
ALPINE HONORS ROY CLARK

EDITORIAL

IS NATIONAL DEBT A SHADOW? While our great newspapers harp so



If there is no rain, the outdoors will be as dangerous as in the house, when Christmas comes, warns Fire Chief Sam Randazzo, 'and so let us be ever watchful for fire hazards.

Nothing is more tragic than a beautiful hotiday home turned into charred mass, with perhaps loved ones injured or even dead! He lists precautions!

Is the light circut adequate? concealed wires overloaded can become red hot.

Use only firesafe trimmings. Keep the tree trunk base in water to prevent drying.

Check light cords, sockets, etc. better discard a light set than lose a home.

Keep tree away from heating systems and place a sheet of firesafe material under the tree.

Don't use same tree or lights circut for an electric heater.

Finally, regard your tree as if it were a bucket of gasoline. It's that dangerous!

Be fire-conscious. Your Fire Dept. wishes you, and knows you will have, a very merry Christmas.

4H COMBINE FOR PARTY










HINKLE HAS \$2,000 FIRE


