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WATER

DISTRIBUTION OF WATER At its last meeting the Board of Directors of Rio San Diego Municipal Water District passed a resolution to change its policy regarding the distribution of water. The resolution stated that "This District will distribute and provide retail water service to any area within its boundaries where such service is feasible and provided substantial evidence is given the District that the people of the area desire such service."

It further stated that "The resolution is not to be construed as an indication of this District's desire to provide retail service in any area in which such water service is not desired."

At the same meeting the Board instructed its staff to prepare details of the necessary steps preliminary to forming an Improvement District for distribution of water to the Alpine, Mt. Top, Harbison Canyon, Dehesa and Flinn Springs areas. This report will be due December 13, 1960.

MOVIE AT KIWANIS



CRAFT CORNER

by MRS. W.W.MILLER I wish to make a correction in the bath salts idea that was in my column October 20, 1960.

Epson salts into small jars. Put in a few drops of food coloring and shake well. Add a few drops of perfume and let stand several weeks. THREAD WHEEL: Mold an oval base of plaster of Paris, while still soft, insert five small dowels, spaced little colored rocks or shells pressed into the plaster will add interest. 3. It's early to prune deciduous trees and shrubs. Best wait until they are completely dormant (in December and January).




> 5. Lift and pot or tub azaleas as they come into bloom, if you would have them in close where you can see them.



Of course, unforeseen accidents do happen but when they do the good neighbor should not only find his animals but should also repair the damage they have done and pay for all they have destroyed.




