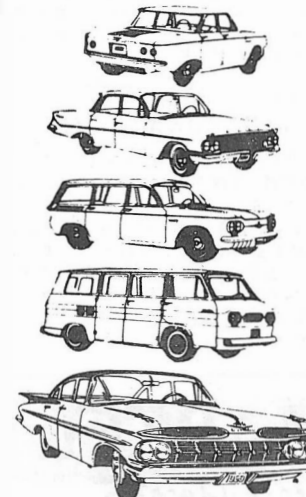

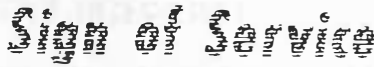

FLUORIDATION GETS GATE

The Cardiff-Leucadia-Encinitas area defeated the proposed fluoridation of drinking water at last week's election by a resounding score of 1490 to 396. San Dieguito MWD had put it on the ballot at the request of the Encinitas PIA.

Questions and Answers About the **WATER PLANS**

QUESTION: Why do we have to pay a connection fee when we have voted bonds?

ANSWER: The connection fee plan makes it possible to install the entire system and to provide for growth with **ONLY ONE BOND ISSUE**. Without the fee the district would have to have either a huge bond issue to pay for everything at once or have a series of little bond issues for each distribution line.

QUESTION: Is the connection fee fair?

ANSWER: The combination of bonds and fees is one of the most fair plans possible. Thus all benefit, some because the value of all property is increased by being in the district and having water available. For this reason all pay some taxes which go for interest and principal on bonds.

However, those who use water benefit the most, and only those who use it pay the fee or pay for water.

QUESTION: What will the connection fee pay for?

ANSWER: It pays for three things: First, \$125. is for a meter, lead-in pipe to your property line and the saddle with which it is connected to the main.

Second, \$250. pays the user's share of the distribution system. It is the same for all whether they hook to a main trunk or to a distribution main.

Third, the remainder is to retire bonds and issued to provide funds for trunk lines, reservoirs and pumping stations.

QUESTION: Why isn't the connecting fee the same for everyone?

ANSWER: Most of it is the same for all. Everyone who needs a meter is charged the same and the distribution

system will cost the same. In those cases where people on small mutual systems already have adequate meters and lead-ins a fair allowance will be made IF the meters and lead-ins are adequate. Allowances will also be made where a district has a good system of modern distribution mains. The better the equipment the greater the allowance.

QUESTION: Is there any other reason for the fee to be more for some than for others?

ANSWER: Yes. The part of the fee that is used for retirement of bonds is greater at high levels than at low levels. In Flinn Springs below 1000 feet requires only one stage of pumping and one reservoir. Therefore their share of the cost is smaller and only \$60. is charged to retire the bonds. Their total fee is \$435. The second level, from 1000 to 1400 feet, requires two levels of pumping and two levels of reservoirs as well as more pipelines. Thus the second level bears a greater share of the cost, and \$80. is charged to each fee to retire the bonds. This makes their fee larger than that for the lowest level (\$455).

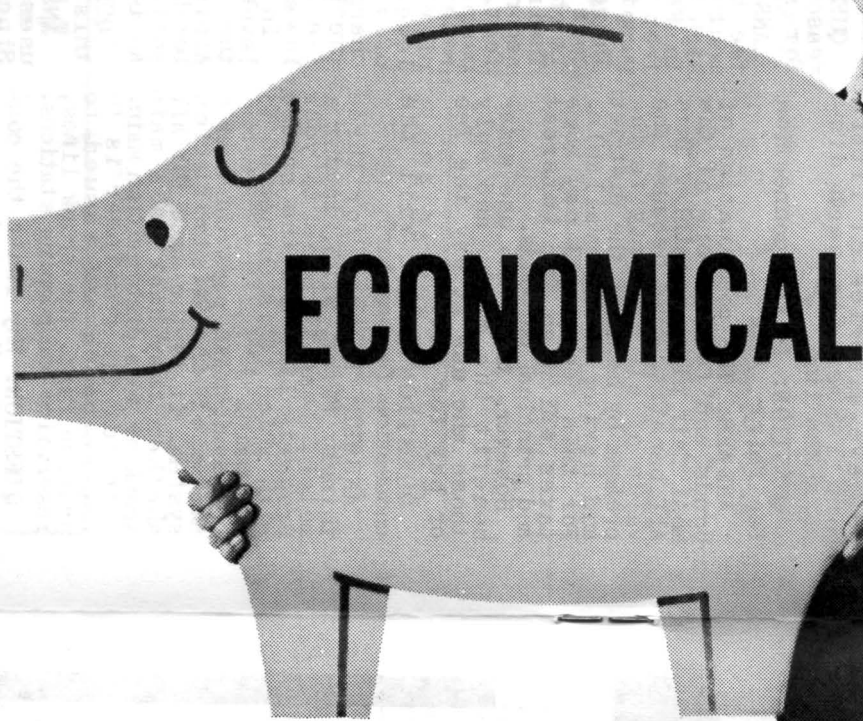
In a like manner the highest level has the highest costs and the highest connection fee. Alpine is \$465, (\$90. is for bonds). The fee is for one entire property, not per acre as is charged in some districts.

QUESTION: Does everyone pay this fee?

ANSWER: Yes. Every person who uses water pays his share. Since all must pay for bond retirement and for at least some pipe to bring water to their district even those with new water meters on new distribution mains will pay a connection fee.

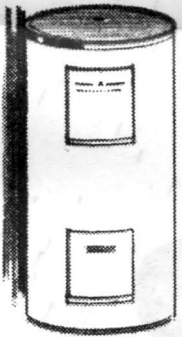

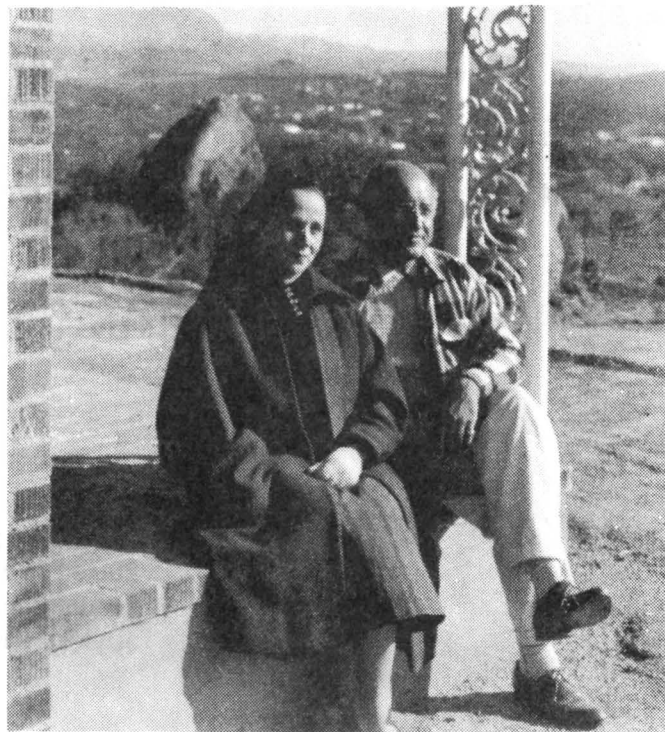
