SCHAEFFER IS POPULAR CALLER

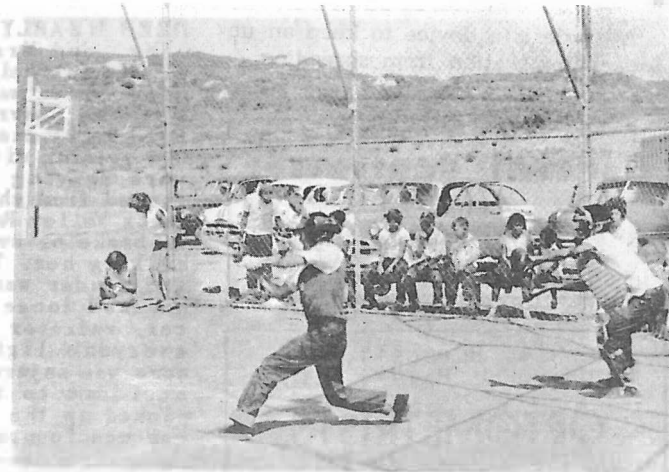

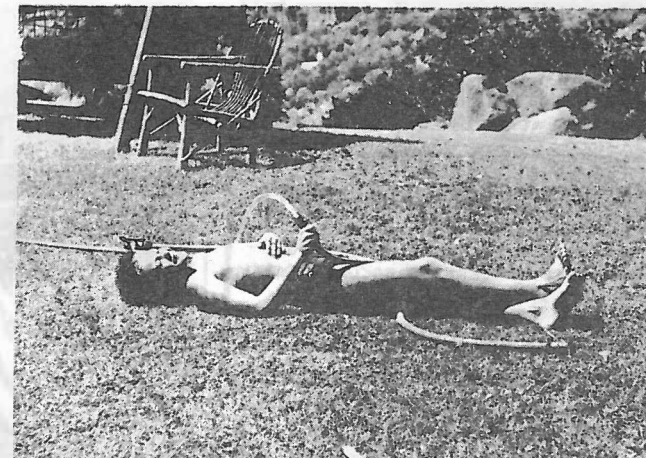

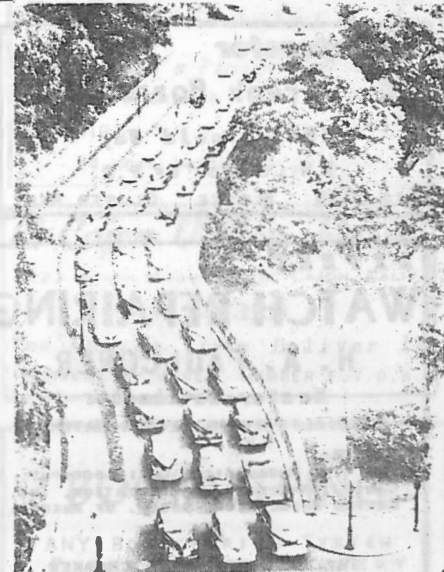

HOLD PHONE RATE HEARING

Due to 300% increase (1950-55) in phones in this area and desire of many for better service, from suburban (8 party lines) to urban (1 2 & 4 party); the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph Co., was given a hearing at the school auditorium last Thursday. Stewart C. Warner, examiner for the Public Utilities Commission, presided, with Melvin E. Mezek, chief utilities engineer and Howard J. Kindemeyer, associate, as witnesses.

About 20 attended, with three appearing as interested parties; Jack Wilson, chamber of commerce president; Fr. Jos. C. di Christina, pastor, Catholic Church, and Clarke Irvine, Alpine Sun. All spoke in favor of the new base rate plan, asked questions.

If given the green light, it will take a year to put into operation, will raise rates within the area from the present \$3.20 to \$4.20, but outside, rates would remain. Business rate would go from \$5.50 to \$11.10 and much lower rates for individual phones as compared with present rate out of E.C. It would also do away with 15¢ local calls.

Dexter C. Tight, attorney, of S.F. conducted the company's testimony with Wm. O. Wildes and Theo. H. McMurray, rate and plant engineers testifying. E.S. Bowers of San Francisco and H.E. Jackson of L.A., company representatives were on hand along with managers Gordon L. Hough of S.D. and Wm. Rank of E.C. Testifying for the Calif. Farm Bureau Fed. were J.J. Deuel and Bert Buzzini, of Berkeley.

The hearing was the result of the first meeting with Mezik here on July 29, 1954 when the Better Business Association started the project with a letter to the P.U.C. on Feb. 18, 1954. At that time Alpine had 695 phones, today it has 1039 (June 30).

IS YOUR PLATE SHOWING?

In a two-day double election on the 30th and 31st, Alpine voters said yes to the \$18,000 bonds for a new fire station and by only 8 votes passed the 61-cent tax increase for the school, from .90 to 1.51. The fire bonds were a pushover, 199 to 33.

Supt. Frank S. Brown said rejection would have caused reduction of the faculty, ended cafeteria service and possible other school work. The board has the power to set the yearly rate at a lower level than voted if it finds that possible. This scores a win for the children.

Comdr. R. Oeser, USN rettd., says bonds will be sold next week and construction will be started soon as processing is completed, on the site leased from the Y.C. at the east end, for 99 years at \$2,000 cash.

NEW WATER SAVES DOLLARS

At San Marcos many wells which were going dry in this, the worse dry spell in history, were saved by the timely arrival of Colorado water, reports Geo. Herter, superintendent. New pipelines are bringing water to 145 meters with 1400 gpm flowing in.

Note- Just about every area in the county is making provision for water but Alpine. Wells are going dry almost faster than they can be deepened or new ones drilled. In some spots the level has dropped as much as 10 feet.

session is Tuesday, 8 p.m. The severance takes place Oct. 1, but Brown was given leave for Sept. The new head will come in on Sept. 1.

The budget of \$171,358 was cut to approximately \$167,000 and the tax rate set for 1.46 per \$100. of assessed valuation, around \$3 million. Eliminated are the coordinator for one day—a half day is free anyhow—and the instrumental music instructor, as the board thought it was not necessary to make all taxpayers pay for the few who took lessons. Also clipped was the food budget from \$4650 to \$2500. as many, during double sessions, do not get to eat, thus about a fifth of the students receive benefits.

The reserve must be built up, they believe, in case the well needs deepening-- it has been recovering slower of late-- the old school needs heating, floors and other items, and may have to be hooked on to the sewer.

School resumes on Tuesday, Sept. 11.
