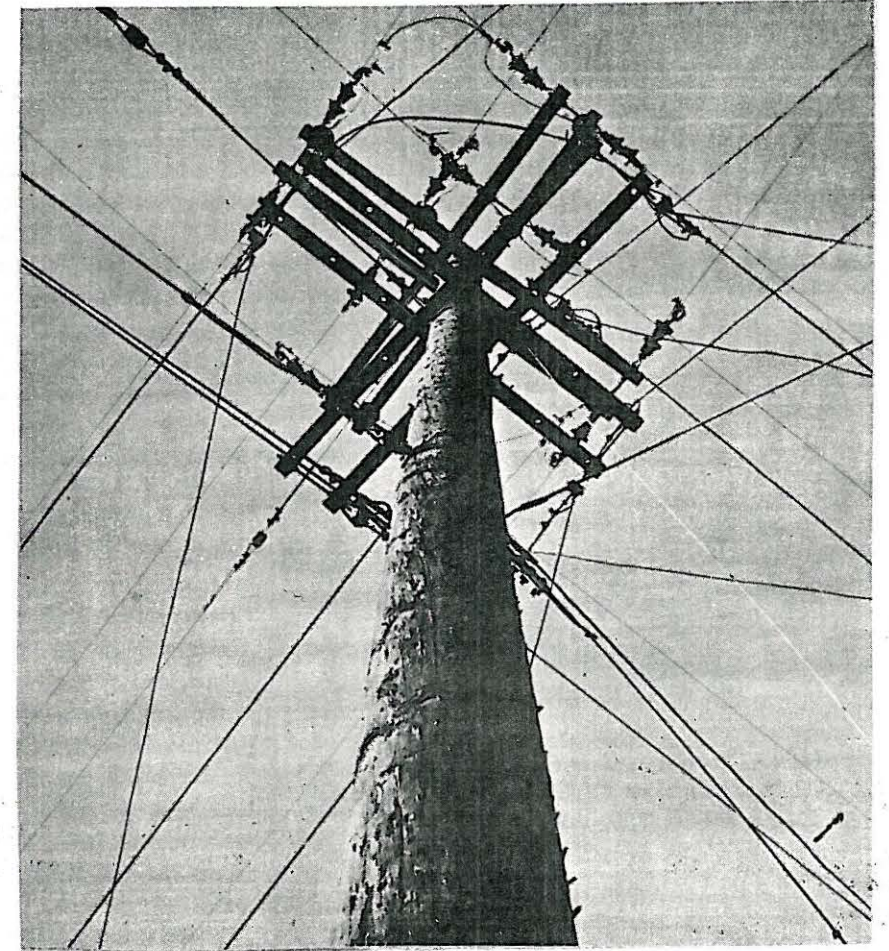

WATER COMING SOON

If you want and need water you will have an opportunity to get it SOON. The Rio Municipal Water District has now completed engineering studies and at its board meeting on Tuesday, Jan. 10, proposals for a bond issue to build a pipe line, pumping stations and other facilities were discussed by the board.

Details of this proposal along with a discussion of various parts of the plan will be presented in next week's ECHO.

However, the main points are these: Under this plan the bond issue proposal is moderate in size (\$3,000,000). However, this is to be the LAST bond issue.

The ONE bond issue will build the main facilities AND provide a fund to be used for distribution mains. The fund will be replenished from monies derived from connection charges as users hook up.
