Editorial**DROWNING CAN BE PREVENTED**

Now that summer is on full blast, with families enjoying trips and vacations to watering places, our S.D. Health office reminds everyone to help prevent drownings.

Their bulletin points out that water safety presents a challenge to vacationers and that in recent years, national drownings have accounted for more than a third of public non-transportation accidental deaths. Children under 15 are victims in nearly a third of these regrettable, and practically unnecessary fatalities. Most of them are from 5 to 14, a time when they should all be learning to swim.

The National Safety Council gives a few good pointers: Learn to swim well, know your limits. Never swim alone, or after dark. Avoid sudden plunges into cold water. Don't let children take balls or other rubber inflated toys into the water. Always accompany small children when in or near the water. Beware of waves.

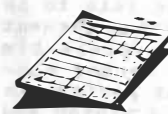
We reiterate: See that your family learns to swim--and live! -CI.

of \$1.48 per \$100. of assessed valuation, for school revenue, to be voted here on Friday, July 22, at the school, from 2 to 8 p.m.

If approved this will set the excess rate for the next five years. The council had no choice since with the defeat of this measure the rate would revert to the legal 90¢. The Council felt that it could not recommend the latter alternative, since our school children would be the innocent victims of a severely curtailed program.

Some weeks ago (April 12) the Council appointed a committee to obtain from Supt. Frank S. Brown the tentative budget for the fiscal year 1955-56, which they were to study and evaluate for the information of the Council and the voters. They met with him on April 19 to obtain this detailed budget information, but later stated that no adequate information was furnished. Subsequently this information was withheld until the election date had been set, and the tentative budget had been filed with the county.

Thus the superintendent left the

Council no choice, having withheld this information for more than a month and until it was too late for him to take cognizance of any economy suggestions. The tentative budget calls for the spending of some \$153,000. in the next school year, and the Council believes this is of concern to local voters.

Notwithstanding, the committee made a study of the budget and a report, excerpts being: 'In our opinion the budget could be reduced by some \$10,000. without impairment of any essential school function . . . \$3,500. could be saved in one lump sum . . . a budget so reduced could be carried at or near the expiring rate of \$1.22.'

The Council was highly critical of the uncooperative attitude of the superintendent and feels he will be responsible for a tax rate that may be excessively high or for a financial crisis if the measure is defeated.

Parenthetically, it can be stated that many evidences of loose administration under the present superintendent have been brought into focus, and the Council has only begun to scratch the surface.

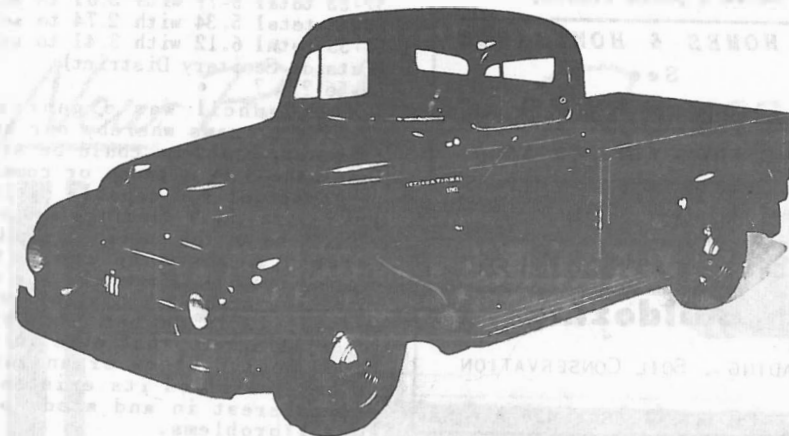
The excess tax rate of \$1.48, if approved, will become effective for five years. The full amount must be collected the first year, however, if in the future the school administration can sufficiently reduce the budget the amount or rate collected will be something less than \$1.48, this figure remaining as a top limit.

Even though the Council, after analysis, believes the rate to be higher than necessary for present requirements, it is conceivable that this rate could become necessary within a 1-year period. In case a lower rate was approved and it became necessary to seek a higher rate, a new election would be required, at a cost to the district of an estimated \$60.00. On the other hand, it must be kept in mind, that tax revenue will increase, without any increase in rates, as assessed valuations

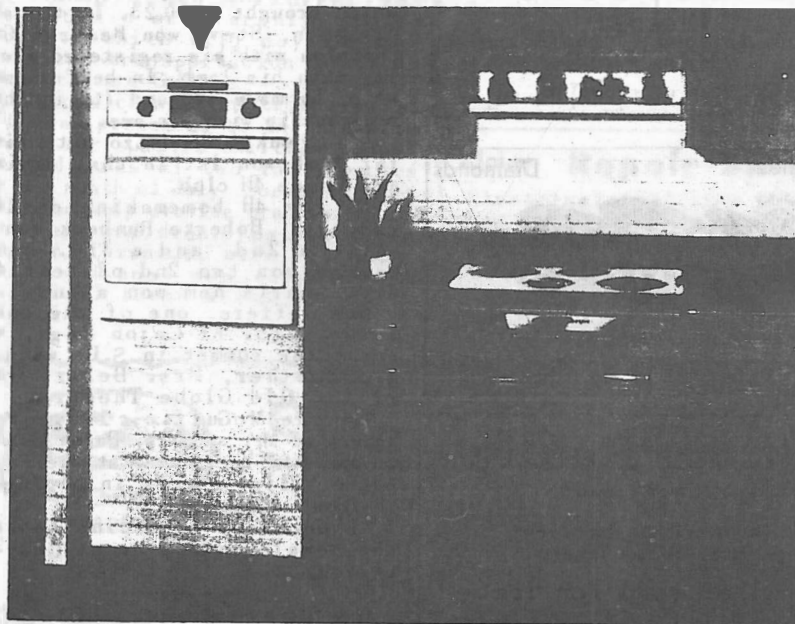

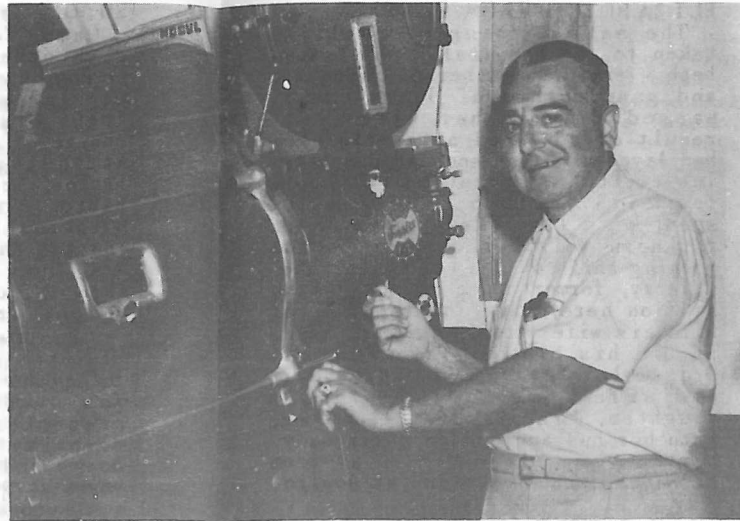
