EDITORIAL.



Selection of Teachers is in Capable Hands

It seems that schools have cycles of unrest, discredits

and a few petty annoyances that in due time fall off and leave the school mostly better than before.

That has been happening here, where apparent efforts to question the ability of the school board and the superintendent to replace several teachers (who resigned as of school's end), with competent replacements.

We know the board gives pretty close attention to this important function. Moreover, the superintendent's 30 years of administrative experience, during which he has constantly evaluated and recommended teachers, makes us believe that parents have every reason to feel confident that the education of their children is in competent hands.

In our judgement the ability of our teachers and the quality of classroom instruction is being constantly upgraded.

True, parents do not, or at least should not, base the education of their children on buildings alone. Conversely, parents do not base the teaching of their children on instructors alone. After all, they do want sufficient classrooms in which their children can attend for the purpose of being taught by well-qualified teachers. -CI

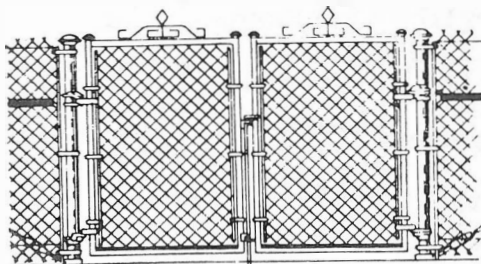

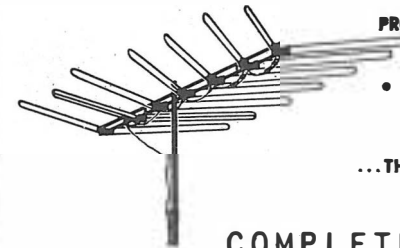

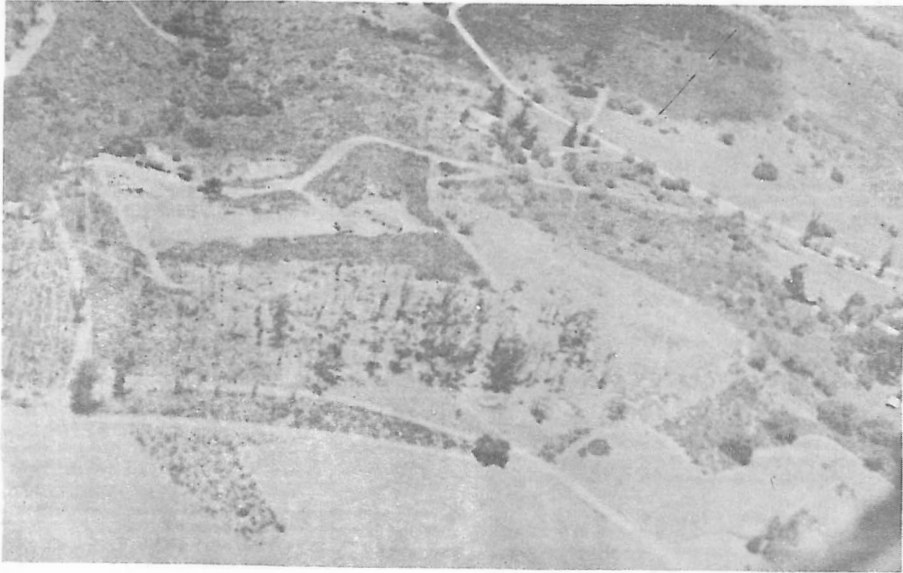

started and an election called for June 16'. Only 18 voters signed a petition to the supervisors, and already complaints have been received from others in the area involved. (see map elsewhere) who wanted to be in the original ECMWD.

'It looks like a plan to split the district' he said, 'and the only way to prevent it is to get out and vote against it'. Some of the properties included--without the owners' agreement--is the Bruce Ledford tract where the proposed new school is to be built.

