

by California Assn. of Nurserymen 1. You can get a lot of mileage from such lesser bulbs as hyacinth and muscari. Plant them in drifts or groups for the best effect. 2. Gourmets can still plant vegetables for winter harvest. Many are available in flats from your nurseryman.

3. Uproot old or unwanted roses to make way for new varieties coming next month. Dig steer manure into the soil where you remove such plants.

4.Fall feeding keeps many lawns greener over the winter than gardeners seem to realize. Feed regularly (4 times a year).

5. Baiting for snails and slugs should be continued. There's no simpler guarantee against their marauding.

REPORT CARDS MODERNIZED Report cards of students in the Grossmont Union High School District will, for the first time, be done by data processing. The first guarter ends November 10, and while the grading system of A, B, C, D, F, plust citizenship grades in effort and conduct remain the same, the marking and mailing of the card will all be done by machine. Gards will be mailed first class, and parents are urged to report a change of address to the school at once. As the new system goes into use, parents will find report cards will reach them as long as two weeks after the end of the quarter. As the routine is perfected, the time lag will grow shorter and shorter.

The teachers will mark an individual grade card for each student. The machine will sort these, assemble them, and print a complete report card from them for each student.

A citizenship grade will be printed by number. Number 1 stands for "outstanding"; 2, "Satisfactory"; 3, "unsatisfactory". The new system also presents, for the first time, a report to the parent on the student's attendance for each school month. This has also been recorded by data processing.

The new system eliminates the previously used practice of having the student carry his card from class to class on grade day for the teacher to write in the grade.

CRAFT CORNER

by MRS. W.W. MILLER JEWELRY MAY GROW ON TREES: Gather 25 or 30 small, firm cones of graduated sizes. Use a fine bit to drill a hole horizontally near

the stem end of each cone. Then spray or use a water color brush to coat each with clear shellac. Spread them on a sheet of waxed paper in before shellacking or for the holiday an airy place to dry. Allow plenty of time for thorough drying, then thread the cones in graduated order on a length of brown satin ribbon. Tie with a bow around the neck. Very tiny pine cones can be glued to brooch or earring backs purchased from the dimestore or hobby shop. Variations can be achieved by

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P. 6, ALPINE ECHO, Nov. 10, 1960 touching the cones here and there with bright lacquer or nail polish season, use colored ribbon and frost the finished cones with gilt or aluminum paint, or roll them lightly in glitter dust.

FANS: Trace two circles on heavy paper, using a saucer, etc., as a guide cut out and draw designs on each circle. Color the design using crayons, etc. Spread paste on the back of one circle. Place a tongue depressor or a flat stick on the pasted circle leaving 2 inches of the stick protruding for a handle. Place the fan under a heavy weight until dry.

KEY RING: Material - Masonite 2 3/8 inch by 1 1/2 inch enamels. Drill a hole 3/8 inch at the center of the short side of the masonite. Draw on design and enamel. When dry apply 2 coats of varnish. COOLE SUN HATS: Materialwallpaper or heavy wrapping paper,

raffia, cord or ribbon, 4 gummed reinforcement stickers, shellac, paste. Cut out a 10 inch circle. Make a slit from the outside edge to the center. Draw on design and paint. Overlap slit edge and paste in place. Try on hat before pasting to get the correct fit. Six inches from the edge of either side punch a hole and strengthen inside and outside with reinforcements. Shellac the hat with thinned shellac. Use 3 to 5 coats. Insert raffia, cord, or ribbon one in each hole.


