## HUNTING REGULATIONS



### ATTENTION MR. HUNTER:

The 24th day of September, 1960, marks the opening of Deer Season here in San Diego County. With your cooperation we can make this another fire-free hunting season. This can be accomplished only if you abide by the following suggestions and regulations:

1. All hunters must register. This can be done at any of the Forest Service Stations or Deer Check Stations.
2. Campfire permits may be obtained at no charge from any Forest Officer and at all Forest Service Stations or Deer Check Stations.
3. Camping is permitted only at designated campgrounds or in the special hunter camps set up during the Deer Season. Portable gasoline or butane stoves may be used in addition to the enclosed stoves provided by the Forest Service in the regular Hunter Camps and campgrounds. Portable barbecues may be used only in the regular campgrounds. NOT IN THE HUNTER CAMPS.
4. Wood fires are permitted only in the enclosed stoves provided by the Forest Service located within the camp areas. OPEN FIRES ARE ALWAYS PROHIBITED.
5. Smoking is prohibited in all brush covered areas. Smoke only in approved camping areas, Fag Stations, or in places of habitation.
6. District Maps will be handed out at the time of registration showing all areas closed to entry due to the extreme fire hazard as well as the areas closed to shooting. The location of all Hunter Camps, Check Stations, and approved Camp Grounds will also be shown.
7. Garbage pits or trash cans are provided at each camp. Use them and leave a clean camp. We are still in an extremely difficult fire season, and with your assistance and cooperation we are sure we can have another fire-free hunting season.

### HUNTING REGULATIONS EXPLAINED

Prior to the hunting season which opens Saturday, a meeting will be held tomorrow, Friday, September 23, 10 A. M. to explain the regulations concerning hunters and hunting. These will include laws and regulations regarding closed areas, smoking, trespassing, registration, and campfires. Ranchers living within the forest; representatives of hunters groups have been especially invited to this meeting at the Descanso Ranger Station. Representatives of the U. S. Forest Service, Sheriff's Office, State Division of Forestry, Dept. of Fish and Game will be on hand to explain the functions of their departments.

## Gardener's Checklist

by California Assn. of Nurserymen

1. Bedding plants for winter color are now available in nurseries. Calendula, pansy, viola, stock and snapdragons head the list.
2. Spring flowering bulbs can be potted up for some portable color. Be sure to keep them in a dark, cool place to insure good root growth before the tops push up.
3. Set out California's native Christmas Berry (Photinia) now. Its bring berries this Christmas will be a prelude to much more of the same in future years.
4. Dig faded gladiolus as the tops turn yellow. Cut off tops about an inch or less

**WINTER COLOR TO SPARE  
FROM SWEET PEAS**

To list all of the benefits of gardening in California would take a volume, no less. But one of our chief assets is the color we get in the dead of winter. While on Easterner dreams of it, we depend on it--and what a difference that is.

Perhaps the contrast is most sharply drawn in our ability to grow early flowering sweet peas and be cutting their masses of bloom by Christmas. We can do this almost invariably in mild-winter areas; and, given a good fall, we can often do it where winters are less mild.

The first thing to know about growing sweet peas for winter is that you should plant them now, without delay. Wait much longer and an early spell of cold weather could stop your color show until nearly spring.

The second thing to know is that you MUST plant early flowering sweet peas. Your nurseryman will steer you clear here, so be sure to ask him.

After this, the normal cultural rules

apply. Sweet peas like a free and easy root run, so the ground should be well prepared. This can best be assured by digging a trench 12 inches or more deep and to a shovel's width at least. This really takes little time compared to the rewards it pays.

Once the trench is dug, layer a good thickness of manure on the bottom--six inches is not too much. Then add about three inches of soil and sow the seed. By this time, your trench will still be some three to six inches deep, depending on how deep you dug originally. As the young plants sprout and grow, fill in around them with topsoil until the trench is nearly at ground level.

