One of the most encouraging reports to reach harrassed Alpine parents is the report from the last board meeting when Supt. David Everett revealed that a new senate bill (224) sets a maximum of 45¢ on local school bonds, so that, as this district is now paying 14¢ local and 25¢ on the state loan program, a total of 39¢, a bond issue could be voted for \$104,000 and would cost an added 12¢ or a total of 51¢ so it would appear that Alpine would be eligible for the 45¢ limit.

SMOG REACHES ALPINE AREA

Since 1919 when I returned from the Navy after WW1, to resume film publicity work in Hollywood, I have watched and studied the smoke menace, popularly known as smog, but smoke it really is, say scientists.

For all those years I have seen the hills of Hollywood and Culver City slowly disappear behind the scrim of auto and industry exhaust. As a boy in Santa Monica we daily looked across the channel to Catalina, up coast to Pt. Dume, south to Pt. Firmin. But today none are discernible except on rare windy days or after a rain.

Marching along with the ever-increasing smoke is gas and diesel consumption, plus growing cities and population. Recent figures show that there are over 10,750,000 trucks rolling across the nation, burning fuel to make 115 billion miles. California leads with 940,000. Streetcars have disappeared, replaced by thousands of smoking buses.

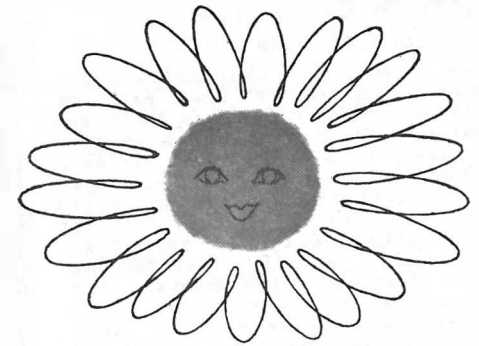
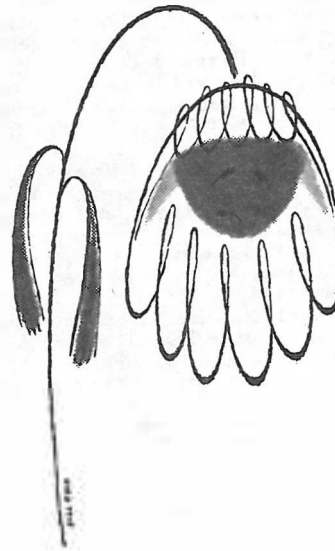
In the past two years I have flown much around the back country with Al Howe, also from Sacramento to the border. There is hardly a day you cannot go aloft and see a solid bank of smoke between L.A. and S.D., also Ensenada. It has now come to Alpine, as my two pictures graphically illustrate.

On Dec. 29, 1956 the Union ran two large smog pictures and a story about the 'dense, eye-smarting smog cloud again' gripping S.D. That was local smoke. Some days the L.A. pall rolls into S.D.

When I first came to Alpine in 1937 we never lost sight of the mountains; today they are partly hidden by smog. Then we had rains; Today we have a drought. Wells are drying up everywhere.

U.S. weather experts just revealed that air pollution-- smog and

MORE FLYING HEREBABOUTS

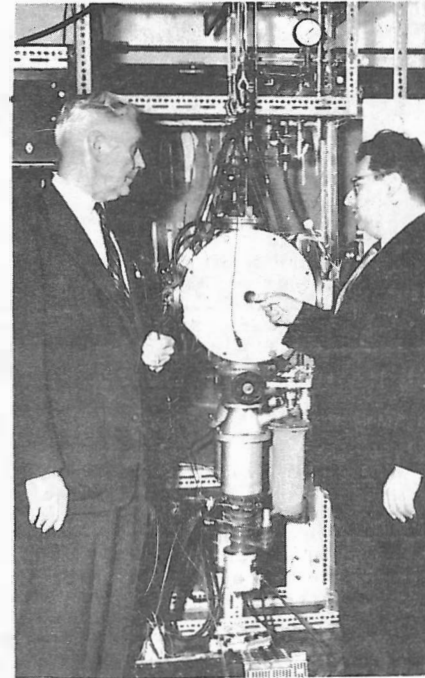
Another new landing strip for small planes has been added to the many in this country with the opening of Lake Wohlford's resort airport. This is another example of how private flying is increasing in this part of the west. It also shows the need for a landing field at Alpine, which has only two possibilities, Wright Mesa and the Viejas Reservation, the former being the best.

Gillespie Field, Manager Harry Culver told the Sun, is busier than ever, with 10,312 takeoffs and landings during May. Busiest single day logging 1002. This field is run 24 hours daily by the county, has many hangers, several private flying clubs and services.

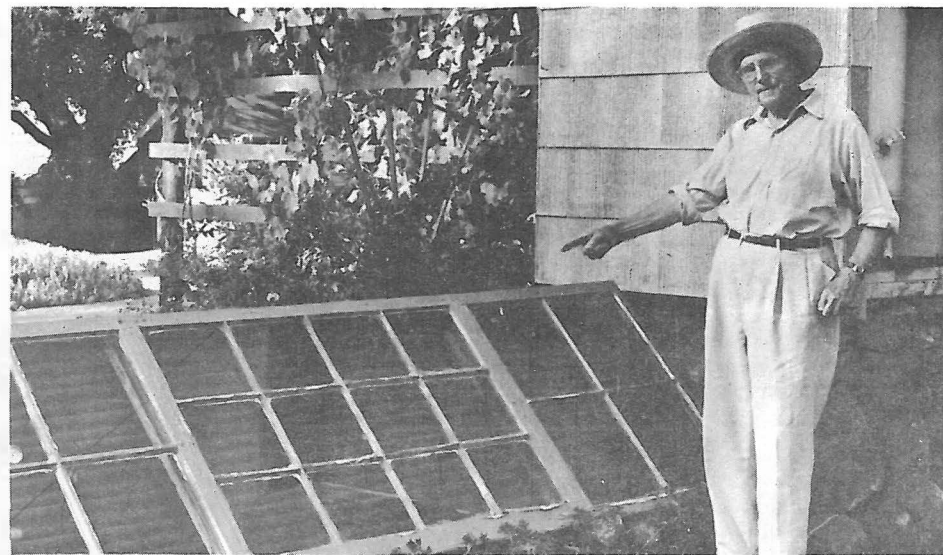

'This means that we could receive from \$200,000 to \$400,000' said Everett 'for a new school in Harbison Canyon, for example, and it would never cost us over 6¢ more in property taxes-- no matter how much we spent'.

It was ordered that the superintendent get a legal opinion on this new bill, followed by a survey to determine the attitude of the voters.

Note- If this proposition turns out to be as the board and Everett think, it is a bonanza that Alpine should grab at once. As nearly a third of the students are from the canyon, it would be better all around to build a branch down there and release classroom space here. It would also save transportation, plus time, and make for better school efficiency. The canyon is a growing community of fine people and deserves any benefit in school facilities the same as Alpine people. -CI
