QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT THE

WATER PLANS

QUESTION: Why do we have to pay a connection ice when we have voted bonds?

ANSWER: The connection fee plan makes it possible to install the entire system and to provide for growth of the system with ONLY ONE BOND ISSUE. Without the connection fee the district would have to have either a HUGE bond issue to pay for everything at once or have a series of little bond issues for each distribution

OUESTION: Is the connection fee fair?

ANSWER: The combination of bonds and connection fees is one of the most fair plans possible Under this plan all benefit some because the value of every property is increased by being in the district and having water available. For this reason all pay some taxes which go to pay interest and principal on the bonds.

However, those who use water benefit the most and only those who use water pay the connection fee or pay for water.

QUESTION: What will the connection fee pay for?

ANSWER: The connection fee pays for three things: First, \$125. of the connection fee pays for a meter, lead in line to your property line and the saddle with which the lead in line is connectioned to the distribution main.

Second, \$250. of the connection fee is used to pay the users share of the distribution system. In order to avoid giving preference to those lucky enough to be on a "trunk line", this fee is the same for all whether they hook to a main trunk line or to a distrubtion main.

Third: The remainder of the connection fee is used to retire bonds issued to provide the funds for trunk lines, reservoirs and pumping stations.

QUESTION: Why isn't the connecting fee the same for everyone?

ANSWER: Most of the connection fee IS the

same for everyone. Everyone who needs a meter is charged the same and the distribution system will cost the same. In those cases where people on small mutual systems already have adequate meters and lead ins a fair allowance will be made IF the meters and lead ins are adequate. Allowances will also be made where a district has a good system of modern distribution mains. The better the equipment the greater the allow-

QUESTION: Is there any other reason for the connection fee to be more for some than for

ANSWER: Yes. The part of the connection fee that is used for the retirement of bonds is greater at the higher levels than at the low levels. The area around Flinn Springs below 1000 feet requires only one stage of pumping and one resevoir. Therefore their share of the cost is smaller and only \$60, is charged to each connection fee to retire the bonds. Their total connection fee is \$435. The second level, from 1000 to 1400 feet, requires two levels of pumping and two levels of reservoirs as well as more pipelines. For this reason the second level bears a greater share of the cost and \$80. is charged to each connection fee to retire the bonds. This makes their connection fee larger than that for the lowest level

In a like manner the highest level has the highest level has the highest costs and the highest connection fee.

QUESTION: Does everyone pay a connection fee?

ANSWER: Yes. Every person who uses water pays his share. Since all must pay for their share of the bond retirement and for at least some pipe to bring water to their district even those with new water meters on new distribution mains will pay a connection fee.
