Forest Fire Danger Season Opened Yesterday!



Ten of the county's 21 forestry fire stations opened yesterday, reports James Fenlon, district ranger, state forestry. The other 11 will open as fire dangers increase.

Although county, state and federal forces are increasing, the fire menace continues to rise. Most are started by careless smokers and motorists. Americans smoked cigarettes

last year at the upping rate of 185 packs for everyone 15 and up. Output was 470 billion, 6% above the old record.

We wail over higher taxes, need for schools, more highways, water and other things, yet the nation puffs away over \$5½ billion a year! The tax take on this is nearly \$2½ billion. Money spent on liquor is also rising to record heights.

The forest fire season is dangerous to watersheds and property, sometimes lives, but the smoking danger is ever menacing more lives than property. Science daily is discovering evidence that tobacco tars cause cancer. When will the nation start calling a halt to this consuming habit? -CI

Know Your TEACHER

As we continue talks with our teachers, we now meet Mrs. Catherine Hamilton, a person of various talents. She was born in Pittsburgh, Pa., educated in Ohio and San Diego. Upon graduation from high school in Ohio, she was awarded a scholarship to Hiram College. After that she taught for a year in Warren, then followed a year of social service work. San Diego became her home after her marriage in 1939.

Mrs. Hamilton was the first editor with Alice Bellas, official publication, which is now known as the 'Chaparral Poets of Los Angeles'. In 1940 and 41, she was also editor of the poetry magazine, 'Beat of Wings'.

While her husband was overseas, she was employed by Consolidated Aircraft as an engineer draftsman. Then, in 1943, her daughter was stricken with polio. She took her and their other child to Guadalajara, Mexico, where, for two years, by giving her constant attention and therapy, she helped Christine over the worst hurdle of her bout with polio.

'When we went to Mexico', she said, the extent of my vocabulary was 'Thank You' and 'please', but after steady association with the Mexican people, it wasn't long before I was speaking their language'.

After several years away from teaching, Mrs. Hamilton went back to the schoolroom in 1945, when the family went to Texas. They lived in various sections



of Texas, where she taught until 1951. They came back to San Diego that year, where she taught for 4 years in city schools.

In 1956 she was forced to take a rest and she and the girls were invited to Spain to visit relatives. 'That was a delightful year', she said. Everyone was wonderful to us, We attended balls, the opera in Barcelona and visited caves. My only regret was that I didn't get a chance to do more (digging), my hobby being archeology.'

After their year in Spain, the Hamilton's returned to San Diego. She came to Alpine in the fall of '57, as a Fourth grade teacher, and has handled the Sixth this past year.

Mrs. Hamilton has received her A.B. and B.E. degrees during summers at State College, is at present working on her Master's in English. Her daughters are also students at State. Last month the board accepted her resignation with regret. 'I have enjoyed my two years' teaching in Alpine' she commented, 'and would like to continue here, but there is so much that I could do with the time I spend commuting, that I feel I must have my work closer to home.'

either side of Hwy 80 near chocolate canyon, but a geological study is required before the spot is decided upon. Elevation must be 1400, plus or minus, to conserve energy needed to pump over the rim of the plateau south of the S.D. River.

He points out that the reservoir, transmission main and pumping station were taken from an engineering study, so the main can give 24 hours daily service and to store water for peak periods. The pumping will be designed as a flexible unit for economy during transition years, yet large enough for future demands.

It would not be economical to raise all the water to the highest levels when 2/3ds of it can be sent by gravity from the 1400-foot level. Small pumps can boost it to higher areas cheaper.

"Water will encourage development of many areas' Cruss told the Sun yesterday 'which will increase assessed valuation almost at once. This will help decrease the tax rate throughout. We will be glad to answer further queries in the next issue of the Sun'.

Fascinated readers of a unique
San Diego County paper called
BUY 'N SELL POST never lack for
printed matter to keep their in-
terest aroused. Which is all the
more unusual when you know that
the paper has no stories, no
articles--just 16 pages of
classified ads.

Every week, thousands of loyal
devotees meander from column to
column, skipping from 'Swap' to
'Sporting Goods,' 'Miscellane-
ous' to 'Boats.' And though they
may only be in the market for
chandeliers, an imported Mah
Jong set, electric poultry
pickers, or a fancy dress sword,
they get a vicarious thrill out
of encountering some of the off-
trail items for sale. These
range from circus animals 'slight-
ly trained,' to church bells, a
cement plant, breweries, or
maybe even a complete broad-
casting station.

Bargains there are aplenty.
If you just happen to be looking
for '150 pieces of decorative
mirror, each exactly 1 1/2" x 9"...'
the whole lot is yours for only
six bucks. Engagement rings,
bridal gowns, and maternity out-
fits are snapped up week after
week at sacrifice prices.

The BUY 'N SELL POST was the
novel idea of 30 year old Mel
Lippman, who could not find a
second-hand iron one day and
decided the community could use

a modest publication listing
items for sale and exchange.
After a slow start, the idea has
caught fire and today the paper
boasts a county wide circulation.
Lippman requires a staff of four
employees and four distributors
to handle the mushrooming busi-
ness.

The entire success of the
paper is based on what you might
call the honor system. People
pay nothing to place ads, and
they do not owe the paper a cent
until they make a sale. The sel-
ler can keep his text brief or
ramble on at some length about
the virtues of his offering.
When the item is sold through
the paper, he then pays a per-
centage of the selling price.
10% in the case of general mer-
chandise, 5% on cars, boats,
house trailers, trucks, the only
exception is 'Wanted and Dealer'
ads (and some of the personals,
where the user pays a straight
\$2.50 fee for 25 words.)

What do you want--three barber's
chairs, a cement mixer, pin-ball
machines, two diners, a 30-
foot soda fountain, ping pong
partners, a beer cooler?

If you don't find it, in BUY
'N SELL POST, advertise for it.
About the only thing you can't
get through the BUY 'N SELL
POST, whose office is located at

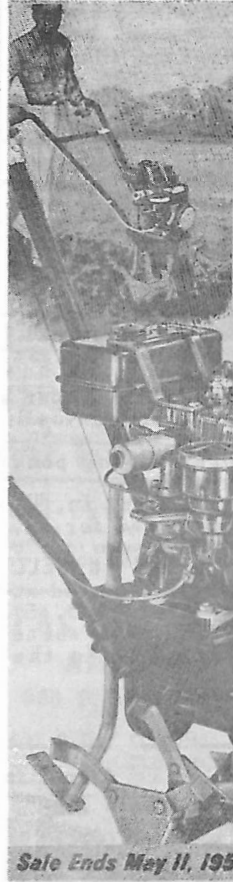
