
Alpine Community Church will participate.



A chorus of 12 voices will sing old English carols.



1 cup brown sugar 1 cup white sugar

1 can condensed milk, large

1/8 tsp. cream tartar

Cook over low fire and stir often-test as for fudge, cook about 45 minutes, flavor with vanilla. Stir in about three or four cups of walnuts while hot and keep stirring until cool. Turn out on oil paper in pieces.

While appraising the changes, if any, you are thinking of making in your garden, give some thought to the drainage problems of some sections of your yard, because there are few plants indeed which will tolerate wet feet.

If need be, raise some of the beds either by surrounding them with rocks or redwood boards, then fill in with coarse gravel with a good planting mix on top. You can easily find small trailing plants to cover the rocks or boards, then plant whatever other plants you want in the center part of the bed.

Stocks and snapdragons are good specimens to get started in cool weather, as are Calendulas, Foxglove, Coral Bells, Delphiniums and others. Start crabgrass control now by knocking the seeds with one of the available controls on the market. Paint thinner is another weed killer.




