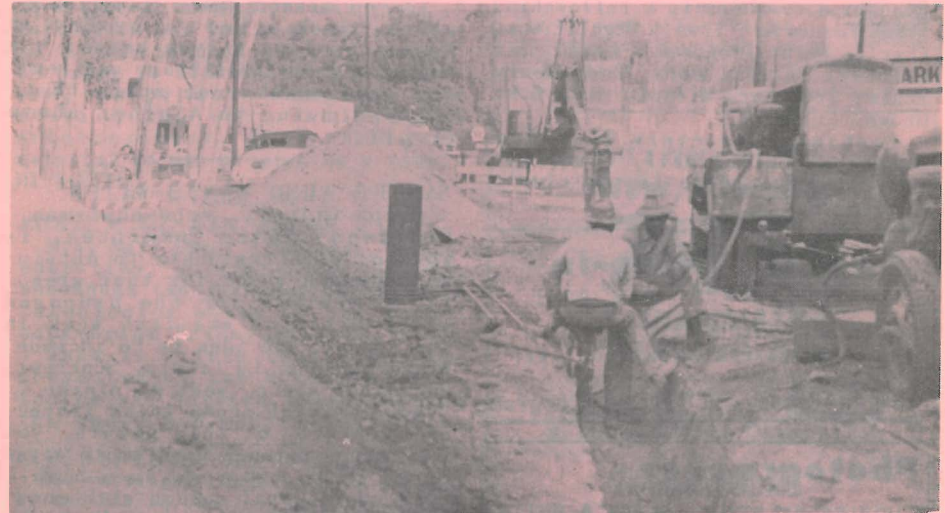
FRANK BROWN LOSES WIFE

The session of Alpine Artists & Writers was held Saturday in Ye Alpine Tavern Art Gallery, the



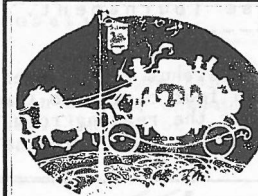
VALENTINE MORSE, NOTED ARTIST OF YE ALPINE TAVERN GALLERY, WITH SOME OF HER RECENT WORK.

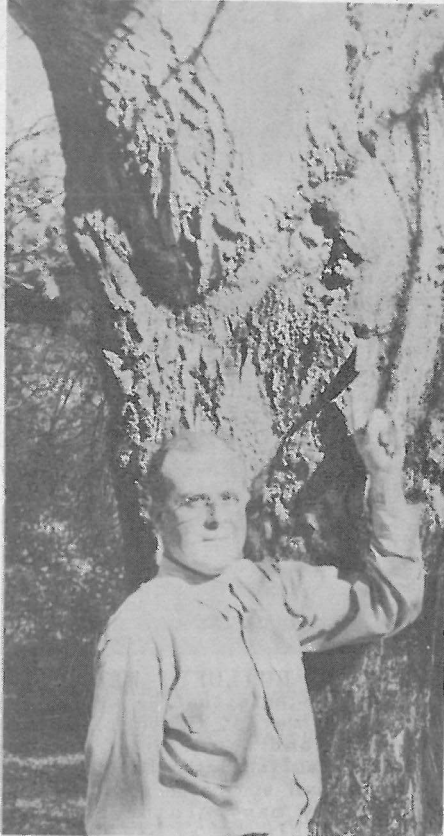

This ancient scythe blade was discovered imbedded 18 inches below crotch in a grizzled oak on Samuel E. Van Note's place, Holly Rd. In Irvine's photo he points to end of blade, handle end being invisible

at other side. Also found was a 130 year old Singer sewing machine head cached under some rocks, estimated by experts to be 130 years old. The oak, 200 or 300 so the scythe may have been left there by some early settler in Alpine as early as 1840. Van Note, teacher of safety education in driving, at Grossmont, also found an old time miner's pick.

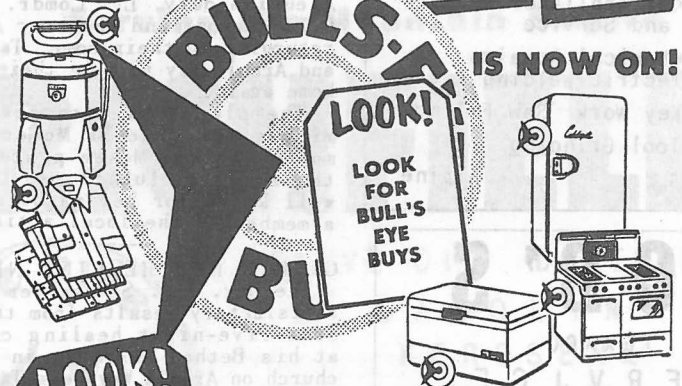

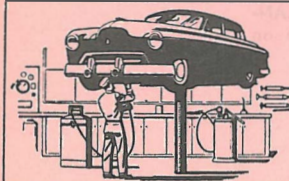
