



ALPINE GETS PUBLICITY





KIWANIS HEARS OF TV



cribed in the Sun for Jan. 15, with a picture of the 34 million gallon lake formed with the 1000-foot dam was built. the creek, coming out of Mt. Cuyamaca, runs all year, yields a million gallons daily.

The Scouts will make this 160 acres one of Americas finest Scout camps with all manner of recreational facilities, only 2½ miles in the great forest from Descanso. It has unlimited area for winter sports. camping, hiking, etc. Already the lake has been stocked by the state with trout and bass.

The Council could sell this water overflow to Alpine through a local water company, thus yielding funds for upkeep and improvement of this marvelous scout activity. Future plans include another dam at the junction of King and Poverty creeks, forming an even larger lake.

The ranch, owned by Hans Kern, was sold for \$35,000. Kern, always interested in scouting, returned a check for \$5.000. to the council.

It is hoped that speedy action will be taken by Alpine's far-seeing leaders toward the early acquisition of this surplus water supply so that this community may make deserved progress which will mean more business, residential and agricultural development.

Edgar Halliday, retired film man of Chicago, is observing his second year in Alpine at the Habit Motor Court, and like many newcomers, likes it!






