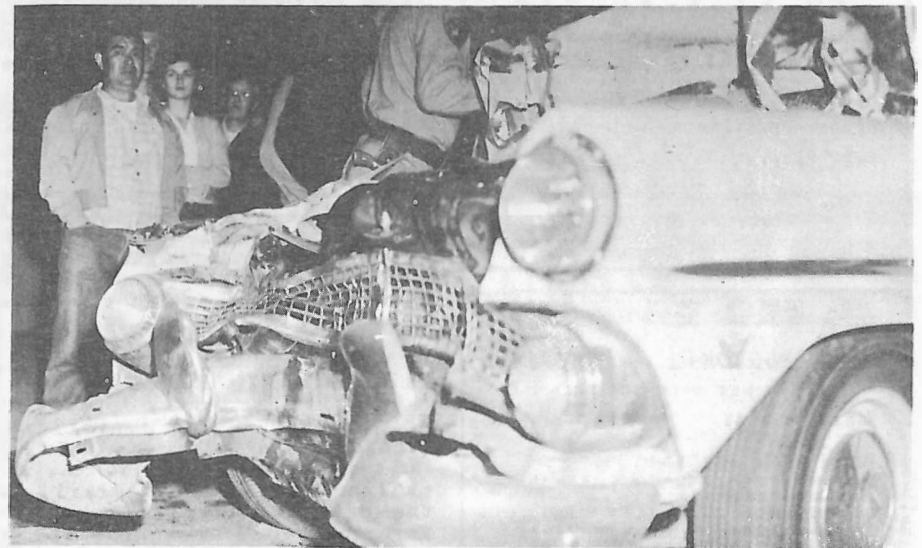

CRASH KILLS HILL AND WIFE

Services at Paris Mortuary were held Friday for Isaac Hill, 60, and his wife Irene, 50, who were instantly killed when he drove his sedan into the rear of a slowing hay truck on Hwy 80 in front of Alpine Circle Trailer Park. Dr. Frank Linder officiated, with burial in Ft. Rosecrans. Hill was a retired navy chief.

Al Townsend and his wife who manage the trailer court were in front talking with two sheriffs at 8:30 Sat. nite when the hay truck driven by Jas. L. Strong, Alpine, slowed down for the village. Suddenly the Hill car crashed into the trailer, the right headlamp hitting the middle of the chassis, knocking the dual wheels way out of line and demolishing the car. Russ Tanner, CHP officer and coroner's deputies investigated. Strong was not injured. Alpine Motor Service removed the wreck and Alpine Firemen cleaned up the road.

Both the Hills were thrown against the instrument board, Hill's chest being pushed against the wheel. He died moments after his wife who was instantly killed.

They are survived by a son, Calvin, who came from Buffalo, N.Y. to take care of the funeral. A foster son, Wm. Webb, is in the navy in S.D. was also here at the time. Mrs. Hill's mother lives in L.A. The Hills bought the Ballou home on Viejas Grade Road, last August, coming here for Mrs. Hill's sinus trouble. They had many friends in this area.

