IF THE SET HAS TO GO TO THE SHOP, THE SAME MINIMUM SHOULD APPLY. HOW-EVEP. THE REPAIRMAN MAY CHARGE A FLAT RATE NOT TO EXCEED \$6.00 FOR THE CALL AND ANY AMOUNT OF TIME HE NEEDS TO WORK ON YOUR SET. THIS INCLUDES WHETHER HE CAN REPAIR IT IN THE HOUSE OR THE SHOP. THESE CHARGES CAN ONLY BE EXPECTED WITHIN A REASON-ABLE DISTANCE OF THE SHOP.

RADIOS SHOULD BE APPROXIMATELY \$2,50 for the call. and \$1,50 an hour basis. If taken to the shop-- \$1,50 hourly minimum. Auto radios will vary in labor costs.





The next regular monthly session of the Alpine Republican Women's club will be on Monday, April 20th in the Tavern at 2 p.m.






HINKLE NOW HAS FHA CASH






