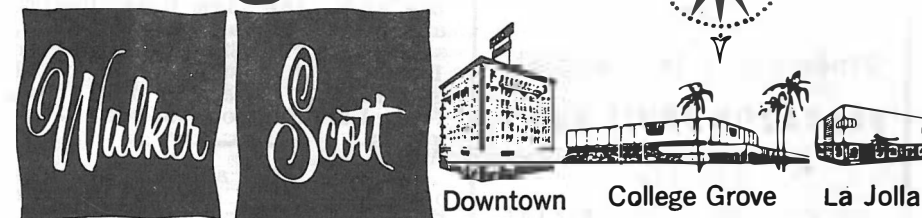

EDITORIAL

You are Responsible for Prevention, Control of Fires.

Last week this community narrowly missed what might have been a disastrous brush fire. Luckily it was contained with no building loss.

But that should only enliven prevention of fires, for government fire fighting crews are not stationed out in the hills to save your home, but to preserve forests and watersheds.

Ed G. Heilman, district ranger at Descanso, says that "Although the forest service will attempt control of structural fires, it is trained, equipped, and legally responsible for watershed fire protection."

An example of this responsibility would be the case where a burning building had caused

fire to spread into surrounding watershed. Assuming no risk of life was involved, the service would have to control the watershed fire before attempting control of the building fire. Communities desiring more intensified fire protection have formed fire districts or volunteer fire departments to supplement this watershed protection.

That is why residents of Alpine back in 1946 chipped in pro-rata on assessed tax values, and instituted the first fire department, forming a district, which today has a splendid building, equipment and a lively crew of volunteers who serve the community in the finest manner, always cooperating with government men.

But that does not excuse each resident from helping prevent fires by observing burning rules, handling of fire and incinerators, and in general being ever watchful for fire in this very dry season. —CI

Dedicate Power Plant

A conducted tour of the great new SD Gas & Electric Co. power plant at Chula Vista, with dedication, was made Wednesday for city and county officials, members of press, radio & TV and other guests.

Emery D. Sherwin, president, in dedication, said the plant is putting out 142,000 kilowatts from the \$22½ million facility, a second unit to start in 1962 for \$18½ million. In time there will be eight units at this site, Sherwin told. He gave many exciting facts about the company's growth along with the area, the firm today having an investment of \$225 million, soaring from \$29½ million in 1940. In this span their total generating capacity has grown from 110,000 to 809,000 kilowatts.

Geo. Hatch, architect, has been signed to draw plans for the new Community Church School. Over \$22,000 has been pledged.