Some birds seem to have a passion for sprouting sweet peas, so protect the young plants with a cover of wire mesh or chicken wire until they've hardened off enough to lose their appeal. Chicken wire also makes a good trellis for the plants to climb up on. When sweet peas reach the cutting stage, don't spare the shears. The more you cut, the more them bloom. What a pleasant outlook.

#### CRAFT CORNER

**FLASHLIGHT GOBLINS:** Cut off the upper portion of a round cereal box, leaving a 4 inch section. On the bottom of the box, draw a circle the same diameter as the barrel of your flashlight. Divide this circle into about twelve sections, punch through the center and cut to the edge of the circle along each line. Cover the box by gluing plain wrapping paper on it, then glue orange crepe paper on top of that. On the box lid, draw your jack-o-lantern (or other figure) and cut out the eyes, nose, and mouth. Cut a circle of crepe paper that is just a bit larger than the box lid and glue it to the lid, folding the edges over the side. Add another strip of crepe paper around the rim for contrasting decoration. Push your flashlight through the hole in the box bottom. Tape the barrel of the flashlight to the flaps with Scotch tape, cutting away the flap where the flashlight switch comes out. Now fit your cover in place.

**FOIL FACES:** Mold foil over the face and head. Reinforce inside of mask with tape. Then cut eyes, nose, and mouth opening. Decorate with colored tapes or drip colored candle wax over mask.

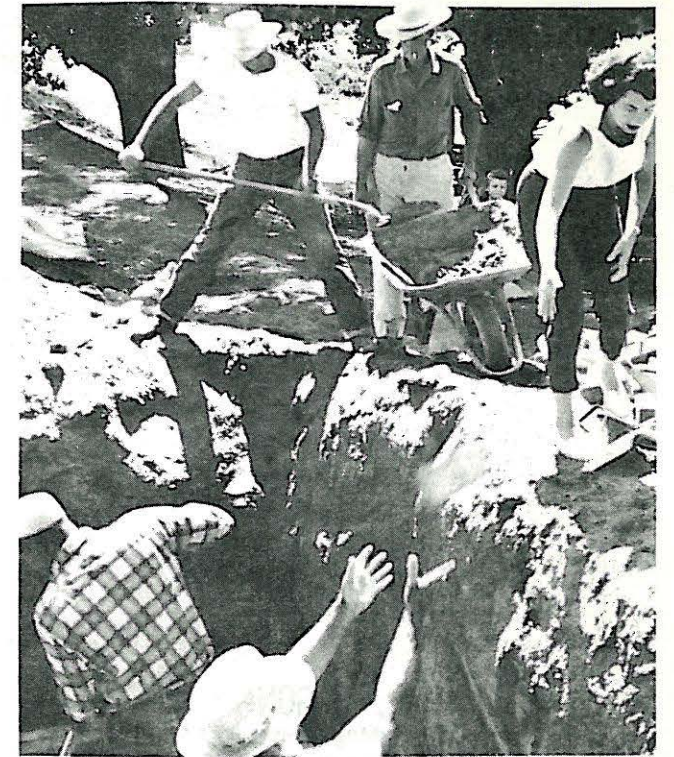
**WINDOW DECORATION:** Materials: two paper plates, black crepe paper. Cut out eyes, nose, and mouth from one paper plate. On a piece of paper the shape of a T color two round eyes and cut a square of red paper. Put a small hole in the corner of the red square and a hole in the T between the eyes. Now fit the T over the eyes in the paper plate and the red square over the mouth. Tie red square to T with thread. The T will stick out of the top of the face making a tab to hang it with. Glue the two paper plates together. Gather the crepe paper in the center and glue to top of plates for hair. When hung the eyes and tongue will move.

**HELPFUL HINTS:** Ink can be erased from paper easily and quickly using commercial liquid bleach. Dip a cloth in the bleach, dab it gently over the area being erased and blot. Repeat the process until the ink disappears.