Same as Phelps and others, the Sun had no knowledge of this heights district till it appeared in a S.D. paper. It was not revealed who was behind it or who circulated the petition. Even if formed, this district would not be entitled to water from the S.D. or Metropolitan sources. It appears to be a mere block to the ECMWD.

Scruggs told of a woman who had called him as she had 168 acres but is not a resident and cannot vote. 'She was much disturbed' he said, 'and we wonder if this is the American way of doing things?' Several at the meeting mentioned that they had not been interviewed and were included in the heights area against their desire.

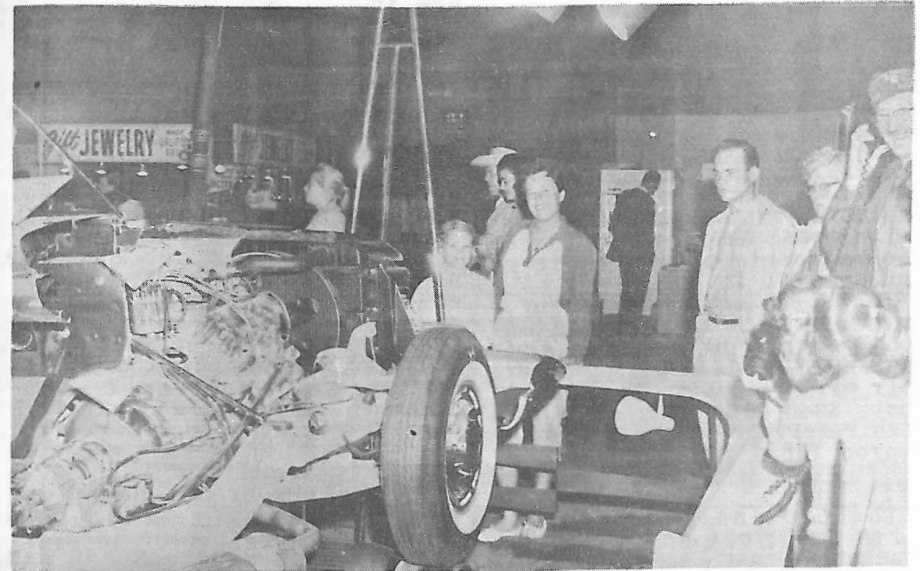

state's municipal water district act is arbitrary and the owner has no chance to say anything except to vote no; 41 noes will safeguard it'.

Cdr. F.R. McDonnell, USN ret'd., made a brief talk on behalf of his area (Navy Hill) in the heights district, mainly asking what the cost would be. Phelps promised to work it up and send it to him.

Tentative estimate is for a pressure line from the 1400-foot reservoir to a peak in Alpine where a 1½ million gallon reservoir will be built. Approximate cost, \$345,000. Also cost of a high reservoir west of Harbison Canyon for 1 million gallons, including pipelines, about \$215,000.

The original cost for the large reservoir and line from Slaughter House Canyon would be assessed at \$1.60 per \$100. of assessed valuation as of 1959. These additional works would cost 82¢. 'Any increases in valuation in the entire district will decrease the above figures' Phelps promised.

So none will be under a misunderstanding, Phelps pointed out a few pertinent facts: The entire district will be entitled to water. Costs of trunk lines and tanks will be assessed to the property on the assessed valuations by a general obligation bond. Water definitely can be here in two years. Galloway Valley and the Canyon will get theirs also in two years. Their distribution lines are

now in.

Trunk lines, elevated tanks, reservoirs and pumps will be built by the initial bonds so that all lands can be served when they install their own distribution lines, a further expense incurred only when a group feels they want water. All areas will receive from the Slaughter House Canyon line, the first one to be large enough to serve the district. Greater population and need for water would be paid for by the increase in assessments.

Phelps pointed out that 'You get what you pay for: the right to have Colorado water; the right to say when you want it; a better water system for fire protection; use of your present well is not restricted'.

