ALPINE NEEDS A PHOTOGRAPHER

A Message to Young Drivers

A raging fire that started when a young driver failed to negotiate a mountain curve on Ortega Highway near Elsinore, sparked one of California's worst forest fires in death and injuries.

Monday two fine men of the U.S. Forestry service died of agonizing burns when they and 26 others tried desperately to hold a rushing wall of flames that burned the extremely dry brush.

Many were injured and 21 severely burned, five critically. Two houses were lost. Many were

scorched. Firemen sweated and hacked a firebreak around the blazing hill.

When a fire starts is not the time to cut firebreaks that the government should have made months before. Money for this goes to foreign aid while the domestic scene goes up in smoke.

Smart and selfish, careless and ignorant drivers cause the huge national death toll. The automobile is a grand machine when handled with wisdom. So is the airplane. It is the callous, and the smart squirts that cause the trouble; the young show-offs who gun their hotrods to make the tires squeal, and otherwise make themselves obnoxious to the normally-minded motorists and others.

That is how many accidents happen to drivers that are licensed by the state. We believe that every motorist should be given a more rigorous physical examination, and his record, like that of a pilot, should be kept and used against him if he does not conduct himself properly.

It came out later that the dead trucker had tried to pass a car on a curve while fleeing from a drinking picnic following a fight. He had a keg of beer on board. He died and his passenger is in critical condition.

From Edward G. Heilman, Descanso District Ranger, comes this letter that should be read to every young driver and other unthinking person.

"Ben Slater was my friend... Ben died protecting your land—do you appreciate it? You should. Ben was one of the most capable, likeable men I've ever met. I'll miss him—so will you. So will his wife and two daughters'.

Please be careful with fire!"

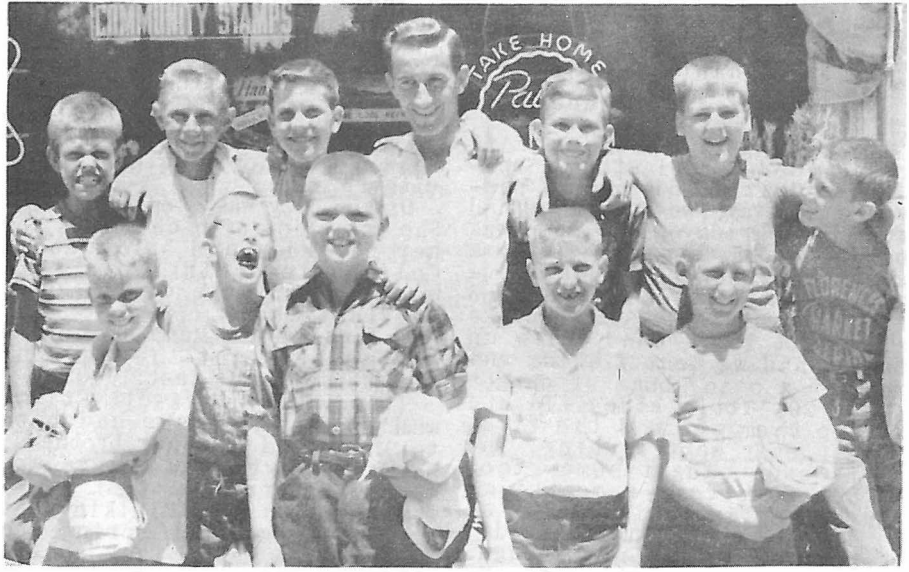

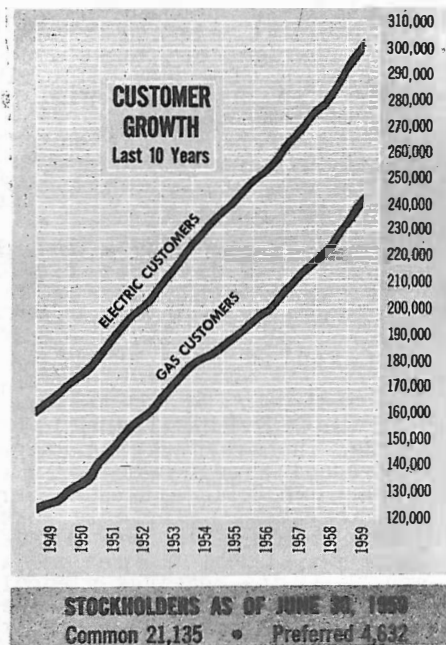

Mrs. Sidney Wright

Final services were held at All Saints Episcopal Church in S.D. last Thursday for Mrs. Anna B. Wright, 86, widow of Sidney A. Wright. She died of a heart attack in the Cobb Nursing Home, 873 Arnold Way on Monday. Cremation followed. Wright also died of a heart ailment at their Olivewood Lane home on May 28. She was a native of Tarrytown, N.Y.

