Hereafter the Alpine Mustangs will meet Saturdays at 1 p.m. at Honey Hill until further notice, says Tibby Thibault, trail boss.



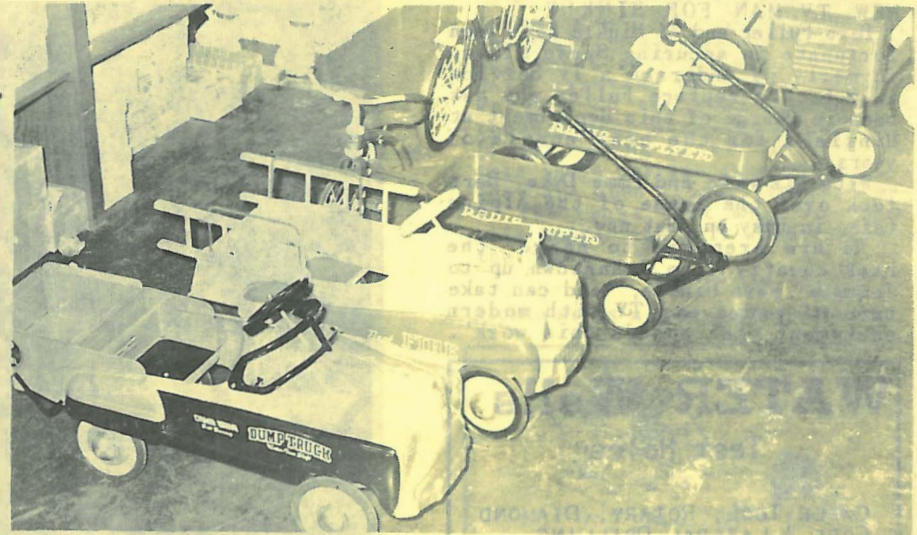
The regular session will be tonight at 7:30 at the Youth Center and all parents and youngsters interested in horses are urged to be present.

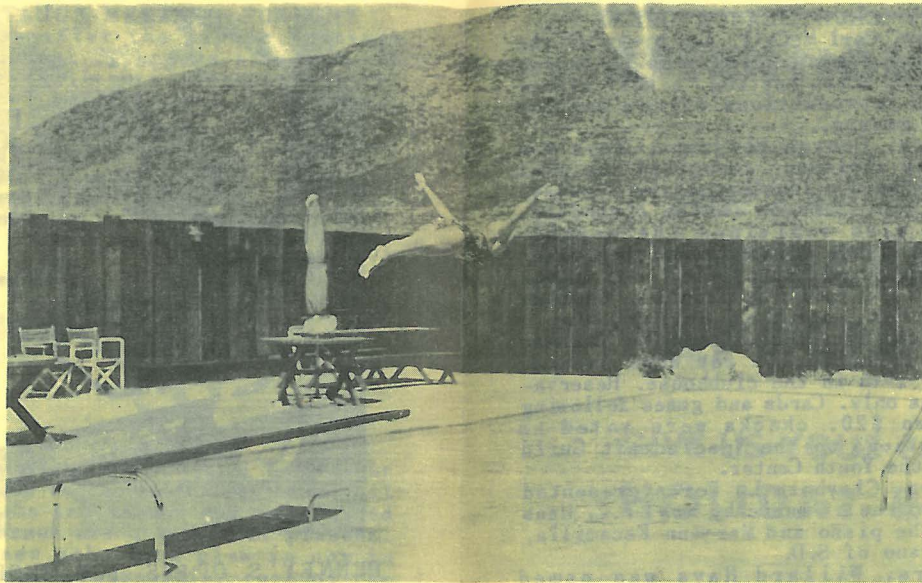
