been assigned to San Diego, we appealed to Secretary Seaton for reconsideration. A firm decision was finally made to stick to Point Loma, come Anything or High Water. There is still a remote possibility that the Atomic Energy. Commission can come up with an acceptable reactor that will meet Navy tolerance specifications. But despite what decision develops on this aspect, the plant will stay in San Diego. That's for sure! Regular power sources can be used just as well as atomic energy, the experts say. The important thing is to get the plant built and to try out the process to see if this is indeed the answer to Southern California's water problem.

Judicial bill still alive: My bill to create a new judicial district for San Diego and Imperial counties almost got acted upon closing night, until Congress ran out of steam. It is included in the judgeship bill which will be brought up when we return in August. This will give tremendous stature to San Diego as no new judicial districts have been created since the twenties. Our importance as a center of Federal activity was the most telling argument we used in getting this through the Judiciary Committee. Much credit is

in some of our coastal climates. Don't shy away from them if you garden in a fog belt, however, since the foliage itself is worth growing for screens and hedges.

At their best, oleanders are real eyecatchers. They are best used in hedgerows, along a drive or fronting the road on a country property. Their value as single specimen shrubs, however, is traditional to California, and the many different varieties enhance their worth for this use.

If pink is your color, try Pink Beauty or Seely Pink, both of them large singles in good clear pink. Mrs. Roeding is a salmon pink oleander with double flowers—very popular. The best white is Sister Agnes, a Page 7 ALPINE ECHO JULY 28, 1960

single, while the reds include Compte Barthelmy, a double, and Jannoch, a single. The rose-red oleander that gets such a big play in allareas is the single variety, Cherry Ripe.

To a variety they are all robust bloomers, even under drought conditions. So pick your favorite colors and plant them in full knowledge that your investment will pay a maximum dividend with a minimum of attention. Botanically, oleanders are Nerium oleander.



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#### Gardener's Checklist

by the California Assn. of Nurserymen

- 1. Annuals are the answer to post-vacation bare spots in the garden. Many are already a-bloom in nursery flats.
- 2. If you leave your garden in a friend's care, simplify his watering chores by moving all potted and tubbed plants to
- 3. Dig early-blooming gladiolus when tops dry off. Cut off the dead stalks and dust the corms with insecticide before storing in a cool, dry place.
- 4. Set out stocks now for fall and winter bloom.
- 5. Select and set out bearded iris this month. Give them sun-full time in coastal areas, at least half-time inland.
