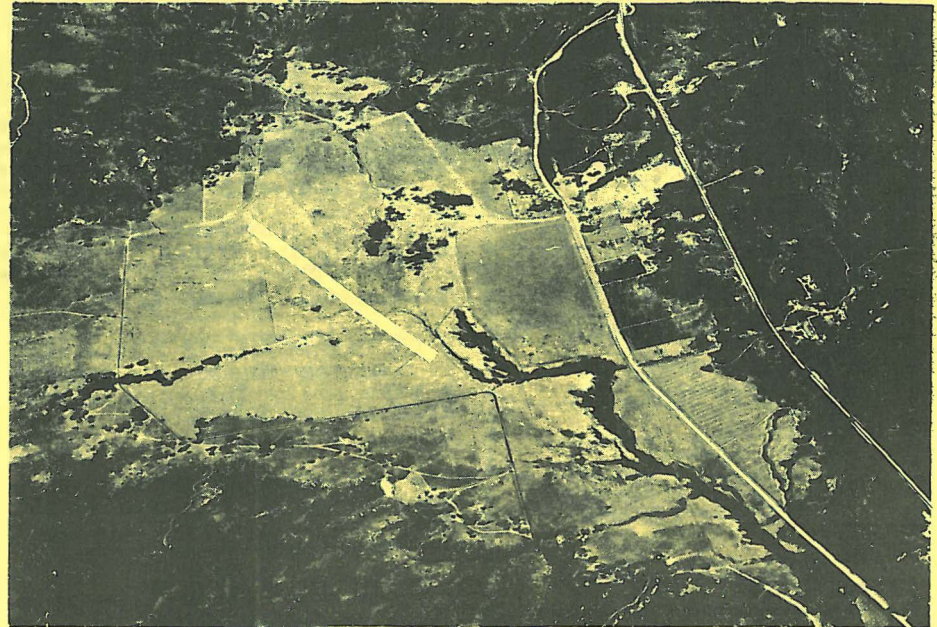

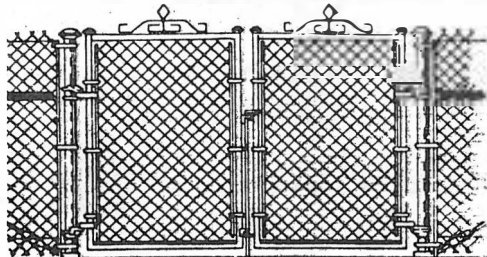

it as an accident for the body was found on the rocks only 12 feet below a dirt road south of where Peutz Valley Road enters Hwy 80. Skull fracture caused death, the autopsy showed. Sgt. E.P. 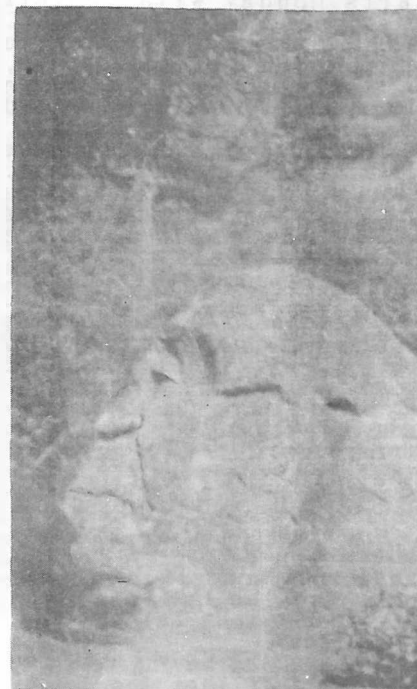

Maps and legal descriptions of land within the East County Municipal Water district have been approved by the S.D. County Water Authority and are now en route to the Metropolitan in L.A.; Byrl D. Phelps told the Sun at presstime.

'The bulk of the people in this area help the whole state in its big water problem' he said 'by signing petitions for this district, and by voting it in when the election comes'.

Those outside the district cannot benefit unless they are within the approved and legal boundaries of the ECMWD, he added. (See Editor's note).

The district is progressing and making good time he believes and will come to election shortly. It will pass without doubt, leaders and committeemen believe, and when voted in, actual work will be started as soon as possible.

Friday night a special committee meeting was held in Walter Gibb's patio with people from other water districts present to discuss the heights election and how best to defeat it.

They came up with a cute idea, and all campaigned for a write-in board of directors who are opposed to the heights deal. No matter which way the election went, they have a sympathetic board which can help the ECMWD in this manner. The law allows sections of a district to petition the directors to withdraw. Thus the board will allow their exclusion, after which they will disband!

Note- It seems that some opposing moves, as this water problem, did not get the full facts. It was said that the Sun's figure of 18 voters signing the heights petition, was erroneous. We quoted Byrl Phelps, engineer. On the phone at presstime he said 'The recorder gave us the 18 figure of ELIGIBLE voters. I do not know how many SIGNED it.'

Phelps reiterated that we could have water here within two years after the district was voted in. He did not say that the heights people were trying to wreck the big district; he said SOMEONE. It is a fact that the heights district is not formed to get water, but to stay out of the main district so as to avoid paying to get water into Alpine. They do not, nor will they get, entitlement to Colorado water. Moreover, if and when their wells dry up, as in the Helix district, they will have to pay back taxes plus other costs if they decide to ask for inclusion in the ECMWD.

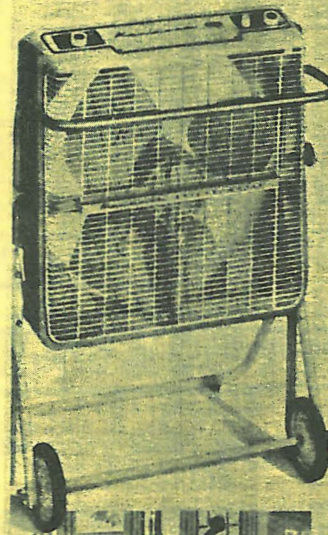

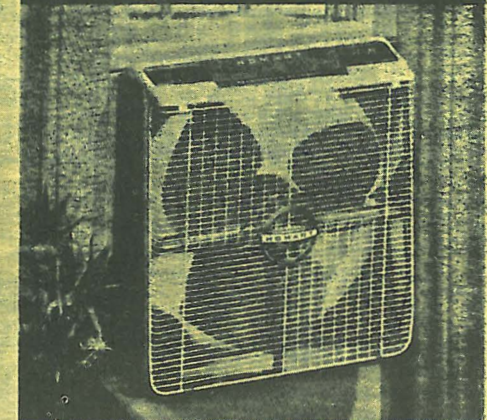