Only survivor is a cousin, Mrs. Ida Peck Need, Madison, Conn. The bulk of the estate over 250 acres on Southgrade

road, estimated to be worth more than \$250,000, goes to the church in S.D. Other property goes into a lifetime trust income for Mrs. Need.

The Wrights were married here, where they met when her mother, Mrs. Pedro Segura, wife of a wealthy Spaniard of Cuba, came here in 1908 for health reasons. Wright had arrived earlier with his mother, who bought the Arnold house, corner Tavern & Arnold Way. He had asthma and his doctor in Bangor, Me., had heard of the fine climate here that helped asthmatics.

Monte Erabazon, of Willows Rd., who was born here, remembers that he was in his first year at the old school, in 1900, knew Sidney who was in his last year. Then came the romance of young Wright and the beautiful Spanish miss, and they were soon married, lived in the Arnold home till they bought the present ranch from a S.D. teacher, Miss Kate Peck, who kept old retired horses on it, for humane reasons. Wright sold some to a Mr. Bacon who raised grapes, but the deer ate them and he got disgusted, put up a sign 'Ranch be Damned' and sold it, now owned by Mrs. Mary Findel. Being well-to-do, Wright never had to work, but did run cattle as a hobby. Mrs. Wright was widely traveled, her first language being French as she spent her early childhood in Paris, studied music in Germany, lived in Switzerland. She had collected many valuable antiques, silver, books and other items that were auctioned last month in S.D.

Note- It little behooves one to criticize the dead, but it seems puzzling that Wright passed on without leaving a few dollars to the town where he had grown up and lived, for a memorial library, a swimming pool or baseball park for the youngsters, or anything at all to help make this old planet a better place for future generations!- CI

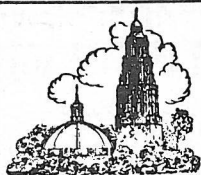

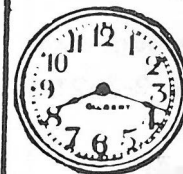

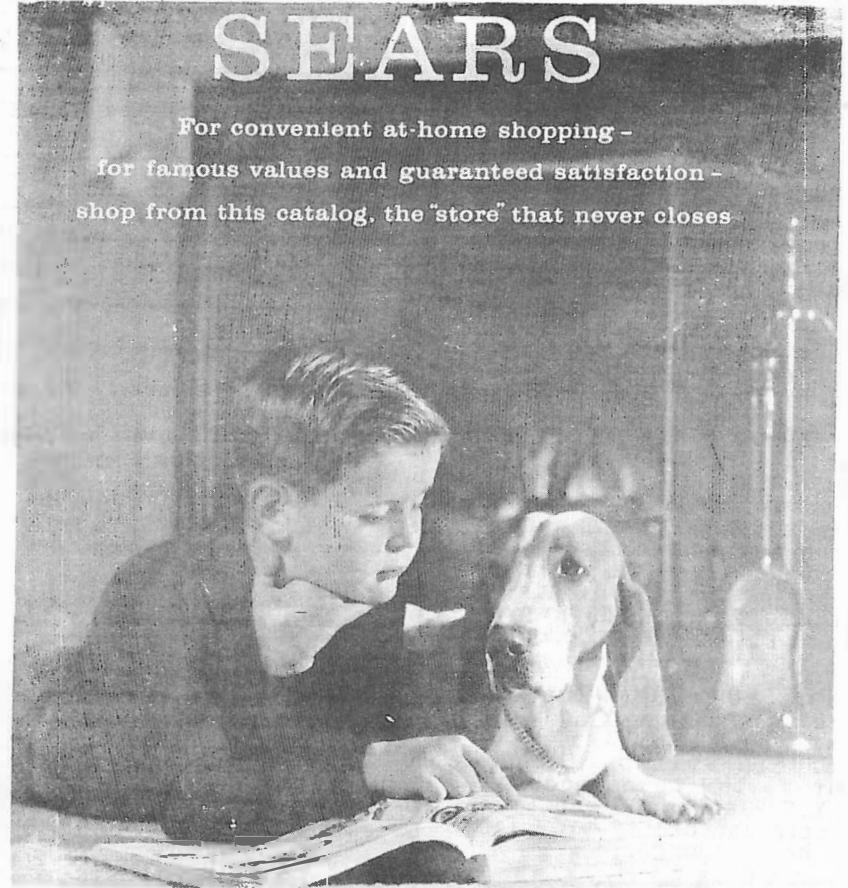
