1. Prune spring flowering deciduous shrubs after they finish blooming--or while they are blooming if you want the color in your home.

2. Watch new growth on roses for aphids. For best control, start spraying as soon as new growth appears.

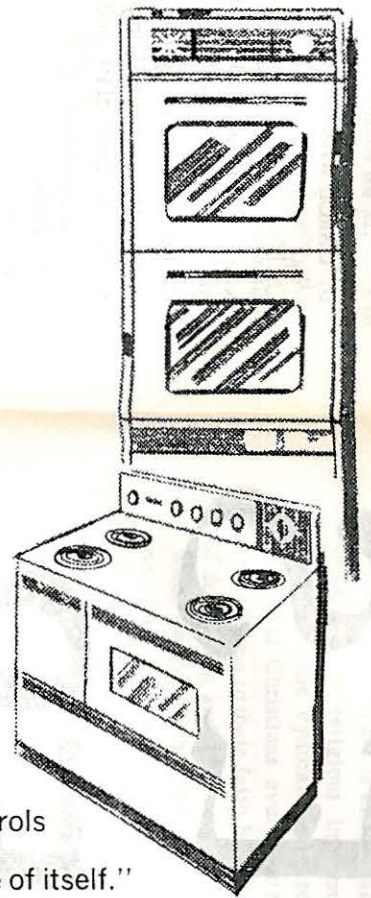

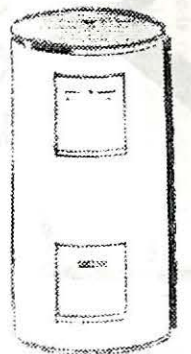

## MIRACLE OF HEALING

During Lent there is always an awakening of religious interest and even the cynical begin to wonder as Christians everywhere bear witness to their faith by acts of dedication and devotion.

When we look at the life of Jesus one thing that always puzzles men is the miracles of healing that we find recorded in the Gospel Stories. To men of today it seems incredible that the natural laws should be set aside and many who are quite willing to accept Christian teachings find themselves unable to believe these stories. Actually it is not too difficult.

As all the Gospel stories were recorded some years after the events took place by people who had not seen the events, but only had heard about them from others it is possible that some of the details may have been lost or exaggerated. But it is hardly possible to doubt that something unusual did happen. Certainly some acts of healing must have taken place for the number of events recorded and the repetition by the several authors of the Gospels indicates a common acceptance and knowledge of these great acts of faith healing. Besides this there are many acts of faith healing both in non-Christian groups and in the acts of certain evangelists and the events at some religious shrines. Impartial investigation must reveal that cures are effected by faith healers. Fair reports indicate that cures do take place at several shrines and some of the cures are miraculous in nature.

That such faith healing was performed by Jesus and that true to His promise men who believe have been able to heal even today can mean only one thing in our lives. Most of us are missing a great power in our own lives by the fact that we have only a lukewarm faith.

## IT'S NOW OR NEVER ON BARE-ROOT PLANTING

Time is running out on the bare-root planting season in California. Within a week or two, members of the California Association of Nurserymen will begin putting their dormant shrubs and trees into gallon or five gallon cans--an operation that takes time and adds some to the cost of what you buy. All of which means that if you, the gardener, have put off plans to set out roses, fruit trees, deciduous flowering shrubs and the like, you'd best shake yourself into action this week or next.

By having waited this long, of course, you run the risk of finding the rose you wanted out of stock. For every good rose that's sold out, however, there are others equally good to be found a-waiting. This year's All-American rose selections--the salmon pink Duet and the more delicately shaded Pink Parfait--received a lot of fanfare and may be hard to find at this late date. But you can still find other good new ones, and the likes of Peace, Charlotte Armstrong, Tiffany and Queen Elizabeth are just as nice today as when they won All-American honors.

For the gardener who has no fruit trees in his garden, we can't urge too strongly that he find out just what he's missing. Chat with your local nurseryman and see what varieties of what fruit will do well in your neighborhood. Then get a move on and plant them. What with such space-saving gimmicks as dwarf trees, three varieties on one rootstock

and three to a single planting hole, you can have a genuine orchard in a minimum of space.

Shade trees for the most part are of the deciduous class which you can still find bare-root in March. Sycamores, Fruitless Mulberry, Poplars, Sweet Gum and others should be planted before they are put into five gallon cans. While they won't give you much shade for a while, they'll at least get off to a faster start than if you wait until next month to plant them.

If you are interested in the shade trees mentioned above, look for them by the following botanical names: Sycamore, Platanus; Fruitless Mulberry, Morus alba; Poplar, populus; Sweet Gum, liquidamber styraciflua.

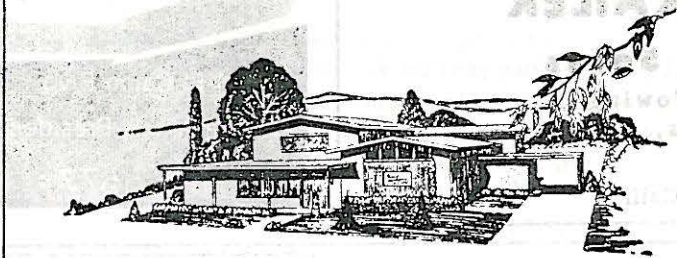
