SEWER BIDS DUE NEXT MONTH Officials report that bids for Alpine's Sanitary district will go out June 15 to July 1 and will not run over \$120,000. Delay and a slight added cost were caused by the dedinitely contemplated widening to 100 feet of Hiway 80 from El Cajon to the eastern county line, 72.6 miles which will mean a great increase in traffic and safety. The sewer lines, already surveyed, had to be redone for this reason, to be outside the proposed pavement. However, this will not make it run over the bonded \$120,000.

## SCHOOL WANTS ICE PLANT



#### KIWANIS SEES NEED FOR ALPINE WATER DISTRICT

At the Kiwanis meeting the first indication that the Sun's outline of a possible water system for Alpine is bearing fruit, came about with the suggestion that the chamber of commerce be invited in to discuss this and other community projects.

Most feasible plan is that of bringing water from Hans Kern's ranch below Cuyamaca where he completed a big dam last winter, has impounded sufficient to supply a million gallons daily (See Jan. 15 Sun).


Another Sun suggestion, an Alpine bank, was discussed, Kiwanians believing that this community and the back country are entitled to such service, and that it can be realized in the near future.

It is believed that with the completion of the sewers and consequent granting of business building permits which have been held up because of this lack, Alpine's progress will get a genuine shot in the arm that will eventually demand the proposed water district which will bring untold wealth to this area.
