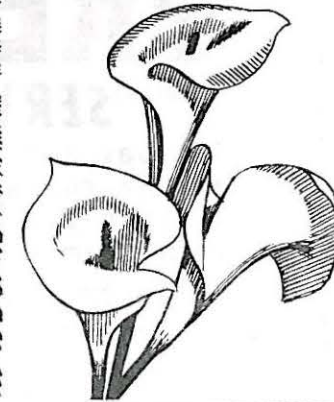

Gardener's Checklist

1. Primrose push up taller stems and larger flowers when fertilized in the spring.
2. Begonia tubers started in flats may be transplanted when they have about three inches of top growth.
3. Dahlias may be planted from now into May. Be sure to set the stake at the time you plant. It might injure the tuber if driven in later.
4. Feed Azaleas and Camellias when they've finished blooming. Use a special acid plant food and supplement it later with liquid fish.

TOUR OF SCHOOLS

On Monday, March 20, staff members of the Alpine Schools, the governing board and presidents of the Parent-Teachers Associations, together with husbands and wives spent the day visiting schools in Tijuana. Mr. Warren Vogt from the County Office made the arrangements. He had with him three other members of the County staff including Edwina Moore, a most proficient interpreter.

Upon arrival we were divided into eight small groups each of which was provided with an English-speaking student guide from a Tijuana secondary school. During the day we visited classrooms in a kindergarten, two elementary and a secondary school. At eleven o'clock we were the honored guests at an assembly program in commemoration of the birthdate of Benito Juarez, the George Washington of Mexico.

The values of the trip were var-

ied and many. Everyone seemed to be impressed with the courtesy of the Mexican children. More teaching and learning were taking place than we had expected to find. Teaching techniques in many instances were different because of the lack of books and other teaching aids. Instructors drew largely on their own ingenuity and improvised in lieu of adequate supplies.

Our teachers came home inspired to do a better job having witnessed the handicaps under which our neighbors are working. They remember small, poorly ventilated and poorly lighted classrooms housing as many as 56 pupils. They saw congested recreation activities; extremely large groups of children playing on pitifully small playgrounds.

All these and many more impressions are being shared with our own children. One cannot help but reaffirm that although the American School is the best in world it must be made better.

At mid-afternoon we were treated to a full course dinner at the Foreign Club together with entertainment by the Magic Violins, piano, saxophone, and clarinet solos, reputedly the best music in Tijuana.

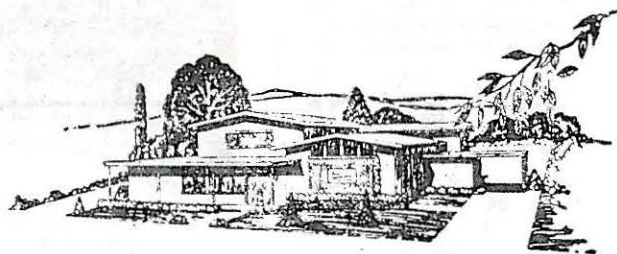
