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surgery, and only one of two were removed.

Not only is cancer a killer for smokers, but it has been shown that coronary heart disease results from it. The American Heart Association recently stated that heavy cigarette smoking contributes to or accelerates development of the ailment, today's leading cause of death.

Their figures showed that death rates in middle-aged men were found to be from 50 to 150% higher among heavy smokers than in abstainers. In the cancer society study of 187,000 white males between 50 and 69, smokers were found to be in 70% greater danger, or, of the 11,870 deaths during the 44 months' study, 385 were called excess heart attack deaths associated with smoking.

Users of two or more packs daily ran an attack death rate of 2.4 times that of non-smokers. The most startling fact in these studies is that lung cancer mortality is 36,000 a year and heart attacks nearly




Mama got a letter from our Aunt Dorothy and we found out we have another little girl cousin named Janet. We are going up Thanksgiving to see her.

She points out, however, anyone registering now will not be eligible to vote in the General Election on Nov. 1. but can vote in future water elections and others.







deliberately ignore the economic tone of the area for political considerations. They fear the truth will jeopardize their political hopes in November... This newspaper believes the people are entitled to the facts, no matter how unpleasant they may be ... We believe our readers would cease to respect us, and rightly, if we attempted to conceal, dilute, or sugarcoat the news merely because it was urmleasant".

Of vital importance in keeping a horse in good condition is in feeding new grain or hay a well-balanced diet consisting of roughhage, salt, water and feed concentrates. Following are some rules to be followed:


1- Feed regularly: horses soon become accustomed to a certain feeding schedule and 1f this routine is not followed they often become fretful and nervous. Regular feeding also can create a real friendship between master and animal. which in itself can make handling and training easier.

2- Food rations must be adjusted according to the needs of the horse. When horses are being worked severely they require more grain and less hay. When horses are idle they should have their grain ration reduced one third to one-half and the hay in-creased. Like humans, each horse is an individual and certain changes made to suit its needs. Some are "easy keepers" being able to stay in good shape with less feed. Long-barrelled horses tend to be hard keepers, having a need

for very heavy feeding in order to maintain good condition.





Despite huge growth of the postoffice system in America, utilization of modern accounting and other procedures, the department is saving \$20 million a year, Postmaster Phil Hall relates.


This comes by decentralization from Washington to 15 regional offices which now handle pay roll and other checks with latest electronic machines. More use of planned vehicles to provide fast, efficient service has also saved much to taxpayers, says Hall.

"Conversion to more efficient types and retirement of worn out units" he adds, "is a result of modernization and improvement programs started in 1954 by Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield".

Total machines in the service now is 36,871, including 8500 bought in fiscal 1960, he adds, while in 1953 it had but 18,969, and there were only 115 units purchased that year, showing the huge increase. The service handled a massive volume of 64 billion pieces of mail in fiscal 1960, a 25% rise since 1953, he concluded. Alpine in its small office, of course, benefits by all this in faster and better mail service.




SCHOOL ENROLLMENT ZOOMS


"This town's going to grow now! If you aren't ready, you'll have a mess," said Hodge, "so let's get this thing off the ground".
