## Editorial...

### WE ALL MUST SAVE WATER!

With another year of short rainfall, the entire Southland is facing a severe problem in meagre water supplies.

This applies to our back country as well as cities with water reservoirs and Colorado water. The Don't Waste water Campaign is doing everything to spark people to save it.

In this area wells are steadily going down and many are having to spend a lot to deepen, with resulting higher pumping costs. At presstime our rainfall for the season was only 10.32 inches--way below average.

We believe that county, state and nation should attack this problem at once, not only to bring in water, but to save what we get. We should build more dams and reservoirs. every trickle should be saved and led into cisterns, underground tanks from which it could be pumped. Every house should have one to lead roof water down from every good rain.

A few timely tips on saving what you have is put out by the campaign; wash dishes in a pan; keep drinking water in refrigerator, don't run the tap; save from the hot tap for use on household plants; scrub vegetables in a pan, not under running water, and stop all faucet leaks which can waste up to 200 gallons a day!

Burial services were conducted Sunday for a former Alpiner, Bill Bain, in Springfield, Mo. He died in Fair Grove Friday after a long illness.

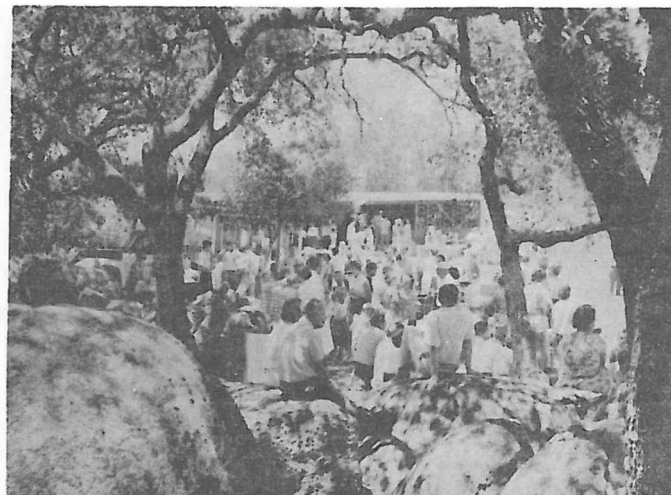

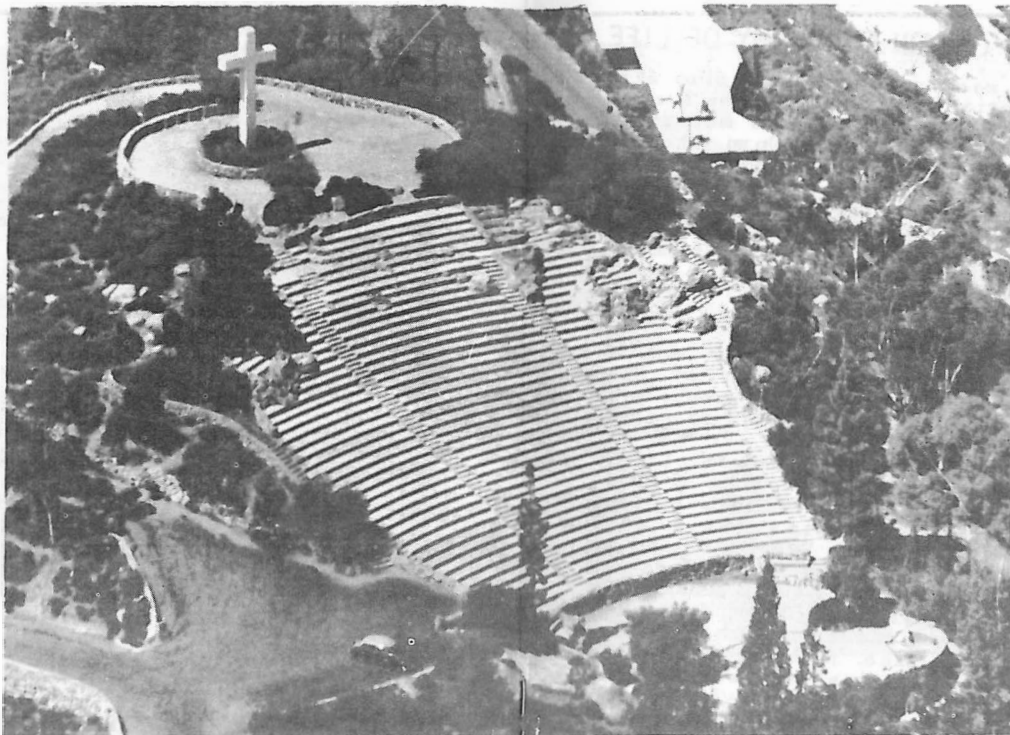

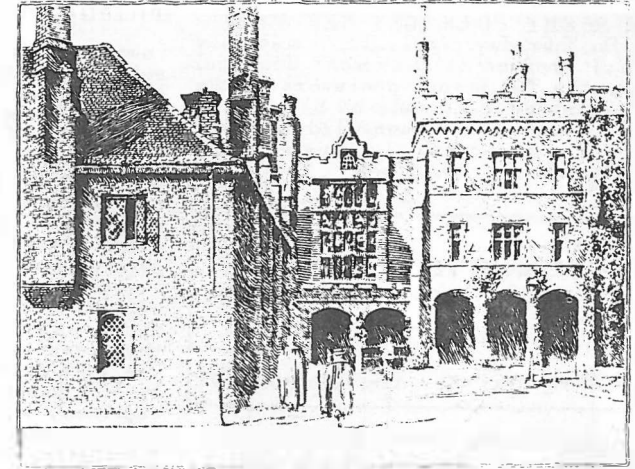
**FORMER ALPINE GIRL WEDS**

immediate interest in the idea of selecting Alpine for the center. They plan to come here to inspect sites, climatic records and so forth.

'We need 10 or more acres' Dormann told the Sun, 'which should be in an ideal scenic location, fairly level and not too far from the highway'.

First to be erected is a therapeutic workshop, with adjoining dormitories, where severely disabled patients may work to support themselves. Within 10 years the center will expand to include a clinic, vocational school and a dairy farm.

A fund drive next month, directed by S.D. business man Robt. C. Mason, chairman, will help finance the big project, with aid from private, state and federal grants expected eventually. Great interest has been expressed by Walt Disney, honorary chairman of the state society.

Note- If Alpine can land this project it will mean that other bodies when seeking locations for similar centers, could very likely choose Alpine, which would redound to the benefit of the entire community. May we suggest that anyone having a location suitable, get busy and donate or submit an offer.

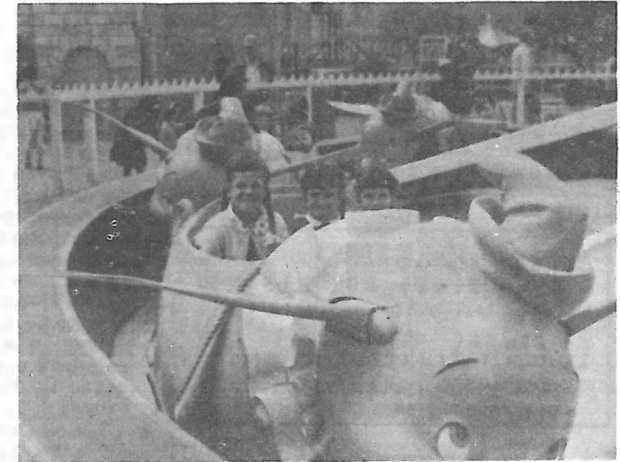