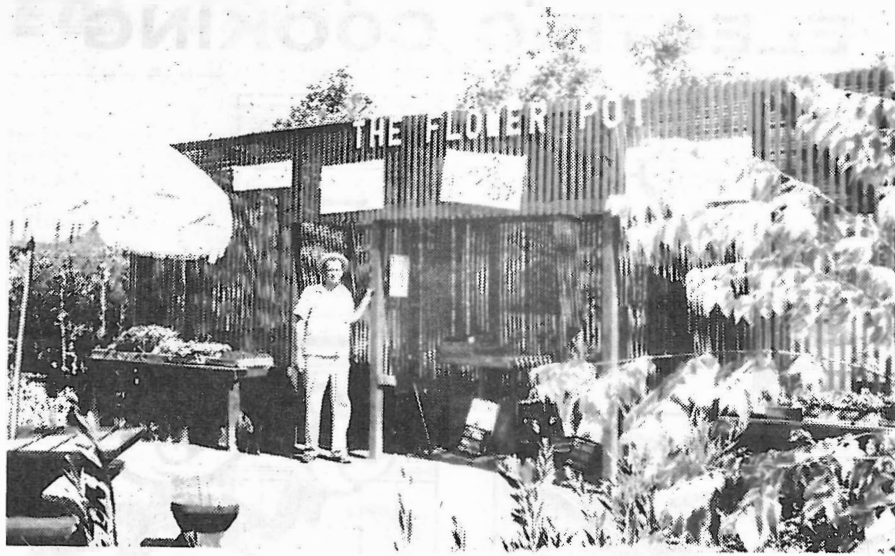

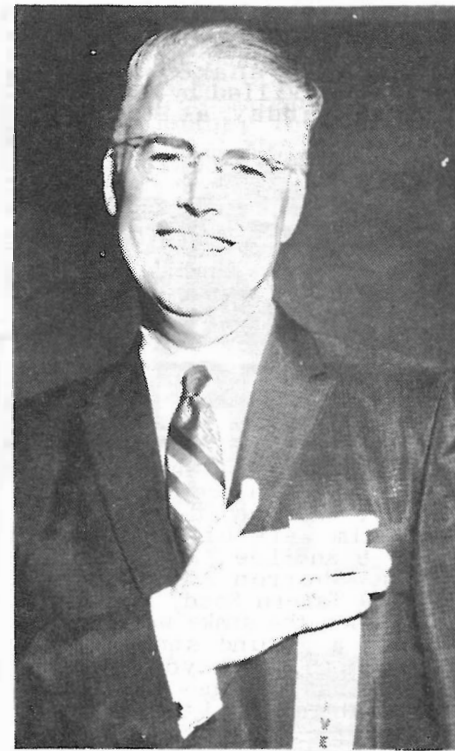

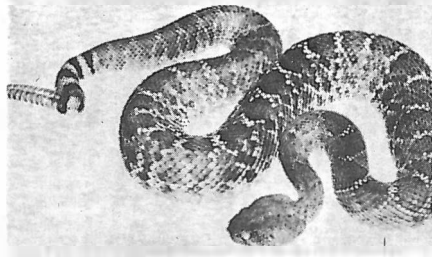

Kill Huge Rattler

A 52 inch snake with 17 rattles was killed by a hiking party Saturday at the dry



falls on the SD River north of Virjas Mountain, reports Ronnie Chaney, who headed the group. With him were his two sons, Terry 8 and Lee 7, the Silver twins, Sharron and Kharron, of 1539 Tavern Road, and Susie Hill. When the snake was spotted it had a ground squirrel in its mouth. The youngsters handed Chaney stones with which he bashed in its head.

"It was surely a whopper" he says. He operates Empire Garage here and has seen many timber rattlers up in Oregon where he was a logger.

"It measured 2½ inches in diameter, was not a black diamond, but was brown. It didn't have any diamond design at all. First one I'd ever seen. He had fangs 5/8 of an inch long!"

Chaney warned to beware of cool, damp places along dry creeks where snakes in hot weather search for water.

Note- And don't just kill every snake you see. We have king and gopher snakes that are valuable rodent eaters, and the king will kill a rattler. The picture above, from SD Zoo, shows a real rattler. Note the flat, broad head, heavy body with diamond pattern, and of course the rattles, which they don't always rattle before striking. CI

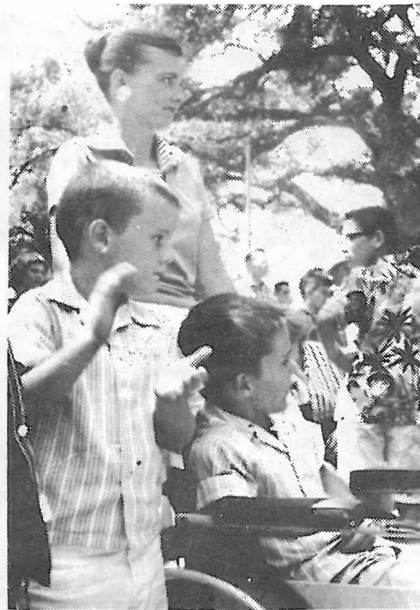

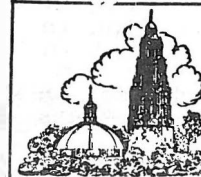

tained. No structures were damaged.

John LaPointe, who lives on the Fenton estate at the bottom of the grade, saw the actual start when a large truck and trailer zoomed down shooting sparks from brakes. When it neared the brush at the bottom the sparks spurted out, started blazes on both sides of Hwy 80. He rushed to Fairview Station to call in an alarm. Someone had already notified the Flinn Springs station and Alpine.

For a time it looked bad, but they kept the fire from crossing lower South Grade, extinguished that on the north of 80. It is a good indication of how essential care is at this time, say forestry men. (How we need firebreaks in the back country!)

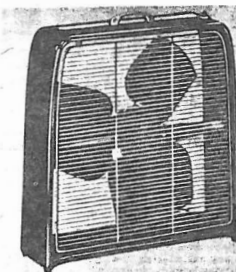
