Assessor Reappraises Alpine District

The County Assessor's office of San Diego County is making a reappraisal of all of the privatelyowned property within the Alpine School District.

The new assessed valuations will be established as of the 1st of March of 1963, and will be the basis for the tax levies made for the 1963-1964 taxes.

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
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
