

Many thought I was a bit off my beam. I yelled so loudly about the coming menace, I got myself called a fanatic on the subject. But today the laugh is on them.

The smoke, gas fumes, haze, are here in S.D. County, and nearly every day we who live in America's finest climate, actually look down on that sea of murky pollution. Some floats down the coast from 'Smog Angeles' as I call that madhouse metropolis'

If you missed the S.D. Union's story 'Smog's Her', by Bryant Evans, on Jan. 6, you better hie yourself into the Library and read it. Then thank your stars that you're living in Alpine, above it all.




HOUSE NUMBERS IN SIGHT
