MECHANIC**STORY OF ALPINE SCHOOL**

The progress of every community is gauged by its schools, churches and cultural activities. Up here in Alpine we have a half-million dollar school, with the original old one across Highway 80, reflecting the growth of this lovely community.

In her Alpine History Bea La Force tells us that the first one was started in 1880 in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edward A. Foss whose children attended. Percy Foss and his sister Pearl, still live in that old house off of South Grade Road near the lane named in their honor. The ranch is called Tule Springs.

Two years later the pupils were moved to the field place right on South Grade Road. Soon after that a one-room schoolhouse was built there, and less than a year later was moved to the site where Stonecrest, the home of Forrest Hohanshelt now stands, and which last summer escaped the brush fire.

In this little building one of Alpine's early teachers, Mrs. Eleanor Finley, taught several years. Her own words best describe the school and its teacher. Here is an excerpt from a long poem in her own hand, found in the old school register. It is assumed to be original, dated March 1885.

First she described the beauty of Alpine scenery, praising its wonderful climate, then goes on to tell of her walk from home to school:

Till I come to my little shed  
schoolhouse,  
Where the children are waiting for me  
By the spring, or the oaks, or the  
great rock,  
Or beneath the old sycamore tree.  
And my school, oh my school is a  
treasure.  
Through my love I hold sway over all  
Not a rule do I have that's un-  
pleasant,  
And I call it my "Libert Hall".
