EDITORIAL

LET'S NOT HAVE BLACK XMAS Thanksgiving is next Thursday. four weeks later comes Christmas, with New Year a week later. This is the holiday season. Let us not make it a black Christmas with more traffic deaths!

Within the last 30 days, Fred H. Rohr, head of the S.D. County traffic safety program, says that we have seen death strike in our county 25 times, double what it was in the first nine months of the year.

The National Safety Council's recent report has given women drivers a much better statistics look -- they are involved in only 11% of fatal crashes while men number 89%. Yet only 27% of all licensed drivers are women, 13,770,000, males outnumbering them in the total of 37,223,000.

They say women drive more relaxed, are not so speedy, hold their tempers easier, are more courteous, and believe me, courtesy -- which after all indicates that a lady or gentleman is at the wheel-- is one of the best preventives of fatal crashes.

This season let us all pray for safety on our highways, and at the same time, endeavor to drive with extra courtesy, in short, at Christmas time drive like a Christian dri e with the Golden Rule. C.I.

STREET NUMBER MAP READY


Within a short time Alpine will have house numbers assigned, is the word from the civic center where Cdordinator Yakel reports that he has completed the grid map for the comjunity. This is the base for working out the efficient numbering system which allows one number for each 20 feet of property on all county roads. This project was started by the Alpine Sun in August, 1953.

North-south numbers will start 1½ miles north of town, will run as far south as needed, digits in the village to be about 1300. East-west numbers start at Highway 80 and Harbis on Canyon road, (top of the big grade), and go east as far as needed, with downtown digits around 2400 This approved system eliminates confusing compass directions, for example, the Sun might be 2662 Tavern rd., (just a snap guess).




