'The 6000 bills this year is a symbol of the decline of local government' he said, indicating that the state is taking over at every turn.





CHAMBER SEATS NEW PREXY

Tuesday evening in Fuller Hall 91 sat down to the annual Alpine Chamber of Commerce dinner for installation of officers.

Wm. S. Lethbridge, retiring president, turned the gavel over to Jack Wilson, new head; introduced the new vice-president, Dr. Frank Bornowski, complimented John R. Reynolds for his good work as secretary-treasurer. He was reelected. In addition he emceed in his inimitable style, introducing new members and prominent guests.

Dr. Chas. Schroeder, head of the S.D. Zoo, was the speaker, telling of the increase in facilities, animals and expenses, pointing to the fact that the state forces this educational, non-profit corporation to pay sales taxes on animal exchanges, even where no cash or sale is made. When he revealed this, murmurs ran through the crowded hall, indicating that the people did not take kindly to the idea.

Lethbridge told of the year's work, highlighted by the cut in sewer taxes, more effective service here by the sheriff's office, and the forthcoming big new folder for Alpine. Mrs. J.C. Wiwel was in charge of the dinner.

Note-I called Dr. Schroeder next morning and he verified his talk. The state put an auditor in the zoo office for two weeks to check bills and correspondence, collected tax on \$29,000. for three years. But that is the way our law is written. It seems that if the military shops are exempted from sales tax, our educational institutions should be the same. All this shows that our freedom is slipping! C.I.

POWER RATE UP NEXT WEEK On Aug. 12 the increase in electric rates of 15% in cities and 24% in the county, which was granted by the Public Utilities Commission, will go into effect. In town, the user will pay \$5.77 for 200 kw hours a month while in the county the new rate will be \$6.78, compared with the present \$5.46. It is the first raise in 34 years, is intended to produce \$4,315,000. added gross revenue.

TAKING TRAFFIC CENSUS NOW

The county is making its annual count of motorists who pass over a dozen roads in this area. as many no doubt have noted.

One spot, Tavern Road at Arnold Way has been checked by Philip B. Pressnall, field man, who is placing and picking up automatic counters. He says traffic is increasing about 1% a year, getting larger as one nears S.D. Most counts are for 24 hours, but some outlying checkers are left for a week.

The little black box. with its telltale strip across the road carries the warning of a penalty for tampering with the machine or tape, which upsets the counter, necessitating a second trip to that spot, which costs the taxpayer money.

Note- We hope the 1955 count on Tavern Road will spark officials to get this snaky road widened and straightened. We know they are busy, and funds are needed everywhere, but this is one spot that should have priority, being a primary county road. -CI





were in favor. As we expected, they showed plenty of moral support."

'Most important query is, 'What is your assessed county valuation?' Because, 1, that governs the amount of water allowed a member; and 2, the amount of bonds that can be sold is also based on that'.


'When we had the total, we called the state engineer who spent a day with us, the result being that in consideration of the amount we could borrow, and the cost, were so far apart, there was no feasable plan to offer'.

'So we did not try to join the water authority (.73 on \$100. of assessed value, for 30 years), plus lawyer and engineer fees, because having rights, but not enough money to install a complete system, would not help. I would be overjoyed if anyone could prove otherwise'

'As you see, we spent countless hours and money to try to get water but we don't want water taxes without water, and until something happens that would make a big change in the overall picture, we do not intend to go in debt for any plan that is not feasible on the face of it. N No matter what anyone says, the fact is that we must go to Slaughter House Creek to get Colorado water, or go through some other water agency's pipe lines for a price? Slaughter House Canyon has an elevation of 650'.

'Our information is from engineers who have nothing to lose or gain if we form a district or not.
