## EDITORIAL

WATER, TODAY OR TOMORROW? We have written many times about a water system for Alpine. We have pointed out that if we had irrigation this area would shortly outstrip other places in this county where avocados, citrus and sub-tropical fruits yield a fine income.

Now we would like to see an Alpine Water committee formed to work on this long-range plan to bring water here. It might be from the Colorado, or the Feather river, or from the mighty Columbia -- or from a dam above here -- see issue of Jan. 15th. The Sun will work toward this end, making this our prime objective, as outlined in the next column. We recently sent nearly \$1,500. to the March of Dimes -- all out of Alpine -which could be duplicated by a few events here to raise money for this water committee to buy a preliminary servey and recommendations.

We not only need water to spark Alpine's development, but we need it today to save residents many thousands of dollars in drilling into granite and getting no water, or scanty flows. Such a system would in no wise harm the drillers' business, as they will always be developing





## **Care of the Body**

HOW MUCH SLEEP DO I NEED?

Probably if you could tell me how much energy you have used today or how fast you can recuperate, I could more exactly tell you how many hours sleep you require.

If you do all mental and eye gymnastics all day, you are wearing out a nervous system which takes longer to rebuild and consequently more rest and sleep is needed. A man with a good nervous system who works physically can get along on less sleep. But a man with a nervous system that is driving a physical body beyond physical endurance will some day have to rest-and maybe a long time at a stretch.

Go to bed and get at least two hours sleep before midnight. Do not try to work when you are tired as it is a double drain on the nervous system. You wouldn't expect a first class job from a run down tired worker would you? Why expect it from yourself.

Eight hours is considered the average amount needed. But it varies with the type of work and the kind of air, whether it be fresh outdoor mountain air or the stuffy air of the city filled with carbon monoxide. It has been proved that noise is disturbing to your body even when asleep.

There is nothing that can take the place of sleep. If you haven't had enough sleep in the past week, do not resort to drugs, tonics, stimulants, etc., but take a day off and go to bed. I heard a wise old Englishman say one time that when he was out late of an evening he would always stay in bed until noon of the next day.





#### WALTERS ON COUNTY HEALTH BODY

The new S.D. county health board, created at the consolidation of city and county health bodies, has just named Judge E.A. Walters, as representative-at-large for unincorporated areas. He will have much to recommend along these lines from the community for the betterment and protection of public health.

The judge served 10 years on the Superior bench in Idaho, during a part of which time he sat on the Supreme bench of the state. He was tendered the nomination for governor on the Republican ticket, equivalent to election, which was declined. He reentered law practive, engaged in banking, being president of one and director with two other banks, in addition being president of a building and loan association. Twenty years ago he disposed of his interests in Idaho, came to California, has resided in Alpine for seven years. He has taken a great interest in civic matters, more recently serving as chairman of the sanitation district committee of the chamber of commerce.

Descansans are proud of a community spirit to justify such a choice. PTA ladies will provide lunch.






