




FARM & RANCH NEWS

BROILER PICTURE BRIGHTER • A survey of many broiler breeder flocks across New England, the Central Atlantic states, the South and the Midwest indicates the broiler situation will be most favorable in months.

The questions asked were:

1. The per cent increase or decrease in replacement pullets not GROWTH STIMULANT CLICKS yet in production and:

2. The per cent increase or decrease in chicks started for replacement flocks during the last three months as compared with the same period a year ago.

This survey was checked with local breeders, hatcheries and dealers.

The survey revealed an average reduction of about 10% in the breeder replacement pullets on hand but not yet in production. It also revealed an average reduction of about 20% in the number of replacement chicks started for broiler breeder flocks during the past three months.

All indications paint toward profitable prices for growers for several months. For, with fewer breeder replacement pullets on hand but not yet in production and a still greater reduction in the

number of chicks started for replacement flocks, one thing is certain:

There are going to be fewer eggs for hatcheries, fewer chicks for broiler growers and fewer birds going to market - at least for the next several months.

A recent special notice concerning the limits of the Alpine Fire Protection District and the use of the trucks of the Alpine Fire Department has been issued by the Board of Commissioners The notice is published in the Alpine Fire House and on the bulletin board outside the Alpine Post Office.

By this order, no truck of the Alpine Fire Department is authorized to go outside the limits established unless requested by the State Division of Forestry, the U.S. Forest Service, or the Harbison Canyon Fire Depart-

U.S. Forest Service, or the Harbison Canyon Fire Depart-ment. This order will particularly concern those residing near the limits to the east of Alpine, who withdrew from the Alpine Fire Protection District some years ago. Many of the people in the district which withdrew still believe that they are entitled to protection. Such is not the case. The Alpine Fire Protection District is supported by taxation of those residing therein. No fire tax is paid by the district which withdrew and the residents therein are not entitled to protection af-forded by the Alpine Fire Department. HOWEVER - should these residents desire to receive this protection --the Board of Commissioners will be glad to receive a properly executed petition for inclusion within the district. The people concerned are urged to give this matter their earnest consideration, as the Fire Depart-ment is willing and anxious to serve them - but - they must pay their share.


MRS. CARRIE SNOW PASSES


