CHRYSANTEMUMS FOR FALL
Routed chrysanthemum cuttings are available in C. A. N. nurseries this month, and the gardener who would have fall's finest show, should plant plenty of them. They are easily transplantable from plant bands, and should be pinched back at the time of planting. Cut them back severely (about half way) in July and keep them moist at all times. Liquid fish

should be applied about once every three weeks up to the time the buds show color. Keep plants staked.

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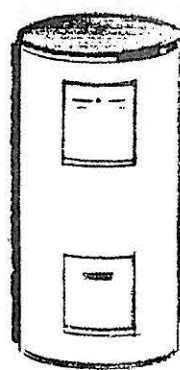
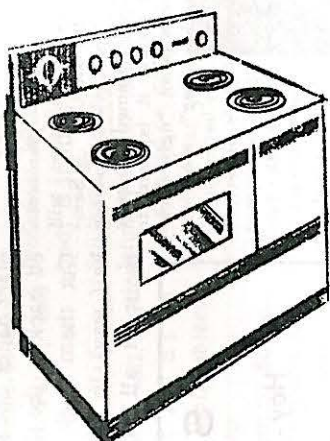
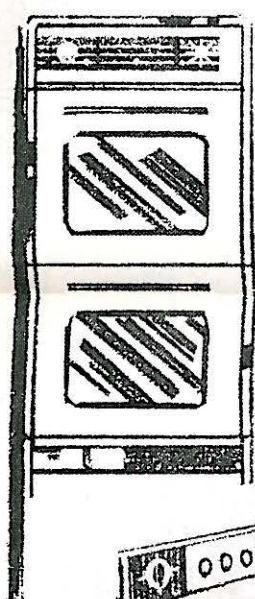

Trout streams will often be high and roily in the early spring. The fishing will be deep in the water. This calls for weighted nymphs, bucktails, streamers, Colorado spinners, and the old reliable earthworm. The trout will be hugging the bottom and resting behind rocks and sunken logs. Fish your lures slowly because the cold waters will keep trout sluggish. Make it as easy as possible for the fish to see and take the bait.



My choice for the best available bait casting outfit is an Ambassador 500 fresh water bait casting reel, a six foot medium action Companion rod that will handle lures from 3/8-ounce up to 5/8-ounce, and 8-pound test monofilament. The reel offers a very effective adjustable centrifugal brake that will cut down early-season backlashes plus a free spool and a level wind that will increase your casting distance. While it is an expensive reel, its lifetime guarantee and dependability makes it worth the investment.

Spring means that bass will be cruising the shallows looking over spawning grounds. Hungry bass mean happy angling and the long winter promises that plenty of big ones will be about. Try shallow running spoons, plugs, Abu-reflex spinners, and large streamer flies.

Use good sized hooks for bass fishing. To bait fish trout number 6 and 8 hooks will be about right. Incidentally, large hooks are a good conservation measure early in the season. The fingerlings can't take them.

Leaders can be shorter and heavier in the spring. A 7 1/2-foot, 3X tapered leader will do nicely for early trout fishing. Because snags are frequent when fishing deep, you'll want to carry some extra tippet material, extra hooks, spit shot or strip lead. A pocket sized plastic leader pack offered by Garcia contains four spools of varied pound test leader material. A typical pack contains 6 to 12-pound test. Other selections can be purchased to meet almost every need from 1-pound test up to 25-pound test. Extra single spools are available. Keep one or two packets in your tackle box or jacket pocket for every spring fishing need.
