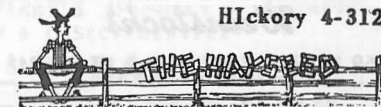
TUCSON CITY LIMITS HERE!

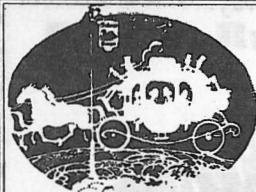

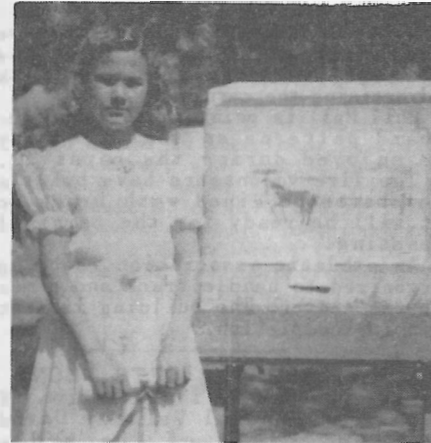

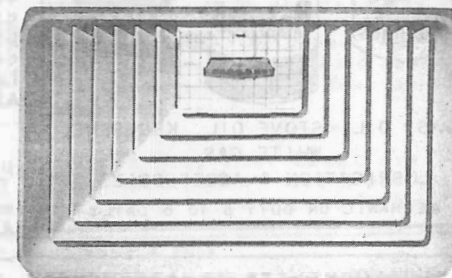

Alpine We would have to pay back taxes from 1928 at a cost of 80¢ per \$100. assessed valuation, and the water used would cost \$12. per acre foot.

'The above costs would only place us in a position to procure water and not distribute it, so these costs, it will readily be seen, would be prohibitive'.

Another source, the California Telephone and Water Co., who own Loveland Dam, was not interested on account of water shortage.

The City of San Diego also de-

clined to promise water from Conejos Creek due to inability to guarantee volume in drought years.

'All sources being exhausted, with one exception, to procure water from wells in the Alpine area, where we have sufficient supply of underground water, enough to last for many years or till such time in the distant future when an outside water supply will be available, the committee concluded that the only workable plan would be one which would benefit all Alpine, would be a private water company, or stock company, a corporation that could issue and sell stock to any one interested in participating in a profit sharing organization'.

'We believe this plan will pay dividends eventually, increase all local property values, allow those that desire to build to obtain FHA or other loans, and last but not last, by any means, avoid a bonded indebtedness against the community and your property, thereby eliminating the necessity of increasing taxes.'

This group is a committee of volunteers who have worked as much as possible in their own time to thoroughly sift all possible points in this most urgent and important question.

'Therefore we desire the support, and moral support, of all property owners, and we will keep you apprised of progress we may make from time to time. Any ideas or constructive criticism will be greatly appreciated' the committee states, communications may be made to Lewinson at his office in downtown Alpine, or to either of the others.
