A MEMBER OF THE CORONER JURY INVESTIGATING THE AWFUL TRAGEDY OF THE DEC. 1. FIRE IN CHICAGO AT THE CATHOLIC SCHOOL. REVEALED THAT THE EXPENSE OF A SPRINKLER SYSTEM FOR 50 YEARS WOULD HAVE COST LESS PER PUPIL THAN A PACK OF CIGARETTES!

THE JURYMAN IS DALE K. AUCK, DIRECTOR OF SAFETY FOR THE FEDERATION OF MUTUAL FIRE INSURANCE COMPANIES. HE MADE THE ANALYSIS ON THE COST IN THIS SCHOOL WHERE SOME 90 CHILDREN AND THREE NUNS DIED.

HIS ESTIMATE WAS \$10.500. OR \$8 APIECE FOR EACH OF THE 1200 PUPILS. HE DIVIDED THE \$8 BY 50 YEARS. THE TIME A SPRINKLER SYSTEM WOULD LAST. THAT GAVE ONLY 16¢ A PUPIL FOR FIRE PROTECTION.

IT WAS POINTED OUT THAT HAD IT BEEN INSTALLED, THE FIRE NEVER WOULD HAVE SPREAD AND ALL THOSE LIVES WOULD HAVE BEEN SPARED.

PERHAPS IT SHOULD BE MANDATORY FOR SPRINKLERS IN ALL
SCHOOLS AND INSTITUTIONS. AT
LEAST IN STRUCTURES THAT ARE
NO T FIREPROOF. AN ALARM
SYSTEM, COSTING FAR LESS THAN
WATER PIPES, WOULD HAVE ALERTED
THE WHOLE SCHOOL SO THEY
COULD HAVE ESCAPED BEFORE THE
FIRE ENGULFED THEM. • CJ







and any of the purposes specified in the education code. Main reason is to add classrooms and builtings to take care of

the huge population growth.
Also on the ballot is the question of increase in maximum tax rate of \$1.51 fo 1 1959-62. This is required in order to maintain present level of maintenance and operation of

the district.

California is experiencing a growth of more than 40.000 a month', points out Supt. Clyde Gilley, 'which represents the equivalent of an additional city almost the size of San Diego every year'. He adds that S.D. schools are growing faster, percentage-wise, than any other major American city except Memphis. Its growth obviously is eastward, which already is being felt here.

Another point for a yes vote is that the average daily at-

tendance here increased 230% between 1947 and 1957 while the number of classrooms jumped only 150%. Existing facilities can accommodate adequately only about 70% of present school

population.

The bond issue, state borrowing and the building program, to include a new plant on Harbison Canyon Road, as proposed by the board, have been endorsed by the PTA, Federated Women's Club, Kiwanis and a large representation of Canyon citizens and others.

School Vote Important

Supt. Clyde Gilley of Alpine School has released an urgent request from the school board that 'all registered voters go to the polls and vote 'yes' on all three propositions' to be balloted upon on Tuesday Jan. 27th.

The note was signed by John R. Reynolds, chairman; Robt. D. Wilson, vice-chairman; Laurence M. Wilcox, clerk, George A. Dowdy and Walter H. Gibb. On bonds, unless the issue

carries, the district will not qualify for much-needed state aid.

On state apportionment. unless this proposition passes. the district will have to bear the entire burden. Furthermore the bond issue alone will not be adequate to meet even immediate classroom needs.

On the tax rate, unless the rate of \$1.51 is continued as it has been for the past three years the rate will revert to 90¢ and this will not be sufficient to operate the schools for a full term.



Committee of the S.D. Water Authority.

Now it is ready to be sent to the Metropolitan Water District in L.A. If approved there on Feb. 10, and there is no reason to believe that it will not, it is returned to S.D. for legal and engineering work to be completed

ering work to be completed. Refigureing of assessments must be done and annexation fees fixed. Then it will be ready for the election which might come in about seven months. Boundaries must be affirmed, after which back taxes, assessments, and so on have to be estimated and about 5 to 10 years allowed for payment.

The S.D. committee will again pass upon it probably on March 10, after which final boundaries must be checked legally and by engineers, then it goes to the supervisors for a hearing and election date to be set, which follows in about 90 days to allow for processing and legal

advertising.

If voters approve, it again has to be checked back on assessed valuations for setting the annexation charges, by the S.D. office. It is required that another vote be taken to accept terms and conditions. If this balloting is successful, the Alpine district then becomes a member and pipelines are built to the acqueduct outlet below here. But first a local election must be held to secure bonds to build the local distribution pipelines, reservoir or tanks and sp forth.

The procedures were explained with much help by Allen Jones, assistant engineer of the S.D. authority, on which this story is based.

'Your district', he told, 'must then form its own board, one member from each of the five areas you divide the

district into'.

This board, with officers and a paid manager, will administer the main district and make all decisions as to locations of feeder lines, tanks or reservoirs, pipe sizes, costs, rates and so on.

'That is the most important part of your district work' he adds, 'as the success of its operation depends upon this board. Over in Poway it was well planned and executed and they are operating very successfully today'.

As to actual rates for water when it comes, that is a big problem based on original costs and the local district costs, maintainence, etc.

C.R. Crull of the Byrl Phelps office, engineers, has given much help for this and former stories, sends the following rates as an example of what various areas pay for water. Alpine will be somewhere in that bracket, perhaps a bit higher on account of distance and lift.

Note- One thing is obviously inevitable; Alpine must get water, and it must get it as soon as possible. With drouth years, this winter so far being the worst in two decades, the water table steadily receding and many wells going dry, it is imperative that Alpine get busy and prepare for the advent of its water district. There is going to be lots of planning and work to do when it does come, and five responsible citizens will have to be chosen to run the district. But it is well worthwhile. In Poway. Ramona and other communities where water was brought in, acreage jumped in price from \$300 to \$500 up to \$5,000 and even \$6,000 an acre!-CI
