ALPINE COULD GROW NUTS

Just now this county is eyeing the advisibility of planting a subtropical nut, the tasty macadamia, or bobble nut, native of Australia. Present supply, mostly roasted in bottles, comes from Hawaii, is quite a commercial crop. This news comes from C.D. Gustafson, farm advisor, who says the climate here is conducive to its growth. Some plantings have already promised well. A new bulletin on it is available, he says.

Note- When I was living 'Down under', I first met this tasty nut, ate them regularly, still get some here, but prefer no roasting or salt If Alpine gets its water supply, I believe many will plant this tree commercially for it is a coming profitable crop.


