
ROAD BLAST STOPS POWER



LIVELY BOND DISCUSSION By Blanche McCall

Over 40 were on hand Thursday week at the special meeting in Alpine school auditorium to discuss the proposed \$87,000. bond election of yesterday, (too late to catch the Sun press).

The session was called by the board to air the matter. Largely a male assemblage, they represented a cross-section of the district which includes Harbison and Japatul voters.

The board: President Jerry Klipp, Mrs. Shepard, Mike Cady and Fred Pushing, with Frank Brown, district superintendent, explained necessity of the bond sale and that the minutes of the board meetings indicated the money would be spent only on classrooms.

The master plan is for a maximum of 18 rooms in five years, four rooms to be built by September. Of the \$87,000 in bonds, only \$63,000 will be sold at first, the balance later if needed. Sale of the old school plant will add approximately another \$35,000.

The new school was built, according to Brown, when costs were highest, \$16,03 per square foot per classroom. Costs now range from \$7.50 to \$14, and based on \$12, an approximate estimate of four classrooms was made to be about \$50,000. The school now has seven classrooms on the new site, six at the old, of which two will have to be abandoned at the end of the year.

Issue from the assembly arose over sale of the old school plant and the high cost of building new rooms. All recognized the need of additional rooms; however many urged retention of it to be used as a primary school to be remodeled and repaired. Brown estimated cost of repairing at \$10,000 which would include hooking onto the new sewer, putting in a kitchen and cafeteria, reroofing, and grading of the playground.

Louis Landt suggested adding two rooms at the old plant and two at the new, keeping the old school, as replacement of those buildings would be impossible at the sale price, a

The teachers will have individual room parties, Santa Claus appearing in the kindergarten and grades 1-3 at 10:30 this morning.



minimum set by the board of \$33,000. 'Wm. S. Lethbridge, chamber of commerce president, speaking as a taxpayer, said he opposed the bonds; that if a more reasonable plan of building at less cost could be presented, he would favor it. Jack Smith opposed sale of the old school, explaining advantages of primary grades being separated from the older students. Mike Cady explained disadvantages of retaining the old school in economy and efficiency, urged the desirability of having all at one site, the original plan.

Present Alpine school tax is \$1.70 and Grossmont tax is \$1.62. Passage of the bonds would increase Alpine tax 17 cents on \$63,000.

Note- While the heated topic around town has flared into the Alpine Sun office, we have kept aloof. But it seems to us that some better way of acquiring added classrooms without the high cost planned, would be found.

Why not sell our own bonds here? Why not use local builders? And buy materials in Alpine? Bonds sold outside pay our money for interest to outsiders.

We are for bigger and better schools to take care of population increase, but we believe that school business and government should be run as economically as one would operate his own-- without big debts, costly fees.

I am opposed to doubling up children in crowded rooms, and I'm opposed to doubling up costs on my tax bill, which is large enough as it is-- and inching up every year. I'm not alone in this observation-- go into any barbershop and listen for yourself! C.I.

WATER COMPANY STARTING To operate as a very small mutual water company and to spark the future acquiring of Colorado or other outside supply, as well as stimulate interest in the urgency of getting ample water ainto this area, the Alpine Water Co., is being formed.

Prime mover is Clarke Irvine, publisher of the Alpine Sun, and an ardent spokeman for the solution of this important civic problem. Already associated with him is Carl McCall and O.E. Jordan, both of Tavern Rd., with properties adjoining Irvine's Trailer Estates.

McCall will give land on which is an old reservoir 10 feet deep and 50 feet across, with right-of-way over his land to Jordan's. Thence a main could be run over to Irvine's, to supply his trailer park, which with water supply, could be expanded. The main then would drop to Tavern Road and divide into north and south smaller mains to serve any of some 40 present homes covering less than two miles of Tavern Road, from the Tavern at Arnold Way, to South Grade Road.

Several good wells now yielding ample water could be connected to the input, the owners of which are agreeable to selling water. Users would be metered and pay their charges 'which would be far less than present pumping and maintenance coats, to say nothing of the expensive deepening of present wells to keep in the lowering water table', says Irvine.

'Many new homes would be built and values would increase' declares McCall, a real estate man, 'and Tavern Road would go ahead.' Two homes are now being built by the Wilcox family, and Mace Bratt is finishing his.

'I would go ahead and develop my land if we have ample water' promises Jordan, who recently moved his family from the L.A. area.

Dr. Edgar Halliday, pyramids puzzle researcher of Alpine, has just been appointed treasurer of the new Hendricks Foundation in L.A. which is working on new cures for cancer, polio and other dreaded diseases.