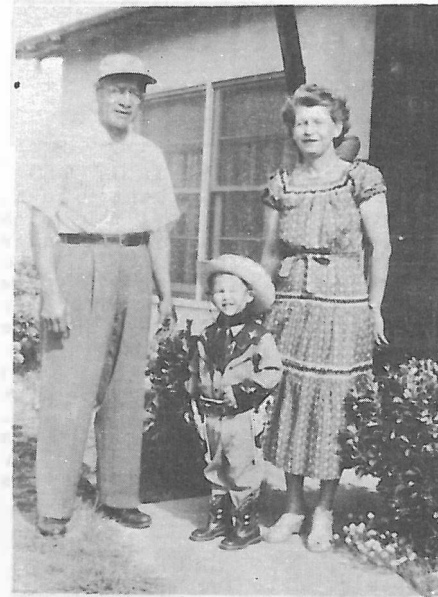

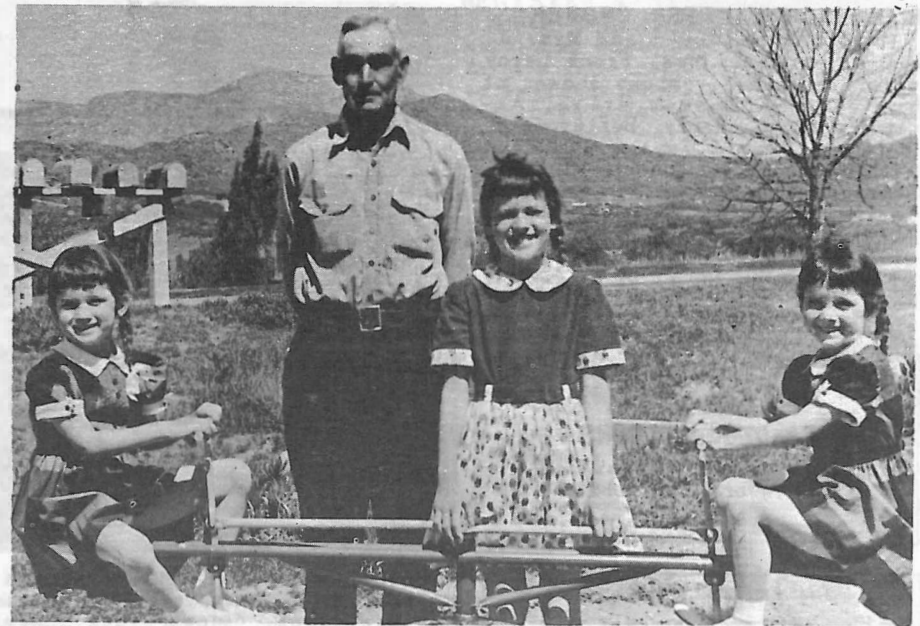

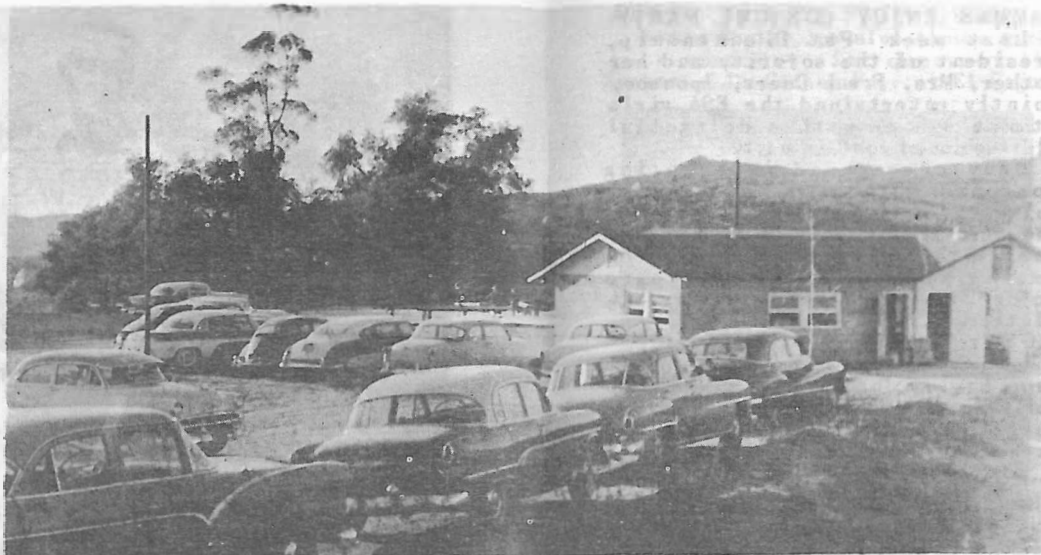

be sent to the supervisors for final okay.

The community will pay \$2,000. cash to the Y.C. for the lease of the 50' deep lot. a back wall will be erected with a 30' deep building for the trucks and a 20' front ramp. The lease allows use of the well. Sewer connection will be made, and a water tank erected. Building will cost \$18,000, and will be of concrete block on a cement slab.

A special election has been set for Tues. June 19 to vote the necessary bonds, at not over 5% interest, to run 15 years. After the bonds are approved, bids will be called for and contract let. Work might start about August 1 so the department could be in by Christmas.

Note- This move was advocated by the Sun several years ago and we see no reason for the bonds not being approved as it will save taxpayers in the long run although Oeser points out that it will raise the rate for a time until the interest is paid, but as the lease on the present building for which we pay \$900. annually expires next year-- and would no doubt be doubled-- the saving will be very handy. Paying off the bonds will be just like rent and at maturity, the fire station will belong to the people.

We have further advocated this community land as a site for a fireproof public library, sheriff's office, firstaid station, health office and other services, a sort of rural civic center. -CJ

Reno, S.D. Realtor who took it to escrow on Mar. 14.

Mrs. McFadin told the Sun yesterday that they had lived here for 16 years, but were forced to leave on account of Mr. McFadin's illness. They own the Golden West Hotel, S.D.

The choice property has three manmade lakes, fed by 7 wells and many natural springs with a square mile of watershed reaching back to within 200 feet of St. Philomena Church on W Victoria. It is estimated that over 15 million gallons are in storage. There is a choice 400 foot frontage on 80, with some of the oldest trees hereabouts, oaks and gums with a forest sanctuary for tame deer, pheasants and other game. The lakes are stocked with fish.

There is a large ranch home, a 5-room apartment, two 1-bedroom guest houses, two barns, a caretaker's cottage where W.D. Williams, in charge, lives, the McFadins having moved to S.D. recently.

Plans call for a private utility to supply water to the area, in which Alpine residents will be invited to participate, a spokesman informed the Sun yesterday. The water development, it is believed, cost close to \$100,000. alone, and for a dry season as this one, shows ample production with sufficient storage.

This picturesque spot is where Alpine's founder, B.R. Arnold built his home, having come here from Connecticut to get relief from his asthma in 1886. This was his first building step here, followed by the Tavern, the Town Hall (Woman's Club) and other structures. Later his house, with the attractive native stone wall in front, became the Los Robles Hotel. After World War I, Dr. A. Lischner came up from S.D. to start a sanitarium.

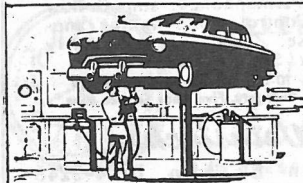