Another important point on which the entire water plan hinges, is that Alpine is only a small part of the ECMWD and having a larger population per area, has a greater need for water as wells are drying up.

He adds that Navy Hill was deleted when they requested it, but the S.D. Water Authority included them in the boundary.

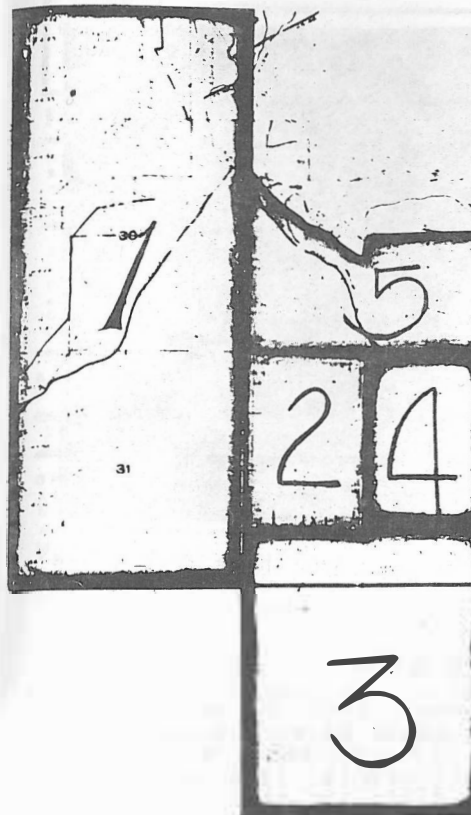
Petitions by property owners in the heights district are being sent out so they may protest to the supervisors to exclude their lands from the heights. Voters in that area are also urged to vote no at the June 16 election. Protests and petitions may be sent to the Water Committee, PO Box 65, Alpine, for forwarding to the county.

In summing it up, Phelps, a property owner here who plans to retire to live here, said 'In forming any district, some are not pleased, but the majority must keep up progress in helping to get highways, water systems, and zoning to make a community a better place to live in'.

Know Your TEACHER

Jeanette Schuster, better known as 'Jay' to her associates, is a familiar figure around the elementary school. For the past three years, she has acted in the capacity as teacher-counselor, testing and counselling students.

Philadelphia born, she was educated in a girls school until she entered high where she was a student at George School, nationally known Quaker co-educational in Pa.

'Isn't it ironic,' she says, 'that with the public school so much a part of my life now, I never saw the inside of one until I first started teaching 12 years ago.'

As a result of competitive examinations after high school, she was sent to Temple University, where she began an experimental teachers' training course, having been granted the Woman's open scholarship. Unfortunately, the depression came before she could complete four years of college, and she was forced to leave. She enrolled in the Pierce School of Business Administration in Philadelphia. He planned to continue his education on his GI Bill. They were married and as her husband attended college she continued her studies, receiving her A.B. at Calif. Western. Finally reaching her goal as a teacher, for which she had yearned for many years, she taught for 12



years in everything from a one room rural to a departmentalized Junior High. She received her special training in testing and reading at Whittier College. All of her teaching experience was in Kern County, San Juan Valley, until the family moved to Alpine three years ago.

The Schusters, with their daughter Jan, are now living in their own home in Santee, where in her spare time she raises Chihuahua dogs. He teaches in El Cajon.

Mrs. Schuster still finds time to attend State College. This summer she will complete her administrative credentials. Next summer she expects to receive her Masters but 'I am not stopping there,' she claims, 'and don't expect to until I get my doctorate. It took me long enough to get started on my teaching career, but now I've started, I can't stop.'

Mrs. Schuster has traveled extensively, mostly with her father. She has been all over the U.S., Canada, Nova Scotia, West Indies and Cuba. She resigned her position here to teach a special class in the E.C. school district for mentally retarded children. Her reason: 'I have always been extremely interested in the slow learning child and feel that besides the need being so great for teachers in this field, it will be a personal experience and help to me in understanding the needs of this type of child.'
