LET'S STOP DOUBLE SESSIONS

We believe Alpine has a competent and trustworthy school board, striving to give children everything for better education. And they want to get us off of those inefficient and annoying double sessions.

We, and the board, think we have a fine new head of the district in David B. Everett, who likewise is striving to better the school in every way, and to get a full time school going.

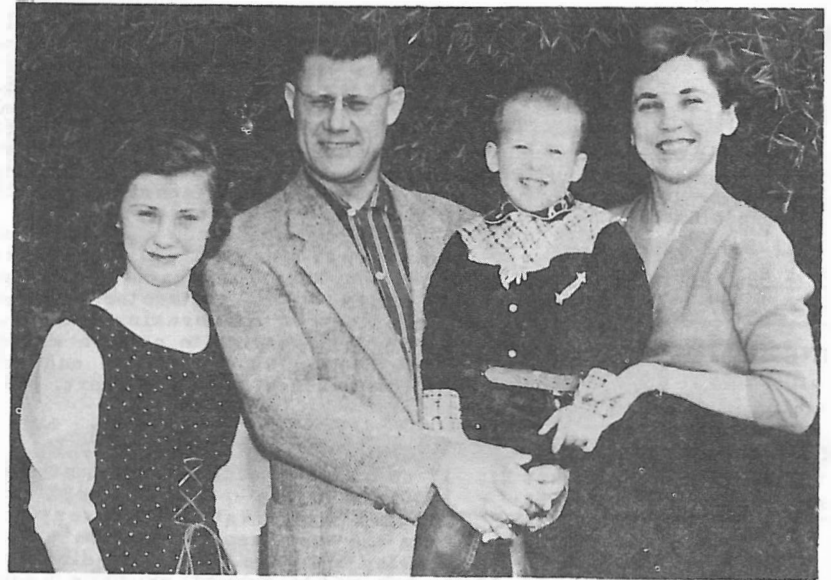
Now that \$30,825. federal money has been earmarked for Alpine, it means three classrooms at most, if permanent plans are used. We will need six to eight in the near future when subdivisions go in hereabouts bringing many new families.

The state has fully approved inexpensive temporary, portable buildings which L.A. has had for 26 years. They are in use all over California. Knowing this, I had sent to L.A. for plans and data some time ago but the former board said they did not even want to see them. But fortunately our new board is considering this money-saving plan.

Some people here desire permanent structures-- but they don't want the necessary bond issue. Moreover these buildings would not take us off double sessions.

On a phone consensus of the board, for the less costly structures, Carl Schweiss, president, told me "Definitely yes; we don't want a bond issue". Bob Wilson: "Pricewise, yea; but I have not studied it yet". John R. Reynolds; "Haven't had a chance to look it over, but want the lowest possible cost to taxpayers in approved construction."

Mrs. Frank Doerr: "I don't know enough about it yet to say, but I will do everything to save tax money and rid ourselves of double sessions"; Donald Coats said he knew nothing about it so could make no statement. -CI.

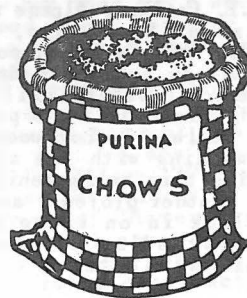

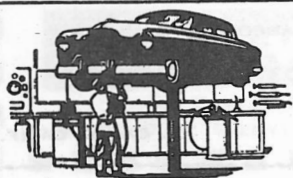

president; W.C. Barker, vice-president and Frank O'Neil, secretary treasurer. The property was bought at auction for \$55,000. cash on May 6, 1955, from the then owners, Wilson and Cecil and Edward Lewinson who had owned it for 10 years.

Daniels, Brown and Hall, engineers, have prepared maps for subdividing, which the county planning commission okayed Monday when Wilson and O'Neil went before it. The engineers will now complete final maps with exact measurements for the 50 sites of one acre or better to be offered first. This area consists of about 3/4 of the entire holding.

The area will be adequately restricted so that those wishing to build homes costing \$25,000 or more may do so without fear of intrusion of low cost housing and so forth. All lots will be staked at once, but will not be ready for the market till spring. Pets only will be allowed, but horses may be kept on perimeter lots and a bridle trail will be built throughout the property.

Eventually all streets will be officially named and houses assigned numbers to conform to the Alpine plan. The mutual water company application was placed this week and pipes soon will be laid to all sites from the large reservoir.

From present indications, many have been impatient to obtain sites, they believe the first building will start early in the spring.

ment of Architecture. This means that Alpine will soon be on a full-time, all-day session without a bond issue', said Everett.

John R. Reynolds, clerk, and Carl J. Schweiss, president of the board agreed that the district should construct six new stucco bungalows by adding cash from the general fund of the district to the total cost.

'I'm going to try and rush construction on this matter', said Everett, 'and I understand that they have been built in three weeks. However, everything must be checked with county, state and federal officials and I expect that it will be about 45 days before the board can issue a call for bids'.

In explaining the grant, Everett said that 'Public Law 815 provides an outright gift to impacted districts. In other words, children whose parents are employed on federal property, or in defense work, constitute the basis for this aid. There are no federal strings attached although in addition to other stipulations, state law requires the services of an architect in spite of previously approved plans.

The board had requested \$75,277, along with 26 other county districts asking over \$18 millions to cover the period July 1, 1956 thru June 30, 1958. Highest request was Oceanside, \$1,159,974, Lowest, Vallecitos, \$57,000.

Note- We think every parent in the district will be mighty happy over this and will be grateful to the board and Supt. Everett for working so hard to alleviate the imposition of double sessions. -CI.
