


## Echo Changes Hands



#### MANAGERS FOR REST HOME





HEART STILL KILLER Dr. J.B. Askew, county health director, reveals that heart and circulatory diseases top the death list for the area. Of a total of 6605 deaths, 3382 were from this cause, the heart alone being charged with 2373 deaths. Cancer followed with 1059, accidents, 450 in-cluding 213 traffic deaths, and suicides 123. TB dropped to 38 but polio had only four. Note- The experts today charge animal fats, hydrogenated oils (heat-treated), and other things including tobacco and alcohol, with causing heart attacks. First thing they do when one has such a seizure is to take away butter, cream and other animal grease. One reason, they say, why animal fats are not easy to digest, is that the stomach must first saponify (make soap of), or emulsify the foreign fat. vegetable oils, as avocados and such, if not processed, are readily digestible.




## Milt Paris to Bowl


#### FOREST REOPENED
