SEWER TAX TO BE LOWERED

At press time five Alpiners had applied for connection to the sewer and others were in process, reported Gene Vincenz, head of the public works office. Several in Alpine told the Sun that they would proceed.

Best news is from Dave Bird and T.M. Heggeland that the actual tax rate will be set by Sept. 1, and 'it has been recommended to the board to produce an indicated tax rate of \$3.02'. This, instead of the \$4.30 or more, encourages people to go ahead. Heggeland said that the rate would be still lower next year.

Note- We know that the civic center has been upset just about as much as Alpine over the situation and is doing everything to right the mattee. It is obvious that our county men do not relish trouble when they are trying to serve us. The system will be in operation within a few weeks and then Alpine will go zhead. We know that new buildings will be put up and that the village will expand. In a few years we will vote bonds for a larger system costing several hundred thousand and none will kick, but the town will be on the way to its rightful place as an important health and recreation center! - C.I.

DEHESA ROAD JOB IS STALLED

No more work this year will be done on the improvement of Dehesa Rd. to Tavern Rd. admits Ed Singer, superintendent, as machinery has been pulled off about ¼ mile below the junction of those roads.

Tavern Rd., up to South Grade, will be started by the end of August, he promises, just as soon as equipment can be had to move 7,000 yards of earth. Right-of-way fenceposts near the road station are up, trees felled and rocks drilled for blasting the new straight route from the edge of the canyon to South Grade. It should take a month, with several culverts to install.

Last April a petition went to county road officials urging Tavern from South Grade to Arnold be straightened and widened, as over

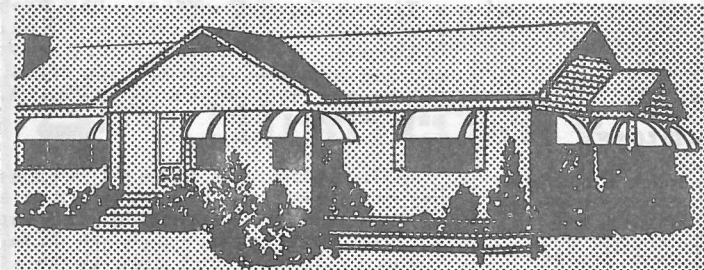

MRS. VANCE BUTLER PASSES

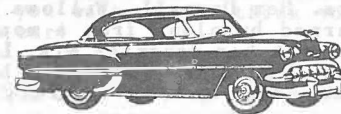

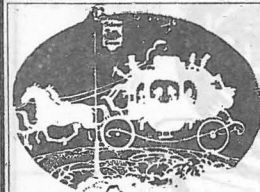

patrol 4,250 square miles which makes the budget pretty thin for Alpine, but it does get more than its share, which he proved by statistics.

The other point: Rank said that Alpine is the only area in the state that can dial a 40-mile call free and that 'most places have a separate exchange and don't enjoy such extended service'. He pointed out that improvement and added facilities cannot be done overnight in such a widely scattered area. Presently 80 circuits yield 4-6-8 party lines, and it will take time to enlarge. He said the company is working on plans to follow the survey now underway.

Jamison in his factual talk really awakened the people as to Alpine's rural position. When he joined that office in 1935 only 44 were in the entire department, including staff, but today there are 210. Sheriffs cars do 3830 miles daily, with turnover of 306 prisoners in a facility set up for only 89. Daily sick calls total 60.

Alpine is free from crime he said, but scored the system that lets loose youngsters as soon as arrested for small nuisances-- but that is the law. To Aug. 1, there had been only 18 cases, with 1452 calls of all kinds from this section. He gave enlightening figures on the assessed valuation percentage for protection and so forth, which explains why rural areas do not get the protection they think they should have.

However he did promise that due to the fast growth here and the need for prowl cars above here, 'we will try to rearrange assignments to provide an additional car in the eastern area'.

Note- Both speakers received warm applause and generously answered questions, creating a much more friendly and informal feeling with the people. Frankly we believe that both offices are trying to give Alpine the best service possible and as we grow, both will render still better service.- C.I.

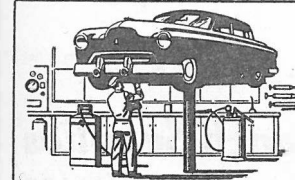
